Minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee held on Thursday, the 2<sup>nd</sup> August, 2001 at 11 a.m. in the Council Office at New Delhi.

Apology for absence was received from Dr. K.S. Chugh.

**1. Minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee – Confirmation of.**

Minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee held on 24.4.2001 were confirmed.

**2. Minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee – Action taken thereon.**

The Executive Committee noted the action taken by the office on the various items included in the minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee held on 24.4.2001 and further noted that no compliance on the observations made by the Council Inspectors in the inspection reports of Sri Devraj Urs Medical College, Tamaka, Kolar under Item No. 33 and Kempegowda Instt. of Medical Sciences, Bangalore under Item No. 34 within the period of 3 months granted by it at its meeting held on 24.04.2001 has been received.

The Committee decided to send a reminder to the concerned authorities for sending the compliance.

Under Item No. 14 – Increase of MBBS seats from 50 to 100 at Sri Vasant Rao Naik Govt. Medical College, Yavatmal – Renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake.

The Committee noted that compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the Council Inspectors report (March,2001) carried out for renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students at Sri Vasantrya Naik Govt. Medical College, Yavatmal against the increased intake had been received from the Secretary, Govt. of Maharashtra, Medical Education & Drugs Department, Mantralaya, Mumbai on which certain clarification were sought by the office. As no reply had been received from the Secretary to the Govt. of Maharashtra, the Committee decided to send a reminder for getting the required information.

**3. Starting of MNR Medical College at Sangareddy, Distt. Medak, A.P. by MNR Educational Trust.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (30<sup>th</sup> April and 1<sup>st</sup> May,2001) carried out to assess the facilities available for starting of MNR Medical College at Sangareddy, Distt. Medak, AP by MNR Educational Trust u/s10A of the IMC Act,1956.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (30<sup>th</sup> April & 1<sup>st</sup> May,2001) and noted the following:-

1. Building:

Construction work of the college is not yet completed as in certain areas plaster and flooring is going on. In certain rooms and laboratories light connection, water connection, drainage connection, toilets are not completed. However, as per the project report submitted along with the application, the authorities were to complete the buildings with all fixtures and fittings as per building requirements prescribed by the MCI by the end of Nov.,2000 in the first phase and the second phase was to be completed by end of January/June,2001. This construction included administrative block, departments of Anatomy, Physiology including Bio-physics, Biochemistry, Pathology, Microbiology, Pharmacology, Forensic Medicine including Toxicology and Community Medicine and other buildings for providing remaining infrastructural facilities as required at the time of inception as per their own statement made in the project report.

2. Common rooms for boys and girls:

There is no furniture. Civil work of toilets etc. is not complete.

3. Animal House:

Construction work is not complete. Except a Veterinary officer, other staff has not been appointed as per Council requirements.

4. Central Library:

Central library does not have accommodation to seat 250 students with furniture as required.

5. Hostels:

Boys hostel and nurses hostel not provided as they are still under construction.

6. Residential Quarters:

Residential quarters not provided even construction is not yet started.

7. Residents:

12 rooms are provided on the top floor of the college. Provision should be made for 50 residents.

8. Basic Departments:

The departments of Anatomy, Physiology and Biochemistry are not properly furnished. Even water connection and electric connection has not been provided in the laboratories. Departmental libraries should have 80 books.

9. Clinical Departments:

- Record of clinical material is not maintained properly.
- 3 operation theatres are not fully commissioned. They are non-functional. 5 beds of pre-operative ward and 10 beds of post operative ward of O.T. block are not fully commissioned and hence non-functional. Only operation theatre of casualty is functioning. Records of operation performed not available.
- Labour rooms are not fully commissioned and non-functional.
- No labour room for septic cases.

10. Clinical Material:

Records in the hospital are not kept properly and registers for all days were not available. Supportive evidences for available data were not available, hence, it was difficult to make out from the limited available, incomplete records the daily O.P.D. attendance, daily hospital occupancy, operative work, laboratory investigations, radiological investigation, delivery rate, caesarian operation, gynaecology operative work and casualty attendance.

11. In O.P.D. basic facilities like examination tray, x-ray view box, water for washing hands etc. have not been provided in all chambers of consultants. Furniture & teaching aids are not provided in demonstration rooms.
12. Record Section:
  - Record department is not maintained properly and not supervised by senior faculty member.
  - Record officer has not yet been appointed.
  - Computerization of the records has not been done.
13. Clinical Laboratories:

Clinical laboratories are not adequately equipped.
14. Laundry:

Equipment purchased but not commissioned.
15. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Intent for starting of MNR Medical College at Sangareddy, Distt. Medak, AP by MNR Educational Trust u/s10A of the IMC Act,1956.

**4. Starting of Medical College at Agroha by Maharaja Agrasen Instt. of Medical Research & Education, Agroha u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> June,2001) carried out to assess the facilities available for starting of Medical College at Agroha by Maharaja Agrasen Instt. of Medical Research & Education, Agroha u/s10A of the IMC Act,1956.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> June,2001) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to issue Letter of Intent for starting of Medical College at Agroha by Maharaja Agrasen Instt. of Medical Education & Scientific Research Society, Agroha with 50 (fifty) admissions u/s10A of the IMC Act,1956 for the academic year 2001-2002.

The Committee further decided that grant of Letter of Permission will be considered only after receipt of compliance on the observations made in the inspection report and its verification by MCI by way of an inspection.

**5. Starting of Medical College at Nagrota by KHN Memorial Hospital & Research -Institute of Medical Sciences, Jammu u/s. 10A of the IMC Act,1956.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> April,2001) carried out to assess the facilities available for starting of Medical College at Nagrota by KHN Memorial Hospital & Research -Institute of Medical Sciences, Jammu u/s 10A of the IMC Act,1956.

The Executive Committee noted that the Hon'ble High court of Jammu & Kashmir at Srinagar vide order dated 30.07.2001 had finally disposed of the writ petition No. 522/2000 filed by Peoples Welfare Society -vs- Union of India & Ors.

In view of the above the Committee decided to defer the consideration of the matter.

**6. Starting of new medical college – Mahatma Gandhi National Institute of Medical Sciences, Jaipur by India Education Trust, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report (Feb.2001) for starting of Mahatma Gandhi National Institute of Medical Sciences, Jaipur by India Education Trust, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report (Feb.2001) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to issue Letter of Permission for starting of Mahatma Gandhi National Institute of Medical Sciences, Jaipur by India Education Trust, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 with an annual intake of 100 (hundred) students for the academic session 2001-2002.

**7. Starting of new medical college at Gangtok by Sikkim Manipal University of Health, Medical Technological Sciences u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (12<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) carried out on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the earlier inspection report (Nov.2000) for grant of permission for starting of medical college at Gangtok by Sikkim Manipal University of Health, Medical and Technological Sciences u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee noted that as per its earlier decision taken on 22.1.2001 which was communicated to the Central Govt. by the office on 24.1.2001, the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 1<sup>st</sup> March,2001 had issued LOI for starting of Medical College at Gangtok with an annual intake of 50 students for the academic year 2000-2001.

The Committee further noted a letter dated 16<sup>th</sup> March,2001 received from the Central Govt. wherein the MCI was requested to review the recommendations of the Executive Committee in view of the fact that less number of seats were being allowed mainly on the ground that as per the guidelines nearly 600 patients per day are required to attend OPD at inception level and finally 1200 patients per day for 150 admissions. As the State of Sikkim is sparsely populated having population of 5 lakhs it may not be practical to have such a high attendance in such a sparsely populated State, it was decided that for emotional integration of the State such a high OPD attendance should not be insisted, considering the population of the State.

The Committee considered the facts stated in the letter of the Central Govt. along with the compliance verification inspection report (12<sup>th</sup> June,2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance through the Central Govt. vide letter dated 04.04.2001 in continuation to their letter dated 16.03.2001 and noted that certain improvements have been made at the college since the last inspection.

The Executive Committee further noted that the department of Health & Family Welfare, Govt. of Sikkim has permitted Sikkim Manipal Institute of Medical Sciences, Gangtok to utilise the facilities of STNM Hospital and other peripheral hospitals in East District for the purposes of clinical material for teaching with total administrative control of beds and patients for a period of three years. This hospital is 7 kms. away from the site of the college complex. In light of the geographical placement and Sikkim being hilly area the attachment of this hospital was accepted, however, the management of the college should take the responsibility of improving the infrastructural facilities in the said hospital in order to comply to make it at par with a teaching hospital.

The Committee taking into consideration the infrastructural and other facilities and also that there is no medical college in the State which is sparsely populated and situated in the north east hilly area,decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to issue Letter of Permission for starting of medical college at Gangtok by Sikkim Manipal University of Health, Medical and Technological Sciences, Gangtok for 100 (one hundred) admissions u/s 10A of the I.M.C. Act,1956 instead of 150 as requested by the applicant and forwarded by the Central Govt.

**8. C.U. Shah Medical College, Surendranagar by Saurashtra Medical Centre, Surendranagar – Renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students during 2001-2002.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students during 2001-2002 at C.U. Shah Medical College, Surendranagar.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (18<sup>th</sup> & 19<sup>th</sup> June,2001) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of 100 (one hundred) MBBS students at C.U. Shah Medical College, Surendranagar for the academic session 2001-2002."

Office Note:

In the inspection report on page 17 under General Remarks it has been mentioned that "the college is admitting 100 students annually since 1999". This may be read as corrected "the college is admitting 100 students annually since 2000", as the first permission for admission of the students at the college was granted by the Central Govt. on 11.09.2000.

**9. Co-operative Medical College, Kochi – Renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (21<sup>st</sup> & 22<sup>nd</sup> May,2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students at Co-operative Medical College, Kochi.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (21<sup>st</sup> & 22<sup>nd</sup> May,2001) and noted the following:-

1. As per the project report, the pre-clinical departments and lecture halls in the college and a 300 bedded hospital along with fully functional out-patient department and library facilities were to be completed in the first phase before the actual admission of students. This also included students hostels and accommodation for staff including accommodation for nurses. This first phase was to be completed by Sept.,2000. As per the project report none of these facilities have been created and provided. The pre clinical departments are still accommodated in the hospital building.
2. Gallery type lecture theatres have not been provided as per Council norms. Moreover they still continue as a makeshift arrangement on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of the Indira Gandhi Co-operative Hospital.

3. The girls hostel is located 200 metres away from the college which has only 34 rooms and over crowded by accommodating 3 students per room. Moreover accommodation is not adequate for 68 students.
4. The boys hostel is 3 kms. away again in a rented building which has 24 rooms with 2-3 students per room. The total hostel accommodation thus is short for 200 students and is a makeshift arrangement.
5. The capacity of the examination hall which was 100-120 at the time of inception, was to be increased to 200 – 250 seats for the 2<sup>nd</sup> batch which has not been done.
6. The para clinical departments were to be provided during the 2<sup>nd</sup> phase i.e. one year after the admission of the first batch. As per the project report this 2<sup>nd</sup> phase is to be completed by Sept.,2001. Presently the para clinical departments are also housed in a makeshift arrangement in a rented building temporarily.
  - Each department is provided less than the prescribed space.
  - Each floor is divided into various sections, the incomplete wooden partitions. Each section of the deptt. has inadequate space. This type of make shift arrangement in a rented building is not satisfactory.
  - The arrangement and distribution of space for demonstration rooms, practical laboratories, museum, departmental library alongwith necessary furniture and equipment is not as per recommendations of the Council.
7. The existing co-operative hospital which is being used as a teaching hospital at present is also a make shift arrangement till the proper college & hospital campus is constructed at the newly acquired site which is 12 kms. away. The construction of the college has started in March, 2001 only.
8. Adequate provision of water supply and drainage facilities have not been provided in the animal house along with the space.
9. Central library space is inadequate and not as per Council norms. The subscribed journals are not yet received in the library.
10. There is no accommodation for nursing staff. As per Council norms, 40% of the nursing staff has to be provided with accommodation.
11. There is no provision of residential quarters for the staff at present. 6 flats in a rented building on 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> floors are available and at present these flats are lying vacant. This accommodation is proposed to be used for 40 resident doctors.



12. The OPD space is congested and over crowded. Only two cubicles are available for teaching purposes. There is no procedure room/dressing room, plaster room, injection room, audiometry room etc.
13. The medical records are not fully computerized.
14. The space for the casualty is inadequate. There are only 3 beds. Other infrastructural facilities such as equipments etc. have not been provided as per Council norms.
15. There is no Central Sterilization Deptt. in the hospital.
16. There is no mechanised laundry in the hospital.
17. The Primary Health Centre and the Urban Health Centre are under administrative and financial control of the Health Services of the State and not under the control of the college.
18. Shortage of teaching staff:
  1. Associate Professor – 1 (Pathology –1)
  2. Assistant Professors – 6 (Anatomy-2, Lecturer in Biophysics – 1, Ortho.-1, Anaesthesia –1, Forensic Medicine -1)
  3. Tutors – 1 (Anaesthesia –1)
  4. Jr. Residents – 9 (Medicine-1, Surgery-3, Ortho.-2, ENT-2, Obst. & Gynae.-1)

Total deficiencies 17 out of 119 = 14% approximately.

19. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Committee decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students at Co-operative Medical College, Kochi, Kerala.”

**10. Khaja Banda Nawaz Instt. of Medical Sciences, Gulbarga (Karnataka) – Renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report (April, 2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students at Khaja Banda Nawaz Instt. of Medical Sciences, Gulbarga (Karnataka).

The Executive Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (28<sup>th</sup> & 29<sup>th</sup> June,2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report (April,2001) and noted the following:-

1. That the Ministry vide its letter dated 03.11.1999 informed that the application of Khaja Educational Society has been examined in light of the Regulations,1993 by the Central Govt. and Council was requested to consider the application under the same Regulations. Accordingly, the Council verified the compliance report submitted by the college authorities on the deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report (Sept.,99) received through the Central Govt. on 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> December,1999 and it was decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to issue Letter of Permission for starting of the proposed medical college at Gulbarga by Khaja Educational Society with an annual intake of 100 students.
2. That the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 25.05.2001 while submitting the compliance report on the rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the Council Inspectors report dated 9<sup>th</sup> & 10<sup>th</sup> April,2001 informed that as regards construction of the regular college building is concerned since proposal was accepted under old Regulations and both the sites are owned by the Khaja Educational Society i.e. the Engineering College Campus and the OPD Hospital Complex, Ministry has no objection in constructing the regular college building in their own campus as proposed by the Society provided the required land is **available for housing the medical college and construction is completed as per the time schedule given in the project report.**
3. On going through the compliance verification report dated 28<sup>th</sup> & 29<sup>th</sup> June,2001 along with the previous inspection report dated 9<sup>th</sup> & 10<sup>th</sup> April,2001, it is noted that the construction plan has not been executed by the Trust authorities as per the time schedule given in the project report where the first phase consisting of Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry departments, Central library, one hostel for boys, one hostel for girls was to be completed within 18 months i.e. August,2001 from the date of the receipt of Letter of Intent (Letter of Intent was issued by the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 7<sup>th</sup> Feb.,2000).
4. In the **pre clinical departments** there is over all inadequacy in the office space provided for the staff and seating capacity in the various laboratories of the departments.
5. The **para clinical departments** are housed in a makeshift arrangement. As per the project report, the departments of Pharmacology, Pathology, Microbiology, Forensic Medicine, Lecture rooms, Administrative block, Central library, one boys hostel, commencement of construction of the

staff quarters which is to be completed in 2<sup>nd</sup> phase within 30 months i.e. August,2002 from the date of receipt of Letter of Intent.

Shortages:

- The office space in all the para clinical departments for staff is inadequate.
  - The museums of all the departments are required to be upgraded.
  - In the deptt. of Pathology, one more student laboratory is required to be established.
  - There are no library cum seminar rooms.
  - In the deptt. of Forensic Medicine, the student laboratory has not been provided.
  - The sitting capacity of demonstration rooms in some of the department is less.
  - Thus, the para clinical departments are also short of accommodation and water facilities.
6. Number of journals contributed in the library is insignificant and whatever journals are available they are not indexed, hence, could not be counted. Internet & Medlar facilities have not been provided.
  7. The statistical unit is not properly developed and is not functional.
  8. The Govt. has yet to allot RHCs/PHCs to the institute. The Urban Health Centre has still not started functioning. The college authorities have given an assurance that the Urban Health Centre will be made functional shortly.
  9. The hostel accommodation in the college is required to be increased. The boys hostel should be owned by the society. It is in a rented building at present. The total capacity at present is to accommodate 156 students. As per Council norms, accommodation for 200 is required. The institution is required to increase the hostel capacity to 200.
  10. The casualty deptt. requires increase in the number of beds and life saving equipment. There are only four beds available now. Life saving equipment such as emergency ventilator and monitor etc. are required to be provided.
  11. In the Intensive Care Unit the beds are of ordinary type which required to be replaced by proper ICU beds. The equipment is totally inadequate in terms of monitors, ventilators etc. Air-conditioning of the ICU is also necessary.
  12. The Central Sterile Supply Department (CSSD) which was not available at the time of first inspection has still not been provided.

13. The space and OPD facilities are required to be expanded. The OPD is congested at present. Except one or two, there are no teaching areas in OPD.
14. The indoor facilities in the hospital are short of treatment rooms, teaching areas and departmental space for the clinical departments.
15. The laundry is not mechanised.
16. The transport facilities for the students to commute between the hospital and the college is not provided. The college authorities have given an assurance to provide the same at the earliest.

17. Shortage of teaching staff:

Professor – 1 (Radiology)  
 Associate Professor – 3 (Microbiology-1, Fore.Med.-1, Ortho.-1)  
 Assistant Professors – 2 (Physiology –1, TB & Chest Diseases –1)  
 Others – 1 (Lecturer in Biophysics)  
 Jr. Residents – 4 (Surgery –4)

The total shortage of teaching staff is 7 out of 119 =5.8%.

18. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students at Khaja Banda Nawaz Instt. of Medical Sciences, Gulbarga (Karnataka)."

**11. Govt. Thoothukudi Medical College, Thoothukudi – Renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> May,2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students at Govt. Thoothukudi Medical College, Thoothukudi.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (28<sup>th</sup> & 29<sup>th</sup> May,2001) along with the additional information furnished by the authorities of State Govt. of Tamilnadu, vide letter dated 31.7.2001 and decided to verify the same by way of an inspection.

The Committee authorised the Chairman to decide in the matter on receipt of compliance verification inspection report.

**12. Municipal Corporation Medical College, Muglisara, Surat – Renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> June,2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students at Municipal Corporation Medical College, Muglisara, Surat .

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (25<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> June,2001) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of 100 (one hundred) students at Municipal Corporation Medical College, Muglisara, Surat for the academic session 2001-2002.

**13. Narayana Medical College, Nellore – Renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students during the academic year 2001-2002.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> June,2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students during the academic year 2001-2002 at Narayana Medical College, Nellore.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (27<sup>th</sup> & 28<sup>th</sup> June,2001) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of 100 (one hundred) students at Narayana Medical College, Nellore for the academic session 2001-2002.

**14. SVS Medical College, Mehboobnagar – Renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of MBBS students during 2001-2002.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> May,2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students during the academic year 2001-2002 at SVS Medical College, Mehboobnagar.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (22<sup>nd</sup> & 23<sup>rd</sup> May,2001) along with the additional information furnished by the college authorities regarding appointment of teaching staff and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of 100 (one hundred) students at S.V.S. Medical College, Mehboobnagar for the academic session 2001-2002.

**15. Increase of MBBS seats from 100 to 150 at Smt. NHL Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad – Renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> June,2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake at Smt. NHL Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> June,2001) along with the additional information furnished by the Municipal Commissioner, Ahmedabad and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 at Smt. NHL Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad for the academic session 2001-2002.

The Committee further decided to advise the college authorities to comply with the observations made in the inspection report within 3 months and send a compliance to that effect to the Council.

**16. Increase of MBBS seats from 100 to 150 at S.V. Medical College, Tirupati – Renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> July,2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake at S.V. Medical College, Tirupati.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> July,2001) and noted the following:-

1. Non teaching staff in most of the departments is not as per Council norms.
2. Auditorium has not been provided with furniture.
3. Examination Hall does not have adequate sitting capacity as per Council norms.
4. The library does not have required number of Indian and foreign journals.
5. Accommodation provided in the hostel for undergraduate student is not adequate. Girls hostel – in 20 rooms 4 students are given accommodation in each room.
6. Residential Quarters available at present are not adequate as per the Council norms. Only 11 quarters are available to staff out of 14 and 3 (three) quarters are given to lady postgraduate students.

7. In OPD, separate cubicle to seat and examine the patients are not provided to each consultant.
8. Audiometry room is not sound proof and is without air-conditioning .
9. There is no separate injection room for female and male patients and no plaster room available.
10. In wards adequate space has not been provided between two beds. Beds are not numbered and not provided with side lockers.
11. Registration & Record Section has not yet been computerized.
12. Casualty Deptt. does not have emergency life saving equipments like ventilator, defibrillators.
13. There is no arrangement to carry out emergency investigations like blood gas analyzer, electrolyte estimation etc. in emergency clinical lab for 24 hours.
14. Medical & Surgical Intensive Care Units have not been provided with necessary equipment.
15. All postgraduate students and nurses are not provided with hostel accommodation. No separate hostel for interns has been provided.
16. Departmentwise deficiencies:
  - a) Anatomy Deptt.
    - Histology lab have 35 seats instead of 90 seats as required.
    - Lockers have not been provided.
    - Cold room/cooling bar has not been provided.
  - b) Physiology Deptt.
    - In demonstration room II adequate number of seats are not available. Amphibian & Mammalian laboratories and clinical physiology laboratory should have 90 seats.
  - c) Pharmacology Deptt.
    - Experimental Pharmacology & Clinical Pharmacology/Pharmacy practical laboratory are not having adequate number of seats.
    - Space provided for museum is inadequate.

d) Pathology Deptt.

- In demonstration room II adequate number of seats are not available.
- Clinical Pathology/Haematology practical lab has not been provided.

e) Microbiology Deptt.

- Practical lab has not been provided with adequate number of working seats.
- There is no Departmental museum.

f) Forensic Medicine Deptt.

- In the demonstration room teaching facilities have not been provided.
- There is no practical lab or research lab available.
- Mortuary cooler is not in working condition & mortuary area does not have inquest room, viscera preparation room, visitor room etc.

17. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 at S.V. Medical College, Tirupati for the academic session 2001-2002."

**17. Increase of MBBS seats from 50 to 100 at K.J. Somaiya Medical College, Mumbai – Renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (5<sup>th</sup> July,2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report (March,2001) for Renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake at K.J. Somaiya Medical College, Mumbai.

The Executive Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (5<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report (March,2001) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake i.e. 50 to 100 at K.J. Somaiya Medical College, Mumbai for the academic session 2001-2002.



The Committee further decided to advise the college authorities to comply with the observations made in the inspection report within 3 months and send a compliance to that effect to the Council.

**18. Increase of MBBS seats from 130 to 150 at Kurnool Medical College, Kurnool – Renewal of permission for admission of 4<sup>th</sup> batch of students during 2001-2002.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> April,2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 4<sup>th</sup> batch of students against the increased intake at Kurnool Medical College, Kurnool.

The Executive Committee noted that the Central Govt. vide letter No. U.12012/64/95-ME(P), dated 26<sup>th</sup> June,2001 conveyed its approval for renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students during the year 2000-2001 against the increased intake from 130 to 150 at Govt. Medical College, Kurnool subject to the condition that the students admitted against the increased intake during 1999-2000 without obtaining the permission of the Central Govt. be adjusted against the admissions to be made during the academic year 2000-2001 and no fresh admissions are made against the increased intake during 2000-2001. The Central Govt. further vide its letter dated 12.07.2001 had regularised the admissions made at the College during the year 1999-2000 (20 excess admissions) by reducing equal number of seats over the period of two years beginning from the year 2001-2002 i.e. 10 seats each year(2001-2002 and 2002-2003). This adjustment of students is subject to annual renewal of permission for 150 admissions in these years. If the college fails to obtain the renewal during these years the adjustment will have to be done within the intake of that year(s).

The Executive Committee on going through the inspection report (25<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> April,2001) carried out for renewal of permission for admission of 4<sup>th</sup> batch of students against the increased intake (130 to 150) had noted the following:-

1. Non-teaching staff is inadequate in most of the departments.
2. Medicine unit II & III and Surgery Unit II are having 2 – Sr. teachers. As per requirement 3 – Sr. teachers are required.
3. No arrangement for laboratory investigations in the hospital from 4.00 p.m. to 9.00 a.m.
4. The statistical unit has not been established.
5. One lecture theatre is not having the adequate number of seats as required.
6. There is no examination hall.

7. Institution is running several postgraduate courses. Additional staff is required in the department of Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry, Pathology, Microbiology, Social & Preventive Medicine, Radiology and Anaesthesia if the postgraduate courses are taken into consideration being run by the institution.
8. In the animal house staff has not been appointed as per the Council norms. Facilities for animal experiments are not available.
9. Central library needs improvement in terms of books, staff and seating accommodation as per the Council recommendations. Journals are not being subscribed regularly as per Council requirement.
10. In the Photography section, the post of Photographer is vacant.
11. There is no urban health centre.
12. There are no residential quarters in the campus for teaching and non-teaching staff except for 2 R.M.O.'s and hostel wardens.
13. Student hostels need additional accommodation for 100 students.
14. Resident doctor hostels need additional accommodation for 125 residents.
15. Nurses are not provided with quarters in the campus.
16. All specialities have not been provided with basic facilities for examination of patients and teaching students e.g. examination tray, x-ray view box, black board etc. in O.P.D. and wards.
17. There is no audiometry room.
18. Record section has not been computerised and not supervised by senior faculty members.
19. Space available for the casualty is not adequate. There is no operation theatre, no involvement of Forensic Medicine department.
20. In the operation theatre pre anaesthetic and post anaesthetic area with necessary facilities has not been provided.
21. Mechanical laundry has not been provided.
22. Incinerator has not been provided.

23. Departmentwise deficiencies:

a) Anatomy Department:

- There is no research room.
- Mortuary coolers are not in working condition and require immediate repair.

b) Physiology Department:

- There is no research room.
- Clinical Physiology laboratory has not been provided.

c) Pathology Department:

- Clinical/haematology practical laboratory and one demonstration room are not available.
- Space available for the museum is not adequate.

d) Forensic Medicine Department:

- Museum is not organised properly. There is no description of specimen. No cataloguing. Mortuary coolers are not in working condition.
- There is no research room.
- Forensic laboratory needs more improvement.

e) Social & Preventive Medicine Department

- Museum is not organised properly and needs more space.
- Laboratory has not been provided.
- Urban Health Centre has not been established.

24. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 4<sup>th</sup> batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e 130 to 150 at Kurnool Medical College, Kurnool for the academic session 2001-2002.

The Committee further decided to advise the college authorities to admit 120 students during the year 2001-2002 after adjusting 10 students within the approved intake of the college i.e. 130 students as per the Central Govt.'s letter dated 12.07.2001.

**19. Increase of MBBS seats from 100 to 150 at Kakatiya Medical College, Warangal – Renewal of permission for admission of 4<sup>th</sup> batch of students against the increased intake.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> June 2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 4<sup>th</sup> batch of students against the increased intake at Kakatiya Medical College, Warangal.

The Executive Committee noted that the Central Govt. vide letter No. U.12012/64/96-ME(P), dated 26<sup>th</sup> Sept., 2000 conveyed its approval for renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students during the year 2000-2001 against the increased intake from 100 to 150 at Kakatiya Medical College, Warangal subject to the condition that the students admitted against the increased intake during 1999-2000 without obtaining the permission of the Central Govt. be adjusted against the admissions to be made during the academic year 2000-2001 and no fresh admissions are made against the increased intake during 2000-2001. The Central Govt. further vide its letter dated 12.07.2001 had regularised the admissions made at the College during the year 1999-2000 (50 excess admissions) by reducing equal number of seats over the period of three years beginning from the year 2001-2002 in the following manner:-

This adjustment of students is subject to annual renewal of permission for 150 admissions in these years. If the college fails to obtain the renewal during these years the adjustment will have to be done within the intake of that year(s).

The Executive Committee on going through the inspection report (25<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) carried out for renewal of permission for admission of 4<sup>th</sup> batch of students against the increased intake (100 to 150) had noted the following:-

1. The Rural Health Training Centre, Wardhannapet is in a rented house and is inadequate. The infrastructural facilities are not satisfactory.
2. The indoor facilities in the hospitals are not adequate. Some of the wards are deficient in examination and treatment room, doctors duty rooms etc. Teaching areas in the form of demonstration rooms as provided are commonly used by different clinical departments.

In some of the wards there is overcrowding of patients and the inter-bed space is less.

The CKM Maternity Hospital is in a dilapidated building which requires demolition and new construction. The condition in the hospital is poor. The Operation theatres though renovated are still in a cramped situation. Same is the condition of GMH Maternity Hospital.

3. The Medical Record Deptt. has not been computerized in general, particularly the OPD registration etc.
4. The ambulances provided for the casualty services are not properly equipped. The acute care beds in casualty require to be replaced by proper intensive care beds. There is no emergency ventilator in the casualty.
5. The accommodation provided for Central Sterilization department is less and has not been developed on proper technical lines. It requires to be provided with equipments in the form of more sterilizers, an ethylene oxide sterilizer. Cold sterilization facilities have not been provided.
6. A mechanized laundry has not been established.
7. The intercom facility has not yet been provided.
8. The furniture and furnishings provided in the pre and para clinical departments are old and they require to be replaced in phases.
  - (i) Facility of cold storage in Anatomy department has not been provided separately.
  - (ii) Student laboratory/practical hall is not available in PSM department.
  - (iii) The museum of the deptt. of Microbiology is required to be developed further.
9. The auditorium building is old and requires renovation and refurnishing.
10. The college is running postgraduate degree and diploma courses in practically all subjects.

As per the requirement of PG component of teaching faculty, there is a shortage of 16 faculty members (Readers/Assoc.Profs.-8, Asstt. Profs./Lecturers-7 and Tutor/Demonstrator-1).
11. 16 faculty members have joined the institution between February and June, 2001 either on transfer or on promotion from other Govt. Medical Colleges of Andhra Pradesh.
12. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 4<sup>th</sup> batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e 100 to 150 at Kakatiya Medical College, Warangal for the academic session 2001-2002.

The Committee further decided to advise the college authorities to admit 85 students during the year 2001-2002 after adjusting 15 students within the approved intake of the college i.e. 100 students as per the Central Govt.'s letter dated 12.07.2001.

**20. Starting of new medical college at Sullia, Karnataka by Academy of Liberal Education ( R ), Sullia, Karnataka.**

Read : The representation of the authorities of Academy of Liberal Education(R ), Sullia, Karnataka forwarded by the Central Govt. for starting of new medical college at Sullia, Karnataka.

The Executive Committee noted that application for starting of Medical College, Sullia, Karnataka by Academy of Liberal Education ® was received through the Central Govt. vide letter dated 23.06.2001. As the land available with the Academy i.e. 25.8 acres earmarked for the proposed medical college was in two pieces and the distance of which was 1.8 kms., the file was returned to the Central Govt. vide MCI letter dated 5.9.2000 stating therein that the college authorities do not meet with the qualifying criteria as prescribed in the regulations of the Council for establishment of new medical colleges – 1999 regarding land which is as under:-

“that a suitable single plot of land measuring not less than 25 acres is owned and possessed by the person or is possessed by the applicant by way of 99 years lease for the construction of the college.”

The Committee further noted that on receipt of the request of the Central Govt. that the proposal may be considered under the old regulations of the MCI, as the same was accepted and forwarded to the MCI under the old regulations. The matter was considered by it at its meetings held on 24.10.2000 and 22.01.2001 wherein the Committee decided to inform the Central Govt. that the applications where the applicant do not possess the single piece of land for starting of medical college as required under the qualifying criteria cannot be considered. Accordingly, the Central Govt. vide letter dated 19.3.2001 had returned the proposal to the applicant stating therein that they may apply afresh between 1<sup>st</sup> August to 31<sup>st</sup> August of the year strictly in accordance with MCI Regulations,1999.

The Committee considered the representation of the Academy of Liberal Education received through the Central Govt. to consider the land in possession with the authorities which is in two pieces under the MCI Old Regulations of 1993 for starting of a medical college and further that they had already developed 500

bedded running hospital, college building, hostels for students, residential flats for staff etc. as per the norms and regulations as applicable.

The Committee did not accept the contention of the Academy of Liberal Education [R], Sullia as represented in light of the fact that no application has been considered by the Council for any applicant medical college where the requirement of the total land of 25 acres had been provided in two pieces situated at a distance from each other i.e. the land was not in a single piece of 25 acres. However, the applicant if wishes, can apply afresh for starting of a medical college after fulfilling the qualifying criterias as prescribed under the establishment of medical college Regulations, 1999 particularly the criteria of possessing a single piece of land of 25 acres.

**21. Relaxation of rules for establishment of medical colleges in hilly states including Uttranchal.**

Read : A copy of letter addressed by Hon'ble Minister of Health & FW, Dr. C.P. Thakur to Shri N.D. Tiwari, Member of Parliament and Chairman, Public Accounts Committee with regard to relaxation of rules for establishment of medical colleges in hilly states including Uttranchal.

The Executive Committee considered the matter with regard to relaxation of rules for establishment of medical colleges in hilly states including Uttranchal and authorised the Chairman to form a Sub-Committee to go through the matter.

**22. Transfer of Bank Guarantee deposited by the colleges to the State Govt. in the event if they fail to create the infrastructure as per MCI norms and in that case take the responsibility of students already admitted in that college by the State Govt. – Regarding.**

Read : The letter dated 9<sup>th</sup> Feb.2001 of the Central Govt., Ministry of Health & F.W. enclosing therewith a copy of letter received from the Secretary to Govt. of Rajasthan seeking comments of the Council with regard to transfer of Bank Guarantee deposited by the colleges to the State Govt. in the event if they fail to create the infrastructure as per MCI norms and in that case take the responsibility of students already admitted in that college by the State Govt.

The Executive Committee considered the letter dated 9<sup>th</sup> Feb.,2001 of the Govt. of India, Ministry of Health & F.W. enclosing therewith a copy of letter dated 16.01.2001 of the Secretary, Govt. of Rajasthan with regard to transfer of Bank Guarantee to the State Govt. in the event if the authorities of the colleges

fail to create the infrastructure as per MCI norms and in that case take the responsibility of students already admitted in that college by the State Govt.

The Committee noted that as per Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999, the State Govt. has to issue Essentiality Certificate cum N.O.C. for establishment of Medical College in the format prescribed by the Medical Council of India. The State Govt. is required to certify that in case the applicant fails to create infrastructure for the medical college as per M.C.I. norms and fresh admissions are stopped by Central Govt., the State Govt. shall take over the responsibility of the students already admitted in the college with the permission of the Central Govt.

In view of above, the Committee decided to agree with the request of the State Govt. that the Bank Guarantee deposited by the applicant to the MCI/GOI may be transferred to State Govt. if such an eventuality arises.

**23. Inclusion of the basic principles and concepts of Ayurveda, Homeopathy, Unani, Siddha and Yoga in the curriculum of MBBS.**

Read : The minutes of the Sub-Committee with regard to inclusion of the basic principles and concepts of Ayurveda, Homeopathy, Unani, Siddha and Yoga in the curriculum of MBBS.

The Executive Committee decided to defer the consideration of the matter.

**24. Minimum Standard Requirement for medical college for 100 admissions annually Regulations – 1999 – Suggestion for amendments regarding Deptt. of Anaesthesiology.**

Read : The suggestion of the Dean, Pramukhswami Medical College, Karamsad regarding deptt. of Anaesthesiology in the Minimum Standard Requirement for medical college for 100 admissions annually Regulations – 1999.

The Executive Committee considered the letter dated 18.06.2001 received from the Dean, Pramukhswami Medical College, Karamsad and did not accept the suggestions of the Dean with reference to the staff requirement and provision of syllabus in respect of Anaesthesiology Department in the MCI Regulations, 1999 on Minimum Standard Requirement for a medical college with 50/100/150 admissions annually.



**25. Removal of the name of deceased person from the Indian Medical Register.**

Read : The letter dated 21.7.2001 received from the Registrar, Rajasthan Medical Council intimating that Dr. Miss Amrit Khalsa and Dr. Mahesh Prasad Bora have since been expired and their names have been removed from the Register of the Registered Medical Practitioners.

The Executive Committee noted letter dated 21.07.2001 received from the Registrar, Rajasthan Medical Council, Jaipur intimating that Dr. Miss Amrit Khalsa, Registration No. 1185 and Dr. Mahesh Prasad Bora, Registration No. 9416 had expired and their names have been removed from the Register of the Registered Medical Practitioners.

The Committee decided to remove the same from the Indian Medical Register also.

**26. Removal of the name of deceased person from the Indian Medical Register.**

Read : The letter dated 17.4.2001 received from the Registrar, Rajasthan Medical Council intimating that Dr. Om Prakash Budhwar has since been expired and his name has been removed from the Register of the Registered Medical Practitioners.

The Executive Committee noted letter dated 17.04.2001 received from the Registrar, Rajasthan Medical Council, Jaipur intimating that Dr. Om Prakash Budhwar, Registration No. 2899 had expired and his name has been removed from the Register of the Registered Medical Practitioners.

The Committee decided to remove the same from the Indian Medical Register also.

**27. Maharashtra Instt. of Medical Education & Research, Talegaon – Approval of the college for the award of MBBS degree granted by Pune University.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (16<sup>th</sup> & 17<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report (Oct., 2000).

The Executive Committee noted that Maharashtra Instt. of Medical Education & Research, Talegaon was established u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 during the year 1995, following the permission granted by the Central Govt. First permission for establishment of the college and admission of 100 students was

granted by the Central Govt. vide letter dt.30/11/94 for a period of one year. Subsequently this permission for admission of the students at the college was renewed by the Central Govt. on yearly basis upto 2000-2001 (6<sup>th</sup> batch).

On receipt of request u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 for recognition of the college inspection to assess the facilities for teaching and training available at the college along with the standard of examination was carried out in Dec., 1999 and the inspection report was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 2/2/2000. The college was not approved for the award of MBBS degree granted by Pune University, in view of the various deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report. On receipt of the compliance another inspection was carried out in May, 2000 and the college was again not approved for the award of MBBS degree, as the college authorities were not able to provide the facilities as per the project report submitted by them with the application for establishment of the college and as per regulations of Council within 5 years. The college was again inspected in Oct., 2000, on receipt of the compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report (May, 2000). In view of the various deficiencies which the college authorities have not complied with the college was not approved for the award of MBBS degree by the Committee at its meeting held on 24/10/2000.

The Committee further considered the compliance verification inspection report (16<sup>th</sup> & 17<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the Council Inspectors report Oct, 2000 and noted that following deficiencies with regard to staff & other infrastructure facilities still persist:-

1. Shortage of staff:-

1. Assoc.Prof./Reader-3 (Pharmacology-1, Forensic Medicine-1, Dentistry-1)
2. Asst.Prof/Lecturer-5 (physiology-1, Forensic Medicine-1, General Medicine-1 Anesthesia-1, Pharmaceutical Chemistry-1)

Total 8 out of 148 required , i.e. 5.5.% shortage. (This deficiency is more than permissible 5%).

Junior Residents: 6 short of 56 required i.e. 11%

2. The Rural Health Centre is still within the industrial premises of Tolani Group, as such, it cannot be labelled as Rural Health Centre.
3. Minor Operation Theatre provided does not give the appearance of being used.
4. The college authorities in their compliance had informed that the OPD and Indoor patient position has improved considerably and efforts are being

made for further improvement with an average daily OPD from March 2000 to April 2001 being – 740 per day.

On verification the statistics provided by the institution from their own registers and records of all the sections it has been reported that the records are not maintained properly. There is no continuity in chronological sequence of the various statistics of records as such it could not be crossed checked. There is no continuity with old registers.

5. The new Operation Theatres have been provided on the first floor of the hospital building which does not have ramp or lift for transportation of patients.
6. The septic theatres are located about 200 yards away in a very old, dilapidated building. No proof of their usage's were provided. The theatres complex did not have any register even a proper toilet was not attached.
7. As per the undertaking given by the college authorities on 4<sup>th</sup> Oct., 2000 all Operation Theatres and Circumscribed Clinical departments were to be provided by 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2001 but the same have not been provided as yet.
8. Location of Central Sterilized department is not proper. It is about 200 yards away from the main hospital building and the OTs and the entry to it is through a narrow corridor by the side of the septic operation theatres.
9. Staff Quarters: Only 16 flats have been completed. No further construction of staff quarter, Deans' quarter, Nurses quarter and Residents quarters as required under the Council regulations has been done.
10. Casualty: On the day of inspection, all the available six beds in casualty were vacant. Proper resuscitation facilities like ventilator, defibrillators were not provided which are essential life saving equipments.

There was no list of doctors, nurses or medical officers on routine/emergency duties and CMO did not know the faculty members available on call that day.

11. The central library has been shifted to the old Anatomy block and has the following shortcomings:
  1. Lecture Hall is interposed between the General Reading Room and the Journal Room all three having a common corridor.
  2. The accession register of text and reference books are not maintained properly. Instead of separate registers, there is a common one.
  3. The staff reading rooms are very small and can accommodate 3-5 person only.

4. The library is now subscribing to only 36 journals as against 100 required.
12. Clinical Departments: The clinical departments and the faculty offices are not provided as per the project plan.
13. Central Animal House: The Central Animal House even now has no facility of experimental work and is still located in an old building, though as per the assurance of the institution, it should have been completed by May-June 2000.
14. Though the Mortuary facility for preservations of cadavers have been provided but the State Govt. has not granted permission them as yet to conduct the postmortems.
15. Other observations/deficiencies as mentioned in the report.

In view of the above recorded deficiencies, the Executive Committee decided to reiterate its earlier decision taken by it not to recommend approval of Maharashtra Instt. of Medical Education & Research, Talegaon for the award of MBBS degree granted by Pune University and not to renew the permission of 7<sup>th</sup> batch of students. For any further decision regarding renewal of permission the Chairman is authorised.

**28. Academy of Medical Sciences, Pariyaram, Kannur – Approval of the college for the award of MBBS degree granted by Calicut University.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report (Nov. 2000).

The Executive Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> July, 2001 and observed that a total of 30 faculty members were transferred from Govt. Medical Colleges of Kerala (1) Calicut Medical College, (2) Trichur Medical College, (3) Medical College, Thiruvananthapuram and (4) Medical College, Kottayam to Academy of Medical Sciences, Pariyaram, Kannur.

In view of above, the Committee decided to seek clarification from the State Govt. as to how the resultant vacancies arising with the transfer of these teachers from the Govt. Medical Colleges had been filled up. The Committee also decided to obtain the list of staff of medical colleges from where the staff had been transferred.

The Committee authorised the Chairman to decide in the matter on receipt of the above clarification.

**29. Starting of Chhattisgarh Institute of Medical Sciences by Guru Ghasidas University, Bilaspur- Grant of Permission of the Central Govt.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance through the Central Govt. for grant of letter of permission for starting of Chhattisgarh Institute of Medical Sciences by Guru Ghasidas University, Bilaspur.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> July,2001) along with the letter dated 01.08.2001 received from the Vice-Chancellor, Guru Ghasidas University, Bilaspur requesting to grant one month's time for appointing teaching staff in place of 18 staff members who were on lien from Raipur at the time of inspection. The Committee decided to grant time as requested by the Vice-Chancellor and further authorised the Chairman to decide in the matter after carrying out the compliance verification inspection.

**30. Dr. Rajendra Prasad Govt. Medical College, Tanda – Renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (27<sup>th</sup>, 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of students at Dr. Rajendra Prasad Govt. Medical College, Tanda.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (28<sup>th</sup> & 29<sup>th</sup> July,2001) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of 50 (fifty) students at Dr. Rajendra Prasad Govt. Medical College, Tanda for the academic session 2001-2002.

**31. Govt. Medical College, Anantpur – Renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (23<sup>rd</sup> & 24<sup>th</sup> July,2001 for renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students at Govt. Medical College, Anantpur.

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (23<sup>rd</sup> & 24<sup>th</sup> July,2001) and noted the following:-

1. The proposed medical college building is to be established in the campus of the District Hospital as an unitary complex as per the decision of the State Govt. and the college authorities. During the last inspection the pre and para clinical departments were accommodated as a makeshift arrangement by making suitable additions and alterations in the hospital

building. This makeshift arrangement was initially for a period of one year. However, the construction of the college building in the campus of the District Hospital has not yet started. Therefore, the pre and para clinical departments still continue as a makeshift arrangement in the hospital building because of delay in execution of work required for the first renewal as per the original plan.

2. The central library does not have the required number of Indian & foreign journals. The Internet and Medlar facilities is not yet provided. The adjoining block of TB Hospital acquired to expand library facilities is not properly furnished and commissioned. The present library set up is also a make shift arrangement.
3. The statistical unit in the college has not yet started functioning. Computers have been purchased but not installed so far.
4. The Health Centres have not been developed.
5. In the girls hostel adequate facilities of dining room, recreation room and kitchen etc. have not been provided.
6. There is no residential accommodation for nurses in the form of a nurses hostel/quarters in the hospital campus.
7. The central clinical laboratory has not been equipped properly such as automated analyzers, blood gas analyzer and serum electrolyte analyzer.
8. The Medical Record deptt. is in preliminary stages. Coding & classification of records and computerisation of records has not yet started.
9. The teaching facilities for the clinical departments in the wards are inadequate. There are no demonstration/teaching areas in the wards.
10. The casualty services of the hospital have not been provided with life saving equipments such as emergency ventilator, proper oxygen cylinders with flow meters, operation lights in emergency OT and anaesthesia machine in the minor OT.
11. The operation theatres have no ceiling lights. Anaesthesia ventilator, monitors, pulse oxymeter and Halothane vaporizers have not been provided. There is not much improvement in the status of the OT facilities since the last inspection.
12. The Intensive Care Unit exists for the name sake only. It is not provided with proper equipment such as monitors, ventilators and proper ICU beds with air-conditioning.

13. The Medical Education Unit is not functional.
14. In the central clinical laboratory - the sections of Biochemistry and Haematology have not been separated as required.
15. There is no central sterilization department.
16. The hospital does not have a mechanised laundry.
17. Establishment of para clinical departments:
  - A/ Deptt. of Pharmacology:
    - The library does not have required number of books.
    - Experimental pharmacology lab.and Clinical pharmacology lab. have not been furnished as yet.
    - The museum of the department has not been expanded and proper furnishing not provided.
  - B/ Deptt. of Pathology:
    - The museum of the department has not developed properly.
  - C/ Deptt. of Microbiology:
    - The library does not have required number of books.
    - The library cum seminar room has not been furnished.
    - The serology and virology labs. are not equipped and furnished.
    - Museum is not available as yet.
  - D/ Deptt. of Forensic Medicine:
    - The accommodation provided for the demonstration room is inadequate.
    - The practical laboratory is not at all furnished.
    - The departmental library does not have adequate number of books.
    - The museum is inadequate.
    - The postmortem room has not been provided with proper teaching/demonstration area.
  - E/ Deptt. of Prev. & Social Medicine:
    - The museum of the department has not been developed properly.

18. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students at Govt. Medical College, Anantpur.

**32. Increase of MBBS seats from 115 to 150 at Pt. B.D. Sharma Postgraduate Instt. of Medical Sciences, Rohtak – Renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake.**

Read : The Council Inspectors report (24<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup> July,2001) for renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students against the increased intake (115 to 150) at Pt. B.D. Sharma Postgraduate Instt. of Medical Sciences, Rohtak.

The Executive Committee noted that the Central Govt. vide letter No. U.12012/57/2000-ME(P), dated 3<sup>rd</sup> November, 2000, conveyed its approval of the Central Govt. for increase of MBBS seats from 115 to 150 at Pt. B.D. Sharma Postgraduate Instt. of Medical Sciences, Rohtak with prospective effect for the academic year 2000-2001 u/s 10A of the I.M.C. Act,1956. The Central Govt. further vide its letter of even number dated 23.11.2000 had regularised the transfer of 152 students admitted in MAIMER, Agroha to PGIMS, Rohtak. The adjustment of these 152 students has to be done within the maximum intake of 150 over the period of five years beginning from 2000-2001 by reducing equal number of seats in each year in the following manner:-

The above adjustment is subject to annual renewal of permission for 150 admissions at PGIMS in the above mentioned years. If the institution fails to obtain the renewal the adjustment of seats will have to be done within approved intake of that year(s).

The Executive Committee considered the Council Inspectors report (24<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) carried out for renewal of permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of students at Pt. B.D. Sharma Postgraduate Instt. of Medical Sciences, Rohtak and noted the following:-

1. The institution is headed by a non-medical person belonging to the Indian Administrative Service cadre and she is holding the Directorship of the



institution as an additional charge. Under the Council norms & regulations, there is an embargo on non-medical personnel becoming Head of the institution.

2. The Head of Department of Biochemistry is even now a non-medical man.
3. The institution has 5 lecture theatres out of which only 2 have the capacity of 200 seats. The other three have the sitting capacity of 120, 100 and 100 respectively. The sitting capacity of 2 lecture theatres needs to be enhanced. One lecture theatre's sitting capacity has to be enhanced to 180 and one to 375-400.
4. The institution is having 4 cadres of teachers, i.e. Lecturers, Readers, Assoc. Prof. and Professor. It should be condensed to 3 approved cadres of the Council, i.e. Prof., Reader and Lecturer.
5. 13 Lecturers were appointed in various disciplines on contractual basis for a period of 89 days w.e.f. 23<sup>rd</sup> July 2001, i.e. a day before the inspection was scheduled.
6. The Deptt. of Psychiatry has 64 beds having one unit instead of two.

The Deptt. of Pediatrics is short of 1 functional Pediatric Unit. Though institution has 3 units in the Deptt. of Pediatrics but the Unit-3 has only neo-natal beds. A neo-natology unit cannot be accepted for undergraduate teaching.

The post of Child Psychologist should be filled by qualified Child Psychologist and not an Analytical Psychologist.

7. The DNB students are enrolled in the deptt. of pediatrics but there is no additional infrastructure for the same.
8. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 115 to 150 at Pt. B.D. Sharma Postgraduate Instt. of Medical Sciences, Rohtak for the academic session 2001-2002.

The Committee further decided to advise the college authorities to admit 89 students during the year 2001-2002 after adjusting 26 students within the approved intake of the college i.e. 115 students as per the Central Govt.'s letter dated 23.11.2000.

The Committee authorised the Chairman to decide in the matter.

**33. Increase of MBBS seats from 50 to 100 at NKP Salve Instt. of Medical Sciences, Nagpur.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (24<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) for grant of permission for increase of MBBS seats from 50 to 100 at NKP Salve Instt. of Medical Sciences, Nagpur.

The Executive Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report (Jan.,2001) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to issue Letter of Permission for increase of MBBS seats from 50 to 100 at N.K.P. Salve Institute of Medical Sciences, Nagpur u/s 10A of the I.M.C. Act,1956 for the academic session 2001-2002.

**34. Increase of MBBS seats from 70 to 100 at Goa Medical College, Goa.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (22<sup>nd</sup> & 23<sup>rd</sup> July, 2001) for increase of MBBS seats from (70 to 100) at Goa Medical College, Goa.

The Executive Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (22<sup>nd</sup> & 23<sup>rd</sup> July, 2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report (August,2000) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to issue Letter of Permission for increase of MBBS seats from 70 to 100 at Goa Medical College, Goa u/s 10A of the I.M.C. Act,1956 for the academic session 2001-2002.

**35. MBBS (Sardar Patel University) – Continuance of recognition in respect of students being trained at Pramukh Swami Medical College, Karamsad.**

Read : The periodical inspection report (30<sup>th</sup> & 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2001) for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Sardar Patel University in respect of students being trained at Pramukh Swami Medical College, Karamsad.

The Executive Committee considered the periodical inspection report (30<sup>th</sup> & 31<sup>st</sup> March,2001) of Pramukh Swami Medical College, Karamsad carried out for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Sardar Patel University and decided to send the same for obtaining the observations of the University on the remarks made in the inspection report.

**36. MBBS (NTR University of Health Sciences) – Continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Andhra Medical College, Vishakhapatnam.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (11<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the periodical inspection report (Feb., 1999) of Andhra Medical College, Vishakhapatnam for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by NTR University of Health Sciences.

The Executive Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (11<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the periodical inspection report (Feb., 1999) and decided to recommend that MBBS degree granted by N.T.R. University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, A.P., in respect of students being trained at Andhra Medical College, Vishakhapatnam be continued with an annual intake of 150 ( one hundred and fifty) students.

**37. MBBS (NTR University of Health Sciences) – Continuance of recognition in respect of students being trained at Guntur Medical College, Guntur.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (10<sup>th</sup> & 11<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the periodical inspection report (April,1999) of Guntur Medical College, Guntur for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by NTR University of Health Sciences.

The Executive Committee noted that periodical inspection for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by NTR University of Health Sciences was carried out by the Council in April,1999. From the inspection report it was noted that the college is admitting 150 students since 1993-94 whereas the sanctioned intake capacity of the college as per records available in the Council office is 125 students. It was also noted that a letter was received from the Secretary, State Govt. of A.P. intimating that on 1975-76 the sanctioned intake capacity of Guntur Medical College was 150 students annually. However admission capacity was reduced to 125 students by the State Govt. voluntarily in 1996-97 after taking into consideration the General Circular of the MCI wherein all the State Govt.'s were requested to reduce the admission capacity of their medical colleges keeping in view the unemployment situation relating to medical Graduates which was prevailing at that time. He had further informed that the seats were reduced at the request of the MCI and not because of any recommendations of the MCI in pursuance of any inspection report of the Council. During 1993 the State Govt.

reviewed the question of restoration of seats through the original sanctioned intake capacity of the college, vide G.O. dated 27.3.93.

The above inspection report was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 16.6.1999 wherein the committee noting the shortage of teaching staff, beds in the hospital and other teaching facilities in terms of space, library, hostel, laboratory operation theatre, equipment etc. gave three months time to the institution to comply with the deficiencies and send a compliance report for further consideration in the matter. The Committee also decided that the State Govt. be advised to amend the recruitment rules for appointment of teachers in medical college as per Council regulations and separate the teaching cadre from non-teaching cadre.

The Committee further considered the compliance verification inspection report (10<sup>th</sup> & 11<sup>th</sup> July,2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report (April,99) and noted the following deficiencies of staff and other infrastructural facilities for 150 admissions:-

1. Staff:

- a) Associate Professor – 2 (Anatomy-1, Radiology – 1)
- b) Assistant Professor – 2 (Anatomy –1, Lecturer in Biophysics- 1)
- c) Tutor/Sr. Resident – 10( Anatomy –1, Pharmacology –4, Forensic Medicine –1, P.S.M. – 3)
- d) Jr. Residents – 5 (Surgery – 3, Orthopaedics – 2).

Total 19.

- 2. The college is running postgraduate courses in almost all the subjects. Additional staff required for running postgraduate courses in Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry, Pharmacology, Pathology, Microbiology and Forensic Medicine is not appointed.
- 3. Composition of Units – Medicine Unit IV, V, VI are having two Sr. teachers instead of three. Paediatric Unit II is having one Sr. Teacher only.
- 4. Journals are not subscribed in the central library due to non availability of funds.
- 5. Microfilm reading facilities are not available.

6. There is shortage of accommodation in ladies hostel. Construction work of ladies hostel though started but it will be completed in 6 to 9 months as reported in the inspection report.
7. There is shortage of rooms for interns.
8. Pathology and Microbiology laboratories needs upgradation with equipment.
9. Incinerator is not functional.
10. Auditorium and lecture theatres are used for conducting examination. No separate examination hall is available.
11. Mortuary cooler is not in working condition.
12. Departmentwise deficiencies:
  - a) Anatomy Department:
    - Histology practical laboratory is having 75 seats instead of 90.
  - b) Physiology Department:
    - Each practical laboratory does not have the required number of seats i.e. 90 seats.
    - Haemacology practical laboratory does not have required number of microscopes and provision for artificial light.
  - c) Biochemistry Department:

Biochemistry practical laboratory is having 38 seats instead of 90 as required.
  - d) Pharmacology Department:
    - Experimental Pharmacology lab. is having 40 seats instead of 90 and clinical pharmacology/pharmacy practical laboratory is having 60 seats instead of 90. Experimental pharmacology lab. is shared by PSM department.
  - e) Pathology Department:
    - Both the Histology and Clinical Pathology laboratories are having 75 seats instead of 90 as required.

- The institution has not yet developed demonstration room.

f) Microbiology Department:

- Practical laboratory is having 50 seats instead of 90.

g) PSM Department:

The department does not have its own laboratory.

13. In hospital clinical laboratory there is no arrangement to carry out any emergency investigations for 24 hours.

14. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Committee decided to grant 3 months time to the institution to comply with the above deficiencies and send a compliance to that effect for further consideration in the matter.

**38. Continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Karnatak University, Dharwad in respect of students being trained at AL-Ameen Medical College, Bijapur.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report(10<sup>th</sup> & 11<sup>th</sup> July, 2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report (Feb., 2000) of Al-Ameen Medical College, Bijapur for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Karnatak University, Dharwad.

The Executive Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (10<sup>th</sup> & 11<sup>th</sup> July,2001) carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report (Feb.,2000) and decided to recommend that MBBS degree granted by Karnatak University, Dharwad in respect of students being trained at Al-Ameen Medical College, Bijapur be continued with an annual intake of 100 (one hundred) students.

**39. To consider the compliance verification inspection report of Mysore Medical College, Mysore carried out on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the Council Inspectors report (Oct., 1996).**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> July, 2001) of Mysore Medical College, Mysore carried out on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the Council Inspectors report (11<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> April,2000).

The Executive Committee noted that inspection of Mysore Medical College, Mysore carried out by the Council Inspectors in April,2000 was to assess the facilities available at the college for 100 annual admissions for which the college is approved. The inspection report was considered by it at its meeting held on 26.5.2001 wherein the Committee after noting the gross deficiencies in staff decided to obtain the information pertaining to admissions made to postgraduate courses/being run at the college.

The inspection report along with the above information received from the college authorities was considered by it at its meeting held on 24.07.2000. In view of the deficiencies of staff and other infrastructural facilities, it decided to give 3 months time to the institution to comply with the deficiencies and send a compliance to that effect for further consideration of the matter.

The Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> July, 2001) carried out on receipt of the compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the Inspection report (April,2000) and noted that the institution has only complied with the deficiency pointed out in the department of Anatomy regarding the mortuary cooler and museum. Rest of the deficiencies as stated below pointed out in the inspection report of April,2000 have not been rectified:-

1. The staff shortage at present is as under:

Assoc. Prof./Reader- 6: (Physiology-1, PSM-1, Microbiology-1,Psychiatry-1, Anesthesia-1, Radiology-1 and Dentistry-1).

Asstt.Prof./Lecturer – 6: (Anatomy-1, Biophysics-1, Pharmaceutical Chemistry-1, Epidemiology-1, Statistics-1, TB & Chest-1)

Tutor/Demonstrator/Resident– 12: (Anatomy-1, Physiology-1, Biochem.-2, Pharmacology-3, Microbiology-1, PSM-1, Psychiatry-1, Radiology-1, Dentistry-1)

Total Shortage: 25 out of 183, i.e. 13%.

3. The number of teaching beds available are in excess of required number for 100 annual admissions. As such, the composition of teaching unit is not as per Council norms. Either the number of teaching beds are reduced or the teaching staff is increased proportionately as per the requirement of the Council.
4. OPD space is very short and OPD chambers are not properly equipped for satisfactory patient examination. Proper washing facilities are also not available. The teaching areas are also very small.

There is nobody to control the movement of patients within the OPD.

5. Proper audiometry room in the department of ENT has not been provided as yet, only space is available.
6. The work on Animal House has yet to begin, as the old one is in the process of demolition.
7. Casualty section is not properly organized or equipped. Only CMO duty roaster was available. The CMO on duty did not know the specialist on call on a particular day as no such information was available in the Casualty. There was hardly any emergency measures available, even disaster trolley and oxygen were not available.
8. The demonstration room, both pathology and microbiology are very small and can accommodate at the most 15-20 students. Even these demonstration rooms are not separate and independent.
9. Urban health centre as provided for the Department of PSM is not under the control of the HOD/ Principal of the institution.
10. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to grant 3 months time to the institution to comply with the deficiencies and send the compliance to that effect for further consideration of the matter.

**40. MBBS (Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam) – Continuance of recognition in respect of students being trained at Medical College, Kottayam.**

Read : The compliance report received from the Principal, Medical College, Kottayam on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the Council inspectors report (Nov.,2000) for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam.

The Executive Committee considered the compliance report received from the Principal, Medical College, Kottayam on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the Council inspectors report (Nov.,2000) and noted that the following deficiencies still persist :-

1. Staff shortage:

Professor – 1 (Radiology)

Associate Prof. – 5 ( Anatomy-1, Pathology-3, PSM-1)



Lecturer – 6 : (Biophysics –1, Pharmacology-1, Pathology-1, PSM –1,  
Epidemiology (PSM)-1, Radiology –1)  
Tutors – 7: Physiology –3, Pathology –4)

2. Teaching beds in the departments of Skin, Orthopaedics, ENT units are less than the Council norms. Adequate supervision by PSM Department both at Urban Health Training Centre and Rural Health Training Centre has not been provided.
3. Adequate residential accommodation for interns has not been provided as yet.
4. Defects of infrastructural facilities in para clinical departments are yet to be fully rectified.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to grant 3 months time to the institution to comply with the deficiencies and send the compliance to that effect for further consideration of the matter.

**41. MBBS (The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University) – Continuance of recognition in respect of students being trained at PSG Instt. of Medical Sciences, Coimbatore.**

Read : The compliance verification inspection report (14<sup>th</sup> & 15<sup>th</sup> June, 2001) of PSG Instt. of Medical Sciences, Coimbatore carried out on receipt of compliance on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the periodical inspection report (July, 1999) for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai.

The Executive Committee considered the compliance verification inspection report (14<sup>th</sup> & 15<sup>th</sup> June,2001) and noted that this is the second compliance verification inspection carried out after the periodical inspection which was conducted on 21<sup>st</sup> & 22<sup>nd</sup> July,1999. From the compliance verification inspection report now carried out on 14<sup>th</sup> & 15<sup>th</sup> June,2001 it observed that the following deficiencies are still existing:-

1. The office space for teaching staff in pre and para clinical departments is not upto the required level at present. Most of the rooms are small or shared by more than 2-3 staff members. Some of these offices are placed in an open space. As per the college authorities this will be rectified after completion of second block of the building within one year.
2. The institution is still not in a position to conduct medico-legal postmortems. The students for this purpose are taken to the Govt. Medical College Hospital, Coimbatore.

3. The situation of shortage of residential quarters still persists as observed earlier i.e. there are only 36 quarters for the teaching staff.
4. In the wards some of the beds are placed very close to each other and the beds are not numbered. They should be spaced out properly for better functioning.
5. Other observations/deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to grant 3 months time to the institution to comply with the deficiencies and send the compliance to that effect for further consideration of the matter.

**42. MBBS (Amravati University) – Continuance of recognition in respect of students being trained at Dr. Panjabrao Alias Bhusaheb Deshmukh Memorial Medical College, Amravati.**

Read : The compliance report received from the Dean, Dr. Panjabrao Alias Bhusaheb Deshmukh Memorial Medical College, Amravati on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report (Nov., 2000) for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Amravati University).

The Executive Committee considered the compliance report received from the Dean, Dr. Punjabrao Alias Bhusaheb Deshmukh Memorial Medical College, Amravati on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the Council Inspectors report carried out on 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> Nov.,2000 and noted the following:-

1. Though the average bed occupancy as well as OPD attendance as informed by the Dean of the college is rising steadily, however exact number or percentage monthwise has not been given in the compliance.
2. Regarding construction of hospital only R.C.C. structure of two wards of 60 beds have been completed. There is no mention of the construction of 4 OT's.
3. Though incinerator, x-ray machine of 500 MA and USG with colour doppler has been purchased but has not been installed as yet.
4. The following staff deficiencies remain the same as the teaching posts have only been advertised:-
  1. Readers – 4 : (Anatomy – 2, Forensic Medicine-1, Anaes.-1).
  2. Lecturers – 3: (Anatomy –2, Forensic Medicine –1).
  3. Junior Resident – 1: (Psychiatry –1).

In the department of Biochemistry the entire staff is non-medical except one Demonstrator.

In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to grant 3 months time to the institution to comply with the deficiencies and send the compliance to that effect for further consideration of the matter.

**43. MBBS (Karnatak University) – Continuance of recognition of MBBS degree in respect of students being trained at B. M. Patil Medical College, Bijapur – Request of the Principal to grant 3 months time to remove the deficiencies pointed out in the periodical inspection report.**

Read : The letter dated 28/6/2001 received from the Principal, Shri B.M. Patil Medical College, Bijapur submitting therewith the compliance report on rectification of the deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report (Feb., 2000) and requesting to grant 3 months time to remove all the deficiencies.

The Executive Committee considered the letter dated 28.6.2001 received from the Principal, Shri B.M. Patil Medical College, Bijapur and decided to give three months time to the institution as requested to remove all the deficiencies pointed out in the Council Inspectors report (Feb.,2000) and send a compliance to that effect for further consideration.

**44. To consider the letter dt.30/4/2001 received from the Secretary, Govt. of Bihar, Department of Health (Medical Education, Family Welfare and Indigenous Medicine), Patna requesting to grant time upto 31<sup>st</sup> Dec., 2001 for sending the compliance report in respect of medical colleges in Bihar.**

Read : The letter dated 30/4/2001 from Shri Afzal Amanullah, Secretary, Govt. of Bihar, requesting to grant time upto 31<sup>st</sup> Dec., 2001 for removal of deficiencies pointed out in the periodical inspection report of the medical colleges in Bihar.

The Executive Committee considered the letter dated 30/4/2001 received from Shri Afzal Amanullah, Secretary, Govt. of Bihar, Patna and decided to grant time upto 31<sup>st</sup> Dec.,2001 as requested for removal of the deficiencies pointed out in the periodical inspection report of the medical colleges in Bihar.

**45. To grant Registration to Dr. Murad Rahman u/s 25(1) and 13(3) of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956.**

Read : The matter with regard to grant of registration to Dr. Murad Rahman u/s 25(1) of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee decided to defer the consideration of the matter.

**46. To change the name of Donetsk State Medical University to Donetsk Gorky State Medical University.**

Read : The change of name of Donetsk State Medical University to Donetsk Gorky State Medical University.

The Executive Committee noted the change of name of Donetsk State Medical University to Donetsk Gorky State Medical University.

**47. Practice of allopathic medicine and surgery by practitioners of other systems of medicines – Regarding.**

Read : The matter with regard to practice of allopathic medicine and surgery by practitioners of other systems of medicines.

The Executive Committee considered the letter dated 20.4.2001 received from Dr. Y.M. Salmani, President, Homoeopathy Surgeons Association of India, Azamgarh and noted that as per provision of Section 15 of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956, no person other than a medical practitioner enrolled on a State Medical Register or given provisional registration u/s 25 shall practice medicine in any State. Any person who acts in contravention of this provision shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to one year, or with fine which may extend to one thousand rupees or with both.

The Committee further noted that the Hon'ble Supreme Court in its judgement in the case of Smt. Poonam Verma –vs- Ashwin Patel decided that practice of allopathic medicine by a Homeopathic practitioner, without the knowledge of that system is quackery. Hence, the Committee decided not to allow practice of surgery by practitioners of other system of medicine.

**48. Additional name of Hospitals recognised by the Council for purposes of compulsory rotating internship training – Information thereon.**

Read : The additional name of Hospitals recognised by the Council for purposes of compulsory rotating internship training.

The Executive Committee noted the additional name of hospitals recognised by the Council for purposes of Compulsory Rotating Internship Training as under:-

**49. Standard requirement of Medical Council of India in relation to appointment of teaching staff in Medical Colleges – Extension of honorary system existing in medical colleges.**

Read : The letter dated 17/5/2001 received from the Central Govt., Ministry of Health & F.W. with regard to extension of system of appointment of Honorary/Part time teachers in medical colleges for a further period of one year i.e. upto 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2002.

The Executive committee noted the letter No. V.11025/41/95-ME(UG), dated 17.5.2001, received from the Central Govt., Ministry of Health & F.W. with regard to extension of system of appointment of Honorary/Part time teachers in medical colleges for a further period of one year i.e. upto 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2002.

**50. Via Media & Communications.**

Read : The matter with regard to extension of services provided by M/s Via Media & Communications to the Council office.

The Executive Committee noted that the Council at its meeting held on 14.2.2001 decided that the office may utilise the services of M/s Via Media & Communications at a charge of Rs. 15,000/- per month on a trial basis for a period of six months to begin with which may be extended further if the services provided by the organisation are satisfactory.

The Committee decided to extend the services provided by M/s Via Medical & Communications for a further period of six months w.e.f. 01.10.2001. The Committee further decided that the report of the services provided may be sent to the members of the Committee for their perusal.

**51. Extension in service to Dr. J.K. Tandon and Dr. R.D. Bansal as Whole Time Inspector on consolidated salary.**

Read : The matter with regard to grant of extension in service to Dr. J.K. Tandon and Dr. R.D. Bansal beyond their current term upto 31/7/2001 and 30/9/2001 respectively.

The Executive Committee considered the matter with regard to grant of extension in service to Dr. J.K. Tandon and Dr. R.D. Bansal, Whole-Time Inspectors of the Council beyond their current term upto 31.7.2001 and 30.9.2001 respectively and decided to extend their services in the Council office as under:-

Dr. J.K. Tandon	-	w.e.f. 01.08.2001 for a further period of six months.
Dr. R.D. Bansal	-	w.e.f. 01.10.2001 for a further period of one year.

**Office Note:**

The Committee directed the office to widely publicize the post of Whole-time Inspector by giving advertisements in the leading dailies particularly of south and north east areas of the country as the proper applications are not being received for this post because of which Council is unable to select any suitable candidate.

**52. Recognition of MBBS degree granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore for the purpose of its inclusion in the Ist Schedule to the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read : The letter dated 2<sup>nd</sup> August,2001 received from the Govt. of India, Ministry of Health & F.W. forwarding therewith a copy of letter of Registrar, Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Karnataka for recognition of MBBS degree granted by the said university for the purpose of its inclusion in the Ist Schedule to the IMC Act, 1956.

The Committee noted that Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences came into existence from 1<sup>st</sup> June, 1996 as per Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences Act, 1994. Consequent to the establishment of this new Health University, following medical colleges previously affiliated to the University of Mysore, Karnatak, Bangalore, Gulbarga & Kuvempu are deemed to be affiliated to the Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences.

The Committee further noted that 1<sup>st</sup> batch of students admitted under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences in 1996-97 had appeared in the final MBBS examination held by the Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences in May/June, 2001.

As MBBS degree granted by Mysore, Karnataka, Bangalore, Gulbarga & Kuvempu University in respect of colleges affiliated to these University are already recognised & included in the first scheduled to the IMC Act 1956, the Committee decided to recommend that MBBS degree granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences be recognized and included in the first scheduled in the IMC Act, 1956 being change of affiliation of the University keeping in view the following decision taken by the Executive Committee at its meeting held in June, 1988:-

"No inspection is required where there is change of name and change of affiliation of the University or the College whose medical qualifications are already recognised and included in the first scheduled to the IMC Act, 1956, unless the Executive Committee decides otherwise."

The Executive Committee further noted that as per procedure its recommendations have to be placed before the General Body of the Council for consideration & approval. Since the first batch of students who appeared in the final MBBS examination held by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences in

May/June, 2001 are required to get provisional registration for starting their internship, the Committee decided to take the approval of the members of the Council by circulation.

**53. Increase of MBBS seats from 100 to 150 at Rangaraya Medical College, Kakinada – Renewal of permission for admission of 5<sup>th</sup> batch of students against the increased intake.**

The Executive Committee noted that the inspection for Rangaraya Medical College, Kakinada for renewal of permission for admission of 5<sup>th</sup> batch of students during 2001-2002 against the increased intake i.e. 100 to 150 was carried out by the Council Inspectors on 30<sup>th</sup> & 31<sup>st</sup> July,2001 and the inspection report is awaited from the Inspectors.

The Committee authorised the Chairman to decide in the matter on receipt of the inspection report.

**54. Eligibility criteria to be adopted in respect of Indian students who have obtained foreign medical qualifications from Russia and other CIS countries.**

Read : Central Govt., Ministry of Health & F.W. letter No. V.11025/3/2001-ME(P), dated 19<sup>th</sup> July,2001 wherein the Govt. has decided to extend the facility of eligibility condition for admission to medical course as per provisions of the notification dated 10.5.1999 to all the students who have completed their medical degree from recognised institutions abroad after 10.5.1999 and are otherwise eligible for registration.

The Executive Committee noted that the Registration & Equivalence Committee at its meeting held on 2.8.2001 had perused the letter dated 19.07.2001 of the Central Govt. wherein it was intimated that a number of references from VIPs had been received by the Ministry along with the representations of students including that of Dr. Mohammad Ajaz who have obtained their medical degrees from CIS countries for their registration with Medical Council of India where the students have been denied registration by the Council as they did not fulfil the minimum eligibility criteria for admission to medical courses prevailing prior to the notification of the Graduate Medical Education (Amendment) Regulations,1999 dated 10.5.1999. These students have further represented that they have become eligible for registration as per the relaxation in the eligibility criteria provided in the amended regulations modified on 19.5.1999. The Ministry has further informed that considering all the aspects, it has been decided with the approval of the HFM that since the changes in the eligibility conditions for admission to medical courses were made after due consideration of the provisions of the notification dated 19.5.1999 the same may be extended to all the students who have completed their medical degrees from recognised institutions abroad but are otherwise eligible for registration. The Committee further noted that



the Central Govt. had requested the Council to consider request of registration of such category of candidates for granting them registration if they are fulfilling the above criteria and are otherwise eligible for registration.

The Committee further noted that these representations pertained to OBC candidates who were refused registration by the Medical Council of India in light of the fact that these students had undergone their MD(General Physician) qualification from the recognised CIS countries prior to the amendment mentioned above came into existence.

The Committee also noted the modification in the regulation quoted as under:-

“[5] Procedure for selection to MBBS course be as follows:-

(i) In case of admission on the basis of qualifying examination under clause (1) based on merit, a candidate for admission to MBBS course must have passed in the subjects of Physics, Chemistry, Biology & English individually and must have obtained a minimum of 50% marks taken together in Physics, Chemistry and Biology at the qualifying examination as mentioned in clause (2) of regulation 4. In respect of candidates belonging to SC,ST and OBCs, the marks obtained in Physics, Chemistry and Biology taken together in qualifying examination be 40% instead of 50% as above.

The Executive Committee considered the above facts and decided to approve the recommendations of the Registration & Equivalence Committee recommending that the changed regulations with regard to eligibility for OBC candidates may also be extended to the candidates who had sought admission to the recognised medical institutions in CIS countries prior to the amendment came into existence and registration to such category of candidates be granted.
