The Executive Committee of the Council noted the action taken on the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting held on 15th December, 2009.

3. Pending items arising out of the decisions taken by the Executive Committee.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council noted that there is no pending items arising out of the decisions taken by the Executive Committee as on date.

It was decided that a Sub-Committee comprising of Dr. Muzaffar Ahmed and Dr. Nirbhay Srivastav, Members, Executive Committee be constituted to go through the minutes of the Executive Committee from the year 2007 for screening the pending items.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that no Letters of Intent/Letter of Permission /renewal of permission for establishment of new Medical Colleges/ increase of seats in 1st MBBS course for the academic session 2009-2010 are issued by the Govt. of India.

- There is deficiency of 2 teaching beds in Paediatrics & 9 teaching beds in General Surgery.
 - There is deficiency of 1 clinical unit in the department of Gen.Surgery.
 - The female beds of Psychiatry and Dermatology have been placed in the female medical ward.
4. OPD :-Space for teaching area is not available in the OPDs of major departments like Medicine. Surgery, Paediatrics, Obstetrics & Gynaecology and Orthopaedics. Each speciality is not provided teaching area for students. Audiometry room is non sound proof and non AC.

5. Ward:- There is no pantry, examination / procedure room, teaching area and side laboratory are available in the Ward. No clinical demonstration areas have been provided in the wards. There is no seminar hall in the major departments. Nursing stations are not located centrally with the result that the patients cannot be observed properly.
6. At RHTC, no lecturer cum medical officer having M.D.{P.S.M.} is available L.M.O. is not available. Hostel is not available. Lecture hall cum seminar room is not available. Antenatal and immunization services are not provided at the center. The labour room is not available. Investigation facilities for basic investigation, X-ray & ECG are not available. Family welfare activities are not regularly carried out. Activities under the national programmes are not carried out.

U.H.C. is not available.

7. Casualty: No doctor was available in the casualty on the day of inspection. There is no ventilator in the casualty.
8. Operation Theatre: Insufficient equipment is available in the major operation theatres.
9. Intensive Care: ICCU is not available. The number of beds available in NICU & PICU are not as per MCI norms.
10. Radiological facilities: There is one mobile x-ray unit as against the requirement of two.
11. The institute having two lecture theatres are not air conditioned. One lecture theatre of 250 capacity has been constructed which is unfurnished.
12. Hostel facilities are inadequate for UG students and Resident doctors and nursing staff and insufficient furniture. Hostel rooms are partially furnished.
13. Residential quarters for teaching staff are 16 as against the requirement of 18 and for non-teaching staff are nil as against the requirement of 32.
14. The animal house is non-functional.
15. The following deficiencies were observed in the infrastructure of para-clinical departments:-

Pharmacology:

- No separate departmental museum is provided.
- Experimental Pharmacology laboratory which is shared with amphibian lab has capacity of 60.
- Clinical Pharmacology & Pharmacy laboratory shared with biochemistry lab.

Pathology:

- Hispathology laboratory is shared with histology lab of Anatomy.
- Clinical Pathology/Haematology laboratory is shared with physiology deptt.
- Service laboratory for histopathology, cytopathology and haematology work are not available in the department.
- The museum has insufficient specimens.
- Nil catalogues are available.

Microbiology:

- There is no provision for artificial light.
- Service laboratories for serology, virology, parasitology, mycology and tuberculosis are available but not equipped.
- The museum is not available.

Forensic Medicine:

- Museum has no mounted/unmounted specimens.
- Mortuary is not available.
- Student's laboratory not available.

Community Medicine:

- There is no practical lab.
- Museum is not available.

16. In the clinical departments, teachers are not provided adequate space to sit and work after the OPD hours. Teaching areas are not provided in OPD and wards. Departmental libraries have nil books.

17. Other deficiencies/remarks are pointed out in the main report.

In view of the above, the members of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2nd batch of MBBS students for the academic year 2010-2011 at Hind Institute of Medical Sciences, Barabanki, Uttar Pradesh.

8. Travancore Medical College, Kollam - Renewal of permission for admission of 2nd batch of students for the academic session 2010-2011.

Read: The Council Inspectors report (16th & 17th December, 2009) for renewal of permission for admission of 2nd batch of students for the academic session 2010-2011 at Travancore Medical College, Kollam.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Inspectors report (16th & 17th December 2009) and noted the following :

One Internal Examiner in the subject of General Surgery was replaced by another during the course of examination.

Thus uniformity in assessment was not maintained.

2. In the Subject of OBG , the patients were not allotted for short cases , but only history and examination findings were given to the candidates and questions were asked. Thus all the candidates were examined without actual patients.
3. In the Medicine and Surgery examination halls, the patients couches were arranged so closely to each other, that privacy for patients and for candidates were not maintained. Difficulties were observed in examining Female patients in open without proper coverings.

Copy of the letter be also marked to Secretary (Medical Education), DME of the concerned State Govt., Registrar of the University to which the college is affiliated and also to the member of MCI representing the State where the college is located.

32. Continuance of recognition of MBBS Degree granted by Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik in respect of students being trained at Seth G.S. Medical College, Mumbai .

Read: The compliance verification inspection report (29th & 30th December 2009) for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik in respect of students being trained at Seth G.S. Medical College, Mumbai .

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (29th & 30th December 2009) along with Council Inspectors

reports (12th & 13th Jan.,2007, 23rd & 24th January,2008) and observed that deficiencies are still persisting as under:-

1. (a) The shortage of teaching faculty is 23.34% as under:-

- i) Professor 3 (Forensic Medicine-1, Orthopedics - 1, Dentistry -1)
- ii) Associate Professor 9 (Pathology - 4, Forensic Medicine - 2, Psychiatry - 1, ENT = 1, Dentistry = 1)
- iii) Assistant Professor 57 (Pathology -2, Lecturer in Epidemiology - 1, Lecturer in Statistics - 1, Medicine -8, TB and Chest- 3, Psychiatry - 1, Pediatrics - 2, Surgery - 14, Orthopedics -4, Obs & Gyn - 18, ANMO- 1, MWO -, Radiology -1)
- iv) Tutor 5 (Biochemistry - 1, Pathology - 1, Forensic Medicine- 3)

(b) The shortage of Residents is 23.03% as under :-

- i) Sr. Resident 37 (Medicine - 8, Surgery - 7, Ophthalmology -2, Obs Gyn - 3, Radiology - 7, Anesthesia -10)
- ii) Jr. Resident 01 (ENT - 1)

2. Wards:- Most of the wards are overcrowded. The space between two cots is not adequate. Designated teaching area is still not available in some of the wards.

3. RHTC, Khardi is under the control of State Government of Maharashtra and the college utilizes its facilities for teaching purposes which is not as per Council norms. Students are not posted at RHTC. Mess facilities are not available.

4. The Director has given a letter which states the following

-“PHC, Khardi is under direct control of the State government through the Directorate of Health Services. The PSM department of the institute is administratively under the Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai, which is a constitutional affiliate of the State Government.

-the undergraduate students visit the PHC and are imparted training there. However, they are not residentially posted at Khardi. “

The Director of the college has requested the Govt. of Maharashtra to hand over the PHC Khardi to Municipal Corporation. The reply from the Government is awaited.

5. Some of the hostel rooms provide dormitory type of accommodation for 7-8 students in one room which is not as per norms. At present, Anand Niketan hostel is having 5 dormitory type rooms, where 7 students per room are accommodated. Total accommodation is for 35 students. The Director informed that new hostel building having 21 storeys is under construction and expected date of completion is Dec 2010.

6. Outdoor and Indoor registration section are not computerized. ICD IX classification of diseases is followed instead of ICD X for indexing. Follow up services are not available. Outdoor and indoor registration sections are NOT computerized. ICD IX classification of diseases is followed instead of ICD X for indexing of diseases. Book for ICD X classification is not available. Follow up service is not available. Institution is a very old one and running several postgraduate courses. Hence, there is an immediate need of computerization of all the records. MRD needs to be upgraded and computerized.

7. Labor room is under renovation. At present, make shift arrangement has been made for labor room. There are 6 labor tables. No separate arrangement for septic and eclampsia patients is available. Deficiency persists.
8. Blood bank license for whole blood and cell components is valid upto Dec 2006 and steps are being taken for getting the license renewed.
9. Operation theatre: Post op recovery beds are not available in OT area. Patients are transferred either to surgical ICU or wards depending upon their conditions. There is no post op ward outside the OT area. CCTV is not available.
10. Renovation work is in progress in many departments. All departments should have 2 demonstration rooms, each having capacity for 75-100 students.
11. Other deficiencies/observations as pointed out in the inspection report.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council further observed that the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council at its meeting held on 02.02.2008 while considering the inspection report of the institute (23rd & 24th January,2008) had decided to give two months time to the authorities of Seth G.S. Medical College, Mumbai to rectify the deficiencies and submit the compliance within the stipulated period. The aforesaid decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the college authorities on 21.02.2008.

In reference to the above, the Principal of the college submitted the compliance vide letter dated 19.04.2008 & 01.11.2008 which was verified by the Council by way of an inspection on 29th & 30th Dec.,2009.

In view of above and as the gross deficiencies of teaching faculty, residents, non-teaching staff & infrastructure are still persisting, the members of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to issue a show cause notice to the authorities of Seth G.S. Medical College, Mumbai as to why the recognition for the award of MBBS degree should not be withdrawn u/s 19 of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the institute be asked to submit its compliance within a period of 2 months. Copy of the letter be also marked to Secretary (Medical Education), DME of the concerned State Govt., Registrar of the University to which the college is affiliated and also to the member of MCI representing the State where the college is located.

33. Admissions of excess students under Management quota at Index Medical College & Hospital & Research Centre, Indore for the academic year 2009-10.

Read: The matter with regard to admissions of excess students under Management quota at Index Medical College & Hospital & Research Centre, Indore for the academic year 2009-10.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council noted the list of 1st year MBBS students received from the Index Medical College & Hospital & Research Centre, Indore vide letter dated 16.12.2009 and observed that Index Medical College & Hospital & Research Centre, Indore has admitted excess students under Management quota for the academic year 2009-10 as under:-

Read: The matter with regard to Admissions of excess students under Management quota at AMC MET Medical College, Ahmedabad for the academic year 2009-10.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council observed that the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 15.12.2009 while considering the matter with regard to admissions of excess students under Management quota at AMC MET Medical College, Ahmedabad for the academic year 2009-10 had decided as under:-

“The members of the Executive Committee of the Council noted the list of students received from the Dean, AMC MET Medical College, Ahmedabad vide letter dated 09.11.2009 and observed that AMC MET Medical College, Ahmedabad has admitted excess students under Management quota for the academic year 2009-10 as under:-

It was further noted that the college authorities have submitted another list of students vide its letter dated 17.12.2009 wherein it was stated as under:-

“.....as per Gujarat Professional Medical Educational, Colleges or Institutions (Regulation of Admission and Fixation of Fees) Act, 2007, 75% (Seventy Five Percent) seats falls under Govt. seats and remaining 25% falls under Management seats including 15% NRI seats. We fill up only 15% of total intake as NRI seats, all remaining seats including Govt. seats and 10% Management seats is filled by admission committee for professional medical education courses formed by the State Government.”

In view of above, the members of the Executive Committee of the Council noted that the college has admitted all the students within the ratio fixed by the State Govt. and decided to recall the letter issued by the Council.

36. Discharge of 1st Year MBBS students who have been found not eligible in terms of Regulation 5(5)(ii) as prescribed in the Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997 and admitted at Sree Narayana Instt. Of Medical Sciences, Chalaka for the Academic Year 2009-2010.

40. Information regarding various cases pending against Maharaji Educational Trust running Santosh Medical College at 1, Santosh Nagar, Pratap Vihar, Ghaziabad (U.P.)

Read: The matter with regard to information regarding various cases pending against Maharaji Educational Trust running Santosh Medical College at 1, Santosh Nagar, Pratap Vihar, Ghaziabad (U.P.).

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council noted that the Council office has received a letter dated 14.12.2009 from Shri Rajinder Paul, Regional Chief, Housing and Urban Development Corporation Limited, New Delhi informing regarding various cases pending against Maharaji Educational Trust running Santosh Medical College at 1, Santosh Nagar, Pratap Vihar, Ghaziabad (U.P.) and decided that the explanation/comments of the college be sought in the matter.

41. Minutes of the Registration and the Equivalence Committee meeting held on 18.09.2009 & 13.11.2009 – Approval.

Read: The Minutes of the Registration and the Equivalence Committee meeting held on 18.09.2009 & 13.11.2009.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council approved the minutes of the Registration and the Equivalence Committee meeting held on 18.09.2009 & 13.11.2009.

42. Upgradation of the posts of Deputy Director (Academic Cell).

Read: The matter with regard to upgradation of the posts of Deputy Director (Academic Cell).

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council noted that the Committee at its meeting held on 08.10.2009 had decided that as the scope and magnitude of the work of the Academic Cell of the Council is likely to increase manifolds because of the implementation of the recommendations of the Academic Cell, hence, two posts of Deputy Director (Academic Cell) on a consolidated salary of Rs.45,000/- per month be created.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council taking stock of the fact that the Academic Cell of the Council is required to ensure continuous and periodic update of the various syllabi of the courses at all levels of medical education namely undergraduate, postgraduate and super speciality through 72 Board of Specialities that have been constituted and also monitor the national faculty development programme through 10 Regional Centres and institutional workshops for the same through Medical Education Units of all the medical colleges in the country, the workload has increased substantially. The tasks assigned to the Academic Cell are required to be completed in a time bound manner. The existing staff with the Academic Cell is unable to cope with the existing workload at hand. The tasks with the Academic Cell that are in the pipeline include formulation of integrated problem based curriculum for undergraduate, competency based curriculum for postgraduate and super speciality courses, incorporation of the module of e.learning including virtual teaching techniques and simulation usage under the digital approach to medical education scheme which would require additional personnel with required expertise for its timely completion.

As such, it is imperative that the services of the concerned experts/consultants are required to be made available towards effective discharge of the expanding tasks and functions entrusted to it.

The Committee therefore, decided that two more Consultants be appointed on a consolidated salary of Rs. 50,000/- per month in case the incumbent is superannuated in the Professor/Director-Professor Grade. However, if the incumbent is in an ongoing employment in the grade of Professor/Director-Professor, his/her last pay drawn would be protected with a notional increment to begin with. He/she would also be entitled to the increments and other accruable financial benefits under the previous employment during the period of lien he/she holds on his/her parent employment.

The Committee after detailed deliberation and scrutinizing the Curriculum Vitae of senior faculty further decided that Dr. Nilima Shankar, Professor of Physiology, University College of Medical Sciences, Delhi and Brig (Dr) Vinay Rai, Dean, Army College of Medical Sciences, New Delhi be appointed as Consultants (Academic Cell).

It was further decided that the existing post of Director (Academic Cell) be redesignated as Chief Consultant to the Academic Cell on the terms and reference as have already been approved by the General Body of the Council.

The Minutes of this item were read out and confirmed in the meeting itself and it was decided that the decision be sent to the members of the General Body of the Council by circulation immediately for consideration and sending their decision within 10 days.

43. Amendment in Eligibility Criteria pertaining to the qualifying examination for entering into medical courses in Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997 – Reg.

Read: The matter with regard to Amendment in Eligibility Criteria pertaining to the qualifying examination for entering into medical courses in Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997 – Reg.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council noted that the Council vide letter No. MCI-34(41)/2009-Med/52433 dated 25.11.2009 had proposed the amendments with regard to amendments in Clause 4(2) of Chapter II pertaining to the Admission, Selection, Migration and Training of students of Medical Council of India Regulations on Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997. The Central Government was requested to accord approval u/s 33 of the IMC Act, 1956. The recommendation as communicated to Central Government vide letter dated 25.11.2009 reads as under:

“....The Members of the Executive Committee noted the existing Regulation 4 (2) of Chapter II pertaining to the Admission, Selection, Migration and Training of students of Medical Council of India Regulations on Graduate Medical Education, 1997, reads as under:-

“4. Admission to the Medical Course - Eligibility Criteria: No Candidate shall be allowed to be admitted to the Medical Curriculum proper of first Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) Course until:

(1)

(2) He/she has passed qualifying examination as under:

(a) The higher secondary examination or the Indian School Certificate Examination which is equivalent to 10+2 Higher Secondary Examination after a period of 12 years study, the last two years of study comprising of physics, Chemistry, Biology and Mathematics or any other elective subjects with English at a level not less than the core course for English as prescribed by the National Council for Educational Research and Training after the introduction of the 10+2+3 years educational structure as recommended by the National Committee on education.

Note: Where the course content is not as prescribed for 10+2 education structure of the National Committee, the candidates will have to undergo a period of one year pre-professional training before admission to the Medical colleges.

or

(b) The Intermediate examination in science of an Indian University/Board or other recognized examining body with Physics, Chemistry and Biology which shall include a practical test in these subjects and also English as a compulsory subject.

or

(c) The pre-professional/pre-medical examination with Physics, Chemistry and Biology, after passing either the higher secondary school examination, or the pre-university or an equivalent examination. The pre-professional/pre-medical examination shall include a practical test in Physics, Chemistry & Biology and also English as a compulsory subject.

or

(d) The first year of the three years degree course of a recognized university, with Physics, Chemistry and Biology including a practical test in these subjects provided the examination is a "University Examination" and candidate has passed 10+2 with English at a level not less than a core course.

or

(e) B.Sc examination of an Indian University, provided that he/she has passed the B.Sc examination with not less than two of the following subjects Physics, Chemistry, Biology (Botany, Zoology) and further that he/she has passed the earlier qualifying examination with the following subjects - Physics, Chemistry, Biology and English.

or

- (f) *Any other examination which, in scope and standard is found to be equivalent to the intermediate science examination of an Indian University/Board, taking Physics, Chemistry and Biology including practical test in each of these subjects and English.*

Note:

The pre-medical course may be conducted either at Medical College or a Science College.

Marks obtained in mathematics are not to be considered for admission to MBBS course.

After the 10+2 course is introduced, the integrated courses should be abolished.”

It is further observed that the alternatives prescribed at Sub-Clause (b), (c) & (f) are no longer relevant in the present scheme of the Science Stream 10 + 2 pattern education.

It is also observed that Sub-Clause (d) provides for eligibility at 1st Year of the three-year degree course which is superfluous as Sub-Clause (e) provides for B.Sc. Examination which is a full three-year degree course.

After due and detailed deliberations, the Members of the Executive Committee decided that Section 4 (2) of Regulations on Graduate Medical Education, 1997 pertaining to admission to the medical course – Eligibility Criteria may be amended as under:-

“4. *Admission to the Medical Course - Eligibility Criteria: No Candidate shall be allowed to be admitted to the Medical Curriculum proper of first Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) Course until:*

(1)

4 (2) *He/She has passed qualifying examination as under:-*

- a. *The higher secondary examination or the Indian School Certificate Examination which is equivalent to 10+2 Higher Secondary Examination or any other examination which is equivalent to the Higher Secondary Examination under 10+2 pattern of 12 years study period, the last two years of study comprising of Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Mathematics or any other elective subjects with English at a level not less than core course of English as prescribed by the National Council of Educational Research and Training after the introduction of the 10+2+3 years educational structure as recommended by the National Committee on education.*

Note: Marks obtained in Mathematics are not to be considered for admission to MBBS Course.

Now in reference to above letter the Central Government, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare vide letter no. 11012/3/2005-ME(P-I) dated 07.01.2010 has informed as under:

“I may refer to Medical Council of India’s Letter No. MCI.34(1)/2009-Med.52433 dated 25th November 2009 on the subject to state the MCI has proposed to amend section 4(2) of the aforesaid regulations as stated below:

- (a) *The higher secondary examination or the Indian School Certificate Examination which is equivalent to 10+2 Higher Secondary Examination or any other examination which is equivalent to the Higher Secondary Examination under 10+2 pattern of 12 years study period, the last two years of study comprising of Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Mathematics or any other elective subjects with English at a level not less than the core course of English as prescribed by the National Council for Educational Research and*

Training after the introduction of the 10+2+3 years educational structure as recommended by the National Committee on education.

Note: Marks obtained in Mathematics are not to be considered for admission to MBBS Course.

2. However Directorate General of Health Services has, with modification (in bold), suggested the following amendment in 4.2(a):

(a) *The higher secondary examination or the Indian School Certificate Examination which is equivalent to 10+2 Higher Secondary Examination or any other examination which is equivalent to the Higher Secondary Examination under 10+2 pattern of 12 years study period, the last two years of study comprising of Physics, Chemistry, Biology (**which shall include a practical test in these subjects**) and Mathematics or any other elective subjects with English at a level not less than the core course of English as prescribed by the National Council for Educational Research and Training after the introduction of the 10+2+3 years educational structure as recommended by the National Committee on education.*

Note: (1) Marks obtained in Mathematics are not to be considered for admission to MBBS Course.

(2) The incumbent must have passed in Biology paper in the first attempt."

After detailed deliberations, the members of the Executive Committee of the Council did not agree with the clause (2) of the Note which reads as under:-

(2) *The incumbent must have passed in Biology paper in the first attempt.*

3. Nursing staff is inadequate in terms of Asstt. Nursing Superintendent- Nil against the requirement of 7.
4. In the Central sterilization department, there are no bowl sterilizer, no instrument washing machine, no ETO available.
5. The Central library has subscribed 70 journals (34 foreign and 36 Indian) as against the requirement of total 80 for the present stage.

45. Mamata Medical College, Khammam - Renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of students against the increase intake i.e from 100 to 150 for the academic session 2010-2011.

Read: The Council Inspectors report (16th & 17th December 2009) for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of students against the increase intake i.e. from 100 to 150 for the academic session 2010-2011 at Mamata Medical College, Khammam.

Remarks: The following observations were made by the inspection team on hospital round on the day of the inspection which were duly endorsed by the Dean of the Institution:

- Medicine Ward had a bed occupancy of 40%.The analysis of the admissions in the week prior to the inspection showed that the total admissions in Medicine ward (all units combined) were 39 out of 180 beds giving a bed occupancy of 21.6%.No treatment orders for any patients were seen in the nurses treatment book from 14th -16th December 2009.

- TB Chest Ward: Daily admissions ranged between 1-3 from 10th-15th December 2009. However on 16th December 26 patients were shown to be admitted, but treatment orders were available for only 6 patients.
 - Surgery and Orthopedics Wards: Most of the Surgery and Orthopedics patients were old and chronic whose admission dates varied from end October to early November 2009. Thus, on an average, these patients were kept in the hospital for more than a month. No additional investigations were done or treatment provided during this interim period.
 - Pediatrics Ward had 4 patients on the previous evening as per the nurses treatment order book but the ward was found to have more than 80% bed occupancy on the day of the inspection. The case sheets were found to be incomplete with no treatment notes. There were no infants in the ward and no child was found to be on IV fluids.
 - For most of the patients, in almost all the wards, no investigations had been ordered. Treatment notes were either not written or not signed. No entries of the treatment notes were found in the nurses treatment register. The nurses night report registers had erratic entries. The admission registers did not tally with the nurses treatment registers/night report registers. Record keeping was found to be very poor.
 - There were 9 surgeries on the 1st day of the inspection of which 6 were cataract. However, on the next day of the inspection were only 3 major surgeries listed on the OT list. The average surgeries per day varied between 6 to 9.
- Work load in the Central Laboratory was found to be low. It had less than 10 blood samples in the sample collection center on the day of the inspection at 12 noon. The samples were found to be mixed up with samples taken on the previous three days. There were no reporting registers in the various sections of the Central Laboratory.
 - Mostly student nurses were seen in the wards. Staff nurses were either not present or did not have their identification badges. The nurses had no knowledge about the patients.
 - A round of the hospital taken early in the morning on the day of inspection showed that all wards had nearly 90% bed occupancy. All the so called patients were found to be sleeping. There was no doctor or nurse in any of the wards. No IV fluids/Oxygen/treatment was being given to any patient. However, there was an amazing transformation in the hospital scenario at 10.00 am. It was found to be bustling with patients, doctors, student nurses and undergraduate students.
3. Health Centres: No other clinical departments like Medicine, Paediatrics, Obstetrics & Gynaecology participate in the outreach teaching programmes. No lecturer cum medical officer having M.D.{P.S.M.} is available; No messing facilities are available. Lecture hall cum seminar room is not available. No audiovisual aids have been provided and they are brought by the P.S.M. department at the time of the visit. No vaccines provided under UIP are available. Investigation facilities for basic investigation viz, X-ray are not being utilized.
 4. U.H.C.: Delivery services are not available. Duty rosters and records of various activities and investigations are not maintained properly.
 5. The availability of para medical staff is inadequate for the present stage. There are 220 nurses against the requirement of 367 for the present stage.
 6. Residential Quarters: The number of quarters available for non-teaching staff is 12 against the requirement of 36.
 7. Other deficiencies/observations as pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of the above, the members of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increase intake i.e. from 100 to 150 for the academic year 2010-2011 at Mamata Medical College, Khammam.

46. Inspection of Dr. Rajendra Prasad Government Medical College, Kangra, Tanda to verify the teaching faculty, resident, clinical material, hostel and other infrastructural facilities.

Read: The compliance verification inspection report (5th & 6th January, 2010) of Dr. Rajendra Prasad Government Medical College, Kangra, Tanda with regard to verify the teaching faculty, residence, clinical material, hostels and other infrastructural facilities.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (5th & 6th January, 2010) along with Council Inspectors report (5th & 6th November, 2009) and decided that the Council should process the applications for starting of postgraduate courses at Dr. Rajendra Prasad Government Medical College, Kangra, Tanda for further necessary action.

47. Army College of Medical Sciences, Delhi Cantt - Renewal of permission for admission of 3rd batch of students for the academic session 2010-2011.

Read: The Council Inspectors report (8th & 9th January, 2010) for renewal of permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students for the academic session 2010-2011 at Army College of Medical Sciences, Delhi Cantt.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Inspectors report (8th & 9th January, 2010) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of 100 (one hundred) MBBS students at Army College of Medical Sciences, Delhi Cantt, New Delhi for the academic session 2010-2011.

48. Honorarium of Convenor & Faculty – Reg

Read: The matter with regard to honorarium of Convenor & Faculty and/or convenor conducting workshop by the regional nodal centers.

The members of the Executive Committee of the Council noted that the Committee at its meeting held on 8th October, 2009 while perusing the recommendations of the Expert Group to develop programmes for Advanced & Degree Courses in Medical Education Technologies (MET) dated 14.07.2009 decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council perused the recommendations of the Expert Group to develop programmes for Advanced & Degree Courses in Medical Education Technologies (MET) of its meeting held on 14.07.2009 which read as under:-

“ ...

1. *Regional centres would conduct four Basic Course Workshops i.e., two per academic session. One of these workshops would be for Coordinators/in-charge of MEUs.*
2. *Faculty in-charge of MEUs in medical colleges would be the participants who would attend the Basic Course Workshop in MET at Regional Centres. In addition, five more faculty members from each medical college would be trained to create sufficient resource pool.*
3. *The Council would communicate to the Dean/ Principal of Medical College concerned, the following:*
 - a) *that it is mandatory for the Co-ordinator of the MEUs in medical colleges to attend the one-day Orientation Workshop and 3-day Basic Course Workshop in MET which would be organized by the Regional Centre under which their institution falls,*
 - b) *that TA/DA of the Coordinators of MEUs of medical colleges to attend these meetings will be paid by the medical college concerned,*

- c) *the coordinators of MEUs will be on deputation to attend the above workshops organized by the Regional Centres,*
- d) *Certificate of participation will be issued by MCI, on receipt of copy of attendance signed by the Convener of the Regional Centre.*
4. *The Head of each medical college would inform the name of the coordinator of MEU to the respective Convener of the Regional/Nodal Centre within two weeks of receipt of the above communication from MCI.*
 5. *MEUs in each medical college would conduct two workshops in Basic Course in MET. The feedback from participants would be sent to the Convener, Regional centre who would in turn send a consolidated report at the end of the year to Director, Academic Cell.*
 6. *The Co-ordinator of MEUs in medical colleges would inform the Convener/s of their respective Regional Centre, sufficiently in advance, the details of the schedule for conducting the Basic Course Workshop in MET. The programme would be the same as developed by MCI-nominated group of experts. The Convener of the respective Regional Centre or his representative would monitor this activity. The Convener of the Regional centre would help the coordinator of medical colleges to structure their workshop and prepare an annual schedule of activity of the MEU. The Convener of the Regional Center would be reimbursed TA/DA (as permissible) to visit MEUs in medical colleges under their charge for monitoring, with approval from MCI.*
 7. *Expenses to conduct these workshops will be made available to the coordinator of MEUs by the Head of the Institution/ medical colleges.*
 8. *Convener/s of each Regional Centre would undertake a one-day sensitization programme for coordinators of MEUs under their charge. Coordinators of MEUs would be informed that it is mandatory for them to attend this Workshop. Compliance would be communicated to MCI by Conveners of each Regional centre. Coordinators would be on deputation and reimbursed travel and daily allowances, as admissible, by their own college.”*

It was observed by the members of the Executive Committee that at its meeting held on 03.11.2007 where the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon’ble Supreme Court were also present whereby a core financial corpus of Rs. 25 lacs for launching the activities related with the faculty development in medical education in India was sanctioned by the Committee.

After due deliberations, the members of the Executive Committee decided to approve the above recommendations of the Expert Group. It was further decided to communicate these guidelines to each medical institute and regional centres/nodal centres for organizing the workshops on Medical Education Technologies within the time frame work as mentioned above.

It was further decided to direct the office of the Council to finalise the proposal for purchase of necessary equipments and accessories as required within a period of 2 weeks.”

The Executive Committee reviewed its earlier decision to the extent that the Faculty and Convenor of the Regional Centres be paid an honorarium of Rs. 1000/- per day for 3 days under the National Faculty Development Programme of the Council.
