1. Minutes of the Executive Committee Meeting held on 23rd August, 2016 and 10th October, 2016 – Confirmation of.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the minutes of the Executive Committee meetings held on 23rd August, 2016 and 10th October, 2016 have been sent to Ministry of Health, Nirman Bhavan, New Delhi and comments are awaited.

2. Minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee – Action taken thereon.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the minutes of the Executive Committee meetings held on 23.08.2016 and 10.10.2016 have been sent to Ministry of Health, Nirman Bhavan, New Delhi for approval and the same are still awaited. Therefore, there is no action taken report at present.

However, under item no.6 of the Executive Committee dated 10.10.2016, the following para with regard to TEQ Sub-Committee minutes dt. 05.08.2016 may be read as under:

3. Pending Items arising out of the decisions taken by the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted the pending items arising out of the decisions taken by the Executive Committee.

4. Grant of Temporary Permission u/s 14(1) of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 in respect of foreign doctors to participate in Camps being organized by the NGOs.

Read: the matter with regard to grant of temporary permission u/s 14(1) of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 in respect of foreign doctors to participate in Camps being organized by the NGOs.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that Section 14 of IMC Act, 1956 reads as under:

14. SPECIAL PROVISION IN CERTAIN CASES FOR RECOGNITION OF MEDICAL QUALIFICATIONS GRANTED BY MEDICAL INSTITUTIONS IN COUNTRIES WITH WHICH THERE IS NO SCHEME OF RECIPROCITY.

1. The Central Government after consultation with the Council, may, by notification in the Official Gazette, direct that medical qualifications granted by medical institutions in any country out-side India in respect of which a scheme of reciprocity for the recognition of medical qualifications is not in force, shall be recognized medical qualification for the purposes of this Act or shall be so only when granted after a specified date:

Provided that medical practice by persons possessing such qualifications: -

- (a) shall be permitted only if such persons are enrolled as medical practitioners in accordance with the law regulating the registration of medical practitioners for the time being in force in that country;*
- (b) shall be limited to the institution to which they are attached for the time being for the purposes of teaching, research or charitable work ; and*
- (c) shall be limited to the period specified in this behalf by the Central Government by general or special order.*

2. In respect of any such medical qualification the Central Government, after consultation with the Council may, by notification in the Official Gazette direct that it shall be a recognized medical qualification only when granted before a specified date.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided that Registration & Equivalence Sub-Committee be directed to process the applications received from such Doctors in accordance with provisions of Section 14 of IMC Act, as shown above.

5. Jawaharlal Nehru Medical College, Ajmer– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Jawaharlal Nehru Medical College, Ajmer– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (8th & 9th September, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 12.04 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 21.83 % as detailed in the report.

3. OPD: Injection room is common for males/females. ECG room is not separate. Dressing room is common for males/females. Dark room is not available in Ophthalmology OPD.
4. Casualty: Disaster Trolley, Crash Cart are not available.
5. ICUs: Details of patients admitted in ICCU & ICUs are not provided.
6. Radio-Diagnosis department: Only 2 Mobile X-ray machines are functional against requirement of 6. Only 4 Static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 6.
7. UHC: It is running in a rented building. Cold chain equipment is not available. Paramedical staff is deficient as detailed in the report.
8. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at Jawaharlal Nehru Medical College, Ajmer under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

6. Kakatiya Medical College, Warangal– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Kakatiya Medical College, Warangal– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (22nd and 23rd September, 2016) alongwith an e-mail dated 27.09.2016 from Dr. Abhimanyu Basu (Coordinator) and letter dated 23.09.2016 signed by all the assessors and representation/letter dated 24.09.2016 & 03.10.2016 from the Principal, Kakatiya Medical College, Warangal. The Committee noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 19.06 % as detailed in the report.
2. Wards: Demonstration rooms are not available in many wards. There is no numbering of beds & wards in many wards. Treatment cum Examination room, Duty room & Pantry are not available in several wards.
3. Central Research Laboratory is not available.
4. Examination Halls: Capacity of available 3 Examination halls is 150 each against requirement of 250 each.
5. Lecture Theaters: Capacity of Hospital Lecture Theater is 150 against requirement of 300.
6. Interns' Hostel is not available.
7. Residential Quarters: 16 quarters for faculty are available in campus against requirement of 34. NIL quarters are available for Non-teaching staff in the campus.
8. OPD: Injection room is common for males/females.
9. Speech Therapy is not available.
10. MRD: it is not computerized. ICD X classification is not used for indexing of diseases.
11. ICUs: SICU is in a ward which has open doors & is not air-conditioned.
12. 5 Static X-ray machines are in working order against requirement of 6.
13. ETO Sterilizer is not available.
14. RHTC: Cold chain equipment is not available. Amongst specialists, only Paediatricians visit RHTC.
15. UHC: Amongst specialists, only Paediatricians visit RHTC.
16. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 at Kakatiya Medical College, Warangal under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

7. R.N.T. Medical College, Udaipur– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to R.N.T. Medical College, Udaipur– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (22nd & 23rd September, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of teaching faculty is 16.1 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 10.5 % as detailed in the report.
3. Examination Halls: Capacity of available Examination Halls is 200 each against requirement of 250 each.
4. Lecture Theaters: Capacity of 1 Lecture Theater is 150 against requirement of 180.
5. Interns' Hostel: It is not available.
6. MRD: It is partially computerized.
7. ETO Sterilizer is not available.
8. RHTC: It is 38 km. from college.
9. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at R.N.T. Medical College, Udaipur under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

8. Recognition/approval of Govt. Medical College, Kota for the award of MBBS degree granted by Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Govt. Medical College, Kota for the award of MBBS degree granted by Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (08.09.2016) along with previous assessment report (26.04.2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 16.35 % as detailed in the report.
2. IITV is not available.
3. Students' Hostels: Available accommodation is 534 against requirement of 565.
4. Interns' Hostel: Available accommodation is 96 against requirement of 150.
5. Nurses' Hostel: Available accommodation is 70 against requirement of 75.
6. Examination Halls: 1 Examination Hall of capacity 150 & another of capacity 50 are available against requirement of 2 of capacity 250 each.

7. Central Library: It is not air-conditioned. Available area is 2,000 sq.m. against requirement of 2,400 sq.m. Total available seating capacity is 240 against requirement of 300. Total 75 journals are available against requirement of 100.
8. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend not to recognize/approve Govt. Medical College, Kota for the award of MBBS degree granted by Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

9. Motilal Nehru Medical College, Allahabad– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Motilal Nehru Medical College, Allahabad– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (22nd & 23rd September, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 15 % as detailed in the report.
2. In General Medicine, only 3 Units are functional against requirement of 5.
3. Radiodiagnosis department: Only 3 Mobile X-ray machines are functional against requirement of 6. Only 4 Static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 6. Only 2 USG machine is available against requirement of 3.
4. Casualty: Central O₂ and Central Suction are not available.
5. O.T.: Central O₂ and Central Suction are not available in some O.T.s. Infusion Pumps are not available.
6. Wards: Pantry is not available in any ward.
7. Examination Hall: 1 Hall is available against requirement of 2.
8. RHTC: Except Psychiatrist, no other Specialist visits RHTC.
9. UHC: Survey/Immunization/MCH/FP registers are not available. Specialists' visits are not organized.
10. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at Motilal Nehru Medical College, Allahabad under King George's Medical University, Lucknow u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

10. Bankura Sammilani Medical College, Bankura – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Bankura Sammilani Medical College, Bankura – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (26th & 27th September, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 38.99 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 31.03 % as detailed in the report.
3. Teaching beds are inadequate as under:

4. Paramedical & Nonteaching staff: Total 149 Paramedical & Nonteaching staff are available against requirement of 182.
5. Wards: Distance between 2 beds is < 1.5 m. There is overcrowding in many wards. There are many patients on ground which is not as per norms. General hygiene is very poor.
6. Casualty: Central O₂ and Central Suction are not available. Disaster Trolley, Crash Cart, Pulse Oximeter, Defibrillator are not available.
7. ICUs: MICU & SICU are combined with 8 beds against requirement of 5 beds each.
8. ETO Sterilizer is available but not functional.
9. Interns' Hostel: It is not available.
10. In College office, Staff room is not available. College Council room is combined with Dean's office and is too small.
11. MEU is not available as per Regulations.
12. Examination Halls: Only 1 Examination Hall of capacity 250 is available against requirement of 2 of capacity 250 each.
13. Lecture Theaters: Only 2 Lecture Theaters are functional against requirement of 4. Audio system is not available in any Lecture Theater.
14. Central Library: It is not air-conditioned. Space is < 2,400 sq.m. Students' Reading room (Outside) is not available. Internet Nodes are less
15. Central Photography section is not available.
16. Hygiene of Students', Residents' & Nurses' hostels is poor.
17. Recreational facilities are inadequate.
18. MRD: It is partially computerized.
19. Nutritionist/Dietician is not available. There is no provision for special diets.
20. Audiovisual aids are available but deficient in Demonstration rooms of many departments as detailed in the report.
21. Physiology department: All Laboratories are smaller than required.
22. UHC: No records are maintained of Surveys/MCH/Immunization/FP programmes. MCH & Immunization facility are not available.
23. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at Bankura Sammilani Medical College, Bankura under West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

11. Institute of Post Graduate Medical Education & Research, Kolkata – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Institute of Post Graduate Medical Education & Research, Kolkata – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (27th & 28th September, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Radiodiagnosis department: 5 Mobile X-ray machines are functional against requirement of 6. Only 3 Static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 6.
2. Interns' Hostel: There is no separate Interns' hostel. Total accommodation available in campus is 619 against requirement of 565 for students & 100 for Interns – i.e. total 665. Even in this available accommodation, accommodation for 100 is of Dormitory type which is not permissible.
3. College Council room is not available.
4. Examination Hall: 1 Examination Hall of capacity 200 is available against requirement of 2 of capacity 250 each.
5. MRD: It is partly computerized.
6. O.T.: There are 26 O.T. tables in 20 Major O.T.s implying some O.T.s having more than 1 table which is not as per norms.
7. ICUs: Details of patients admitted in ICCU & ICUs are not provided. SICU is under renovation.
8. Demonstration rooms in Biochemistry, Pathology departments are inadequate as detailed in the report.
9. RHTC: Specialists' visits are not organized.
10. UHC: Specialists' visits are not organized.
11. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at Institute of Post Graduate Medical Education & Research, Kolkata under West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

12. Smt. N.H.L. Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Smt. N.H.L. Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (27th & 28th September, 2016) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 at Smt. N.H.L. Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad under Gujarat University, Ahmedabad u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

13. Sri Bhausaheb Hire Govt. Medical College, Dhule – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 50-100 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (27th & 28th September, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 13.20 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 22.38 % as detailed in the report.
3. There is no regular Blood Bank as such. Only storage facility is available.
4. Medical Superintendent is not available.
5. Teaching beds are inadequate as under:

6. Wards: Most of the cots are old, rusted & legless. Mattresses are untidy & do not have bed spread. Beds are placed close to one another. Treatment room is not equipped in some wards. Ancillary facilities are not available in some wards.
7. OPD: Registration Counters are not computerized. Inject ion room is common for males & females. Enquiry desk is not available. Dressing room is common for males & females. Minor O.T. is not functional. Orthopaedics OPD is shared with General Surgery. Dark Room & Dressing Room are not available in Ophthalmology OPD. Child Welfare clinic & Child Welfare clinic are not available in Paediatrics OPD. All clinics of O.G. are in 1 room.
8. Audiometry & Speech Therapy are in 1 room.
9. Casualty: Central O₂ and Central Suction are not available. Disaster Trolley is not available.
10. O.T.: Central O₂ and Central Suction are not available.
11. CT Scan: Available CT Scan is 6 slice against minimum 16 slice.
12. CSSD is not available.
13. College Office: Staff room is smaller than required. College Council room is not available.
14. Examination Hall: Capacity is 200 against requirement of 250.
15. Lecture Theaters: 3 Lecture Theaters are available against requirement of 4. All lecture theaters are not of Gallery type. Audiovisual aids are not adequate.
16. Central Library: Available area is 763 sq.m. against requirement of 1,600 sq.m.
17. Hostels are overcrowded.
18. Faculty rooms are inadequate.
19. Security & Housekeeping are not functional.
20. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 50-100 at Sri Bhausaheb Hire Govt. Medical College, Dhule under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nasik u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

14. Institute of Medical Sciences & Sum Hospital, Bhubaneswar – Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Institute of Medical Sciences & Sum Hospital, Bhubaneswar – Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (27th & 28th September, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 8.57 % as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 26.38 % as detailed in the report.
3. Bed occupancy is 70.43 % on day of assessment.
4. Website: Information provided is sketchy as detailed in the report.
5. RHTC: Specialists' visits are not organized. Cold chain equipment is not available. Registers of Survey/MCH/Immunization/FP programmes are not maintained. Activities under National Programmes are not carried out.
6. UHC: Specialists' visits are not organized. Immunization is not done.
7. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at Institute of Medical Sciences & Sum Hospital, Bhubaneswar under Shiksha 'O' Anusandhan University, Bhubaneswar u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018 and apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016, which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

15. Rural Medical College, Loni – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 125-200 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Rural Medical College, Loni – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 125-200 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (27th & 28th September, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. OPD attendance is 1,217 on day of assessment against minimum requirement of 2,000;
2. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above and as the applicant has failed to meet the Qualifying criterion 3(6)(A)(ii) pertaining to minimum OPD strength per day not less than 2000, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 125-200 at Rural Medical College, Loni under Pravara Institute of Medical Sciences (Deemed University), Loni u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (27th & 28th September, 2016) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 4th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 in respect of Smt. Kashibai Navale Medical College and General Hospital, Pune under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nasik u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

17. Govt. Medical College, Latur – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Govt. Medical College, Latur – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (27th & 28th September, 2016) and noted the following:-

3. Nursing staff: 277 Nursing staff are available against requirement of 377.
4. Casualty: Available beds are 20 against requirement of 25. Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available. Disaster Trolley, Defibrillator are not available. Crash Cart is not maintained.
5. ICUs: Resuscitation equipment is inadequate. Central O₂ and Central Suction are not available.
6. Radiodiagnosis department: Only 2 Mobile X-ray machines are functional against requirement of 6. Only 2 Static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 6.
7. OPD: Waiting area is inadequate. Dressing room is not available in Ophthalmology OPD.
8. Speech Therapy is not available.
9. Wards: There is no exclusive ward for ENT. Demonstration rooms are inadequate in most of the ward.
10. Central Research Laboratory is not available.
11. Examination Hall: 1 Examination Hall is available against requirement of 2.
12. Lecture Theaters: One Lecture Hall in college & 1 in Hospital are not of Gallery type. Audiovisual aids are not available. Hospital Lecture Theater is not furnished.
13. Central Library: It is not air-conditioned. Capacity of Students' Reading room (Outside) & Students' Reading room (Inside) is 100 each against requirement of 150 each. Internet Nodes are less.
14. Students' Hostels: Visitors' room, A.C. Study room with Internet & Computer are not available.
15. Anatomy department: 1 Demonstration room is not furnished. Lockers available are 36 against requirement of 150.
16. Biochemistry department: 1 Demonstration room is shared with Microbiology.
17. Only 1 Demonstration room is available in Pathology, Microbiology, Pharmacology, Forensic Medicine departments against requirement of 2.
18. RHTC: It is not under control of Dean.
19. UHC: It is not under control of Dean.
20. Details of CME Programmes conducted during the year are not provided.
21. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at Govt. Medical College, Latur under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nasik u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

18. Himalayan Institute of Medical Sciences, Dehradun – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Himalayan Institute of Medical Sciences, Dehradun – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (28th & 29th September, 2016) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 in respect of Himalayan Institute of Medical Sciences, Dehradun under HIHT University, Dehradun u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

19. Issuance of Passing Certificate and Internship Completion Certificate to Shri Mohammed Jainulla Abuddin, a student of J.N. Medical College, Belagavi who had been convicted by the Court in a murder case.

Read: the matter with regard to issuance of passing certificate and internship completion certificate to Shri Mohammed Jainulla Abuddin, a student of J.N. Medical College, Belagavi who had been convicted by the Court in a murder case.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that although it is mentioned in the letter of Registrar, KLE University, Belagavi that the candidate has approached the Court for directions to the college to issue passing certificate and internship completion certificate, no Order or proceedings of the Hon'ble Court are attached. The Committee further observed that in the application of the candidate, he has mentioned that "*.. have completed my Internship in 1999*" while in the letter of college it is mentioned that 10 days prior to completion of his internship he was involved in a murder case without actually mentioning whether he has completed his Internship or not. Further in his application, the candidate has stated that "*I'd lost my original college passing certificate*" implying that passing certificate was issued to him while the letter from Registrar is silent on this aspect.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council directed the office to obtain clarification as mentioned above from the Registrar, KLE University, Belagavi alongwith copy of the Hon'ble Court's orders. The Committee further directed the office to obtain the opinion of Law Officer of the Council in the matter and then resubmit the same before the Executive Committee.

20. Regarding inclusion of "Madhya Pradesh Medical Science University, Jabalpur, M.P." also known as "Madhya Pradesh Ayurvigyan Vishwavidyalaya, Jabalpur, M.P." in the list of MCI recognized University.

Read: the matter with regard to inclusion of "Madhya Pradesh Medical Science University, Jabalpur, M.P." also known as "Madhya Pradesh Ayurvigyan Vishwavidyalaya, Jabalpur, M.P." in the list of MCI recognized University.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the agenda note is not clear. In the agenda note, reference is made to earlier letter from the University dt.26/12/2014 which pertains to delayed affiliation of certain courses in Medical Colleges. Its relevance with regard to present request is not clear.

The Committee further observed that with regard to present request, existing courses which are recognized under erstwhile Universities will stand recognized under M.P. Medical Sciences University for which no fresh assessment is required. However for this individual institutes shall have to make a formal request u/s 11(2) to the Central Government alongwith requisite fees when the first batch admitted under M.P. Medical Sciences appears for the final examination. The University and the affiliated colleges be advised accordingly.

21. Approval of the Minutes of the Administration and Grievance Committee Meeting held on 30/06/2016.

Read: the matter with regard to approval of the Minutes of the Administration and Grievance Committee Meeting held on 30/06/2016.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the minutes of the Administration and Grievance Committee meeting held on 30/06/2016 and observed as under:-

Item No.2: Representation submitted by 4(four) UDCs of the Council

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that Section 67 of MCI Regulations, 2000 reads as under:

“67. Residuary Provision :- Matters relating to the conditions of service of the Registrar and other employees of the Council with respect to which no express provision has been made in the regulations shall be as per the rules applicable to officers and employees of Central Government.”

In view of above stated Statutory provision, the Executive Committee of the Council decided that it is not possible to frame fresh Service Rules for Officers & Employees unless & until Section 67 is so amended with approval of Govt. of India.

Item No.3: Upgradation of Grade Pay of Computer Operators of the Council at par with other Govt. Organisations

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that parity with other Central Govt. Organizations cannot be made for a particular cadre on selective basis when pay scale & allowances are as per Central Govt. for all cadres.

Item No.4: Complaint of ragging at King George Medical University, Lucknow

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that complete details of the item, particularly with regard to brief details of case, recommendation of A&G Sub-Committee and decision taken by E.C. previously are not recorded in the Minutes. However the decision of the Executive Committee is reiterated and Office is directed to act accordingly.

Item No.5: Case of ragging at Dharbhanga Medical College, Laheriasarai

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that complete details of the item, particularly with regard to brief details of case, recommendation of A&G Subcommittee and decision taken by E.C. previously are not recorded in the Minutes. However the decision of the executive committee is reiterated and office is directed to act accordingly.

Item No.6: Complaint of ragging received from Grant Medical College, Mumbai.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted the decision of Admn. & Grievance Committee.

Item No.7: Complaint of ragging received from Motilal Nehru Medical College, Allahabad.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the decision of Admn. & Grievance Committee.

Note : The Executive Committee of the Council directed the A&G Sub-Committee that whenever an item is included in agenda by way of a referred back item or whenever it is brought for reconsideration, the Minutes of the meeting of the Sub-committee must include details of the item, particularly with regard to

brief details of case, recommendation of A&G Subcommittee and decision taken by E.C. previously.

22. Approval of the proceedings of the Ethics Committee meetings held on 7-8.09.2016.

Read: the matter with regard to approval of the proceedings of the Ethics Committee meetings held on 7-8.09.2016.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the minutes of the Ethics Committee meeting held on 7 & 8th September, 2016 and observed as under:-

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the above decision taken by the Ethics Committee of the Council. The Committee directed that the decision of the Hon'ble Supreme Court in Ashwin Patel case be also circulated.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the above decision taken by the Ethics Committee of the Council

23. Amendment in the “Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999”.

Read: the matter with regard to Amendment in the “Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999”.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the Council Office had sent the following four amendments to the Central Government for approval as per the recommendations of the General Body of the Council dated 26th/27th March, 2016.

1	In the “ Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 ”, in Clause 1 under “Eligibility Criteria”, point no. 7 shall be added as under:- 7. A semi- Government undertaking.
2	In the “ Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 ”, in Clause 2(5) under “Qualifying Criteria”, the first para of the Clause shall be substituted as under:- “That the applicant owns and manages a fully functional teaching hospital with 300 beds(120 beds for Medicine & allied, 140 beds for Surgery & allied and 40 beds for Ob-Gy) that has successfully run for a minimum period of 03(three) years with all necessary infrastructure like OPD, Indoor wards, OT, ICU, Casualty, Labour Room, Laboratories, Blood Bank, CSSD, Kitchen etc. having minimum 60 % indoor bed occupancy shall be available at time of submission of application to the Central Government. This shall be increased to 350 beds for a college with intake of 50 seats, 470 beds for a college with intake of 100 seats and 650 beds for a college with intake of 150 students in phasewise manner as prescribed. The indoor bed occupancy shall be increased to 75 % at time of assessment for III renewal of permission and thereafter and also at time of assessment for recognition. Provided that in North Eastern States and Hill States the bed strength required at time of inception shall be 200 beds(90 beds for Medicine & allied, 90 beds for Surgery & allied and 20 beds for Ob-Gy) which shall be increased to 350 beds at time of recognition for a college with intake of 50 seats and 250 beds which shall be increased to 470 beds at time of recognition for a college with intake of 100 seats.
3	In Clause 2(5) under the heading “QUALIFYING CRITERIA”, in the second point of the last added para setting out the conditions to be fulfilled and to form part and parcel of the Memorandum of understanding , the following shall be substituted:- “The appropriate Govt. (Central Govt./State Govt.) as the case may be may permit an applicant Trust/Society/Company to manage and run a hospital of not less than 300 beds and all its facilities for a period of minimum 33 years through invocation of an appropriate Memorandum of Understanding for Undergraduate/Postgraduate/Super-speciality medical education. While transferring the Government Hospital facility, the State Government may safeguard the interest of State particularly in respect of admission of students under Government Quota in the medical college and patient care in affiliated Hospital(s) of the Medical College.”

Regarding amendment no.2, the Executive Committee observed that no comments have been received from the Ministry as yet.

Regarding amendment no.3, the Executive Committee observed that the recommendations of the Council have been approved by the Ministry with certain modifications. The Executive Committee deliberated on the matter and decided to reiterate the decision of the General Body of the Council conveyed to the Ministry vide Council letter dated 25/04/2016.

Regarding amendment no.4, the Executive Committee observed that no comments have been received from the Ministry as yet.

24. Condonation of Break of Study-MBBS course-Blesson. C.John at Government Medical College, Kottayam.

Read: the matter with regard to condonation of break of study-MBBS course-Blesson. C.John at Government Medical College, Kottayam.

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to approve condonation of break of study-MBBS course-Blesson. C.John at Government Medical College, Kottayam as has been done in such cases previously.

25. Continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai in respect of students being trained at Government Medical College, Vellore – consideration of Assessment report.

Read: the matter with regard to continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai in respect of students being trained at Government Medical College, Vellore – consideration of Assessment report.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the inspection report (27th and 28th June, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 12.90 % as detailed in the report.
2. RHTC: Residential facility is not available. It is not headed by Lecturer cum M.O.
3. UHC: It is not headed by Lecturer cum M.O.
4. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided not to recommend continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai in respect of students being trained at Government Medical College, Vellore and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month.

26. Approval of the Minutes of the Administration and Grievance Committee Meeting held on 17/10/2016.

Read: the matter with regard to approval of the Minutes of the Administration and Grievance Committee Meeting held on 17/10/2016.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the minutes of the Administration and Grievance Committee meeting held on 17/10/2016 and observed as under: .

1. Bio-metric OFAMOS Devices implementation plan for DMMP-MCI Project.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that from the minutes of A & GC Sub-Committee it is not clear how the requirement went up from 3000 by additional 4,992 sets. No details have been provided whether it is because of increase in scope of work or for any other reason. No reason is also provided in the minutes as to how such a large requirement – i.e. increase by over 160 % over the original estimate was overlooked. Further, although the presentation of System Integrator envisages additional at least 4,992 sets while the in principle approval is sought for only 2,000 additional devices. This implies that there would still be a shortfall of nearly 3,000 devices even if the revised proposal as submitted by A & GC is approved.

With regard to advance payment for OFAMOS devices, it is not specified in the minutes whether it is as per Tender condition or not. It is also not clear whether it is as per Tender condition to make payment for a device without installation and testing. If it is not as per tender condition, the reasons and justification for making advance payment not incorporated in tender are not provided in detail.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council referred back the matter to A & G Sub-committee with a direction to resubmit the matter with clarification of the issues mentioned above.

2. Letter dated 30/09/2016 received from Ministry of Health & Family Welfare regarding Live Streaming of both classroom teaching and the teaching hospital under Digital Mission Mode Project (DMMP) of MCI.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted and approved in principle recommendations of the A&G Sub-Committee.

3. Representation received from Shri Dilipbhai Pandya (Member of Parliament, Rajya Sabha) forwarded to this Council by the Ministry of Health & F.W.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the recommendations of the A&G Sub-Committee.

4. Final Invoice for consulting phase of NISG for DMMP-MCI Project.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the recommendations of the A&G Sub-Committee.

5. Upgradation of grade pay of Sh. Anupam Dhua (Computer Programmer) and Sh. Ajay Dubey, Computer Operator under MACP scheme.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the report of the Committee comprising of Shri A.S. Dagar, Consultant (Admn.) and Sh.Nirmal Singh, Consultant (Finance) was opened. The operative part of the report is as under:-

Sh. Anupam Dhua (Computer Programmer)

“..... the contention of Sh. Dhua is that he has completed 10 years of service from last upgradation i.e. in 2004. As per Rule, he was not entitled for any financial upgradation or promotion in 2004 after completion of only 5 years' service. Therefore, the contention is not justified as it is not supported by any Rule.

The other contention of Sh. Dhua is that he is eligible for MACP as he has completed 10 years' service after his promotion in 2004. In this regard, it is clarified that in 2004, no promotion was due to him being on an isolated post, there were no promotional channels.”

Sh. Ajay Dubey, Computer Operator

“..... Sh. Ajay Kumar Dubey is already drawing Grade pay of Rs.4200/- and he is getting the benefits of upgraded pay & allowances since November, 2004 with two upgradations. As such no further financial benefit is due to him.”

After due deliberations, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to accept the report of the Committee comprising of Shri A.S. Dagar, Consultant (Admn.) and Sh.Nirmal Singh, Consultant (Finance) and it was further decided that in view of clear-cut report no further action is required in the matter.

6. Request of Electrician of the Council to revised/re-fix his basic pay band – 1 (Rs. 5200-20200/- with GP Rs. 2400/-) as per decision of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to refer back the matter to the A&G Sub-Committee for complete facts and documentary proof. The Committee further noted that there was no grade pay system in 2004 and it was implemented in the year 2006 and he was appointed in 2008.

7. Request of Mrs. Valarmathi Manimaran, to consider her promotion/seniority to the post of Upper Division Clerk.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the recommendations of the A&G Sub-Committee.

Further, Government of Uttar Pradesh has issued a Letter of Authority No. – 878/ Sattar – 1-2016-20(13) /2013 dated Sept. 23, 2016 to start academic activities in the university from session 2016-17.

29. Establishment of the Era University, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of the Era University, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh.

The Committee observed that in the instant case, as the institute found to have fulfilled all deficiencies as verified by compliance verification assessment as shown above, it is recommended for Recognition for award of MBBS degree u/s 11(2) of IMC Act, 1956 which in fact applies retrospectively to previous batches admitted under LOP & Renewals of Permissions issued by Govt. of India. Simultaneously, as in one assessment, as it was found to have employed faculty with fake/forged documents, Section 8(3)(1)(d) of Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations, 1999 is applied prohibiting institute for admitting students for 2 Academic Years prospectively. Thus there is no inconsistency in this regard.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to convey the above to the Central Government and further decided to refer the matter to ASG for opinion.

69. Health & Family Welfare Department – Medical Education Service- Academic- Clinical posting of 2nd year MBBS students of Government Medical College, Idukki.

Read: the matter with regard to Health & Family Welfare Department – Medical Education Service- Academic- Clinical posting of 2nd year MBBS students of Government Medical College, Idukki.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that:

- (a) In both the letters from Govt. of Kerala, only proposal is to shift the students to other medical colleges; but there is no proposal to close the Govt. Medical College, Idukki;
- (b) For Academic Year 2014-2015, *Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter/compliance dated 25/06/2014 received from the Principal, Government Medical College, Idukki furnishing the compliance report for rectification of deficiencies pointed out by the Council Assessors in the assessment reports forwarded by the Central Government vide letter dated 1st July, 2014 received in the Council Office on 1st July itself as well as compliance report dated 12th July, 2014 submitted at the time of hearing alongwith the previous assessment report (26th & 27th May, 2014) as well as undertaking received from Health Secretary, Health Deptt. of Govt. of Kerala dated 12.07.2014 and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of new medical college with annual intake of 50 seats at Painav, Idukki, Kerala by Government of Kerala under Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2014-15.*
- (c) For Academic Year 2015-2016, in view of gross deficiencies, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for MBBS course for 2nd batch (50 seats) of Govt. Medical College, Idukki, Kerala under Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur, Kerala u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016. However, the Central Govt. vide letter dated 15.06.2015 granted permission for renewal of 2nd batch to Govt. Medical College, Painav, Idukki with an annual intake of 50 seats for the academic year 2015-16 u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 against the negative recommendation of the

Council, on the basis of undertaking dated 13/05/2015 of the State Govt. of Kerala regarding rectification of the deficiencies.

(d) *For Academic Year 2016-2017 in view of gross deficiencies, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of admission of 3rd batch of 50 MBBS students at Govt. Medical College, Painav Idukki, Kerala under Kerala University of Health Sciences & Allied Sciences, Thrissur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017. The Central Govt. vide its letter dated 15.06.2016 also not granted renewal of permission for admission of 3rd batch of 50 MBBS students to Govt. Medical College, Painav Idukki, Kerala u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.*

(e) From the above sequence of events, it is obvious that Govt. of Kerala has not fulfilled undertaking given by it repetitively and deficiencies continue to persist.

(f) Govt. of India has granted Renewal of Permission for Academic Year 2015-2016 contrary to recommendation of MCI ostensibly on the undertaking furnished by Govt. of Kerala which has not been fulfilled.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to place the matter before Govt. of India for taking appropriate decision at its end.

70. (i) Final approval regarding Shifting/Adjustment of 399 MBBS students including the interns from Gold Field Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Ballabgarh, Faridabad to other recognized Medical Colleges of the State of the Haryana.

(ii) Approval of migration of the students from Gold Field Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Faridabad (now closed) to Private/Deemed Universities and conduct of university examinations in these universities – CWP No.8488, 12122, 12348, 12349, 12551 and 14678 of 2016.

Read: the matter with regard to above mentioned subject.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the opinion of Law Officer of the Council which reads as under:

"I have perused the communication dated 14.10.2016 from the Registrar, Pt. B.D. Sharma, University of Health Sciences, Rohtak. This letter has been written by the University in context of proceedings before the Hon'ble High Court of Punjab and Haryana in the following cases:

1. *CWP No.8488 of 2016 – Sumit Singh and Ors vs. Union of India and Ors.*
2. *CWP No.12122 of 2016 – Kapil Yadav and Ors vs. Union of India and Ors.*
3. *CWP No.12348 of 2016 – Amit Kumar and Ors. vs. Union of India and Ors.*
4. *CWP No.-12349 of 2016 – Harish Kumar and Ors. vs. Union of India and Ors.*
5. *CWP No.-12551 of 2016 – Nitin Malik and Ors. vs. Union of India and Ors.*

6. CWP No.-14678 of 2016 – Anmol Kaul Gill and Anr. vs. Union of India and Ors.

2. The issue in above petitions pertains to the difficulties faced by the students of erstwhile Gold Field Institute of Medical Sciences and Research, Faridabad. It may be recalled that the Executive Committee of the Council vide its decision taken at its meeting held on 13.05.2016 had decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to shifting/adjustment of 400 MBBS students including the interns from Gold Field Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Village Chhainsa Ballabgarh, Faridabad, Haryana to other recognized Medical Colleges of Haryana State.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the letter dated 29.04.2016 of the Additional Chief Secretary to Govt. of Haryana, Medical Education & Research Deptt., Chandigarh stating that the college has closed down and undertaking has been submitted by the State Government dated 29.04.2016 stating that Essentiality Certificate has been withdrawn/cancelled vide Haryana Govt. Memo No. 21/15/09-2HB-IV, dated 30.04.2010.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to inform the State Government of Haryana that:-

a) Students admitted under Government quota should be transferred to Government Colleges of the State only.

b) Students admitted under management quota should be transferred to private colleges of the State.”

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided that the bank guarantee be encashed and the amount handed over to the State Government for utilization for adjustment of the students of the academic year 2011-2012, 2012-2013, 2013-2014 and 2014-15.”

3. The Council has filed its reply affidavit in the 1st two cases referred above and the stand taken as regards the difficulties faced by the students being that the adjustment of MBBS students including the MBBS students admitted academic year 2011-12, was within the domain of State of Haryana, Directorate of Medical Education and Research, Haryana and Pt. B.D.Sharma, University of Health Sciences, Rohtak and the stand of these authorities was required to be seen by the Hon'ble Court. These cases had been listed on various dates before the Hon'ble High Court and the order dated 15.09.2016 and 28.09.2016 is relevant. The order dated 28.09.2016 contains the order dated 15.09.2016 also that reads as under:-

Order dated 28.09.16 of the Hon'ble High Court in CWP Nos. 8488 & Connected Matters

{...}

On 15.09.2016, the following order was passed:-

“The dispute in the present bunch of cases pertains to the difficulty which is being faced by the students of the erstwhile Gold Field Institute of Medical Science & Research, Faridabad (GFIMSR). The students have been transferred from the said institute on account of its closure, to various government and private colleges in the State of Haryana. On 03.08.2016, it was noticed that the State would file an affidavit giving details how it

proposes to deal with the grievances which are being raised by the students of the said institute. The relevant part of the order passed in CWP-12348-2016 reads as under:-

“Written statement on behalf of respondent no.5 and 7 has been filed in Court today.

The same is taken on record.

Office to tag the same at appropriate place in the file.

Let pleadings be completed.

Adjourned to 17.8.2016.

In the meantime, the State shall also file an affidavit giving details how it proposes to deal with the grievances which are being raised by the students of the erstwhile Goldfield Institute on account of various disputes which are arising pertaining to their attendance and lack of eligibility etc. It would be appropriate if a necessary mechanism with the regard to above aspects for the redressal of grievances of the students is prepared as it is for the authorities concerned to look into these matters which pertain to factual aspects.

Photocopy of this order be placed on record of the connected case file.”

In CWP-8488-2016, it has been brought to the notice of this Court that students were transferred to Maharishi Markandeshwar Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Mullana, Ambala, Haryana. Reference has been made to a meeting held on 19.07.2016 wherein a decision was taken by the Director, Medical Education and Research along with Dr.H.K.Aggarwal, Registrar and Mr.Sanjay Kumar, Controller of Examination that since all the students were initially registered with Pandit Bhagwat Dayal Sharma University of Health Sciences, Rohtak though, they had been shifted to deemed universities including one at Mullana & Gurgaon, the examinations would be conducted by respondent No.5-Pandit Bhagwat Dayal Sharma University of Health Sciences, Rohtak under intimation to Medical Council of India.

Senior counsel points out that students are in a bind as to whether the examination is to be conducted under the control of respondent No.5 or by the deemed universities. Reference is made to the tentative schedule of examination to show that for MMBS Final Prof Part 1, last date for submission of forms is 20.09.2016. Thus, it is apparent that various issues arise which need to be sorted out at the governmental level. Unfortunately, there is no assistance by filing affidavit or written statement on behalf of the State in spite of repeated opportunities having been taken. The issues which arise are:-

- (i) Whether who is to conduct the examination;*
- (ii) The issue of fee which is to be paid by them;*
- (iii) The registration charges which have been paid to the GFIMSR, how it to be adjusted;*
- (v) difficulty of attendance issue on the absence of record and even otherwise, on account of shortage of lecture;*

(vi) Reappear issue and whether full fee is to be charged by the institute.

All these issues arise in these bunch of petitions. This Court is of the opinion, as ordered earlier, it is the State who has to take action and not shift its responsibility on the Court at the first instance which is being sought to be done. Reference has also been made to the proceedings held on 12.09.2016 under the Chairmanship of the Vice Chancellor of respondent No.5-University wherein it was recorded that record of the Gold Field Institute was not complete and the students do not have the requisite eligibility.

Mr.Randhir Singh, Addl.AG, Haryana informs the Court that a message was sent for Deputy Director to come present to assist this Court, but none has come.

Resultantly, Principal Secretary to Govt. of Haryana, Medical Education and Research Department and Director, Medical Education and Research Department are directed to come present on the next date of hearing to explain what comprehensive plan can be chalked out regarding the above said grievances.

Adjourned to 19.09.2016.

Copy of the order be given to the learned State counsel for compliance of the order.

Copy of the order be placed on the files of other connected cases.”

In compliance of the said order, Mr. Dhanpat Singh, Addl. Chief Secretary and Principal Secretary of the Medical Education Research Department, Haryana alongwith Mr. D.K. Behra, Director Medical Education Research Department have come present. Mr. R.B. Singh, Dean of Pt. B.D. Sharma University of Health Sciences, Rohtak, respondent No.4 is also present.

The affidavit of Shri D.K. Behra, Director Medical Education Research Department dated 17.09.2016 has been filed. The said affidavit resolves in principle many of the issues, which were noticed in the earlier order as reproduced above. In principle the State has recognized the fact that the students who have migrated from M/s Gold Field Institute of Medical Sciences & Research (GFIMSR)-respondent No.6 to the private institutes, namely, SGT University, Budhera and M.M. University, Mullana respondents No.7 and 8, respectively would continue studying in those institutes and their examinations would also be certified from those institutes, which are private/deemed universities. The charges the students would be required to pay would be as per the public notice in pursuance of which they have already been shifted from GFIMSR and, thus, they can have no such grievance regarding the said charges for fee for the course which they have to complete on account of the closure of the GFIMSR, since GFIMSR was affiliated with the respondent No.4-University. Therefore, it is necessary that these students be issued migration certificates by respondent No.4-University.However, the exercise is to be done by consultation with the MCI by taking necessary approval.

Accordingly, the respondent No.4-University shall apply to MCI for the approval of the migration of those students to the private/deemed universities within a period of 4 weeks. The MCI

shall then process the said cases positively and take a decision on the same and allow the said migration within 4 weeks thereafter, keeping in view the peculiar facts and circumstances, since GFMSR has closed down and the essentiality certificate stands withdrawn. The State Government has thus taken positive steps to adjust the students to the other institutes to save their academic careers.

It has also been suggested to the Addl. Chief Secretary who has agreed that a Committee will be set up consisting of the (i) Vice-Chancellor of the respondent No.4-University alongwith; (ii) the Vice-Chancellors of the two private/deemed universities; (iii) Director, Medical Education & Research and (iv) Dean Academics of respondent No.4-University. The said Committee shall go into the other issues regarding the shortage of lectures and the eligibility of the students for the forthcoming exams. Wherever the students are short of lectures both of theory and practical a list will be displayed on the notice board of the institutions where the students are studying within 10 days from today.

In case, the students want to protest and want to raise any objection against the said shortage, it will be open to them to place relevant material before the Committee to show that they have the requisite eligibility to give the forthcoming examinations. In case any student is to be considered ineligible, he will inform the reasons for his ineligibility.

Counsel for the petitioners have raised objections to this fact and submitted that for no fault they have fallen short of lectures and, therefore, there should be exemption granted from the shortage of lectures or extra classes should be held.

The said prayer has been opposed by the counsel for the State and counsel for the MCI on the ground that the courses in question are of medicine and the students have to have adequate clinical and theory training. Therefore, in the absence of their eligibility, it would not be appropriate to grant any such exemption. The said objection is well justified. It has also been pointed out that on account of additional students of 4 batches, the medical institutions of the State are already under strain and therefore the faculty as such is not able to conduct extra classes. The State has already taken reasonable steps to adjust the students, so that their academic career is effected to the minimum. In such circumstances, the prayer of the petitioners as such for exemption, on account of the shortages of the lectures cannot be accepted and is, accordingly, declined.

It is further pointed out that there are 3 students in CWP No.12122 of 2016 who have only re-appear examinations to give and are in the final year, who are studying with the private/deemed University. A dispute has arisen as to whether they have to attend classes or not and as to whether they have to give examinations or not. The said students will also file appropriate applications before the Committee within 10 days and which shall take a call on the said issue within 10 days thereafter. It is, however, pointed out that the said students, since were studying with GFMSR which was affiliated with respondent No.4-University. Therefore, the said students will have to certified by the respondent No.4- University. The said students will also deposit the requisite charges for registration with the said Universities, who will further permit the m to sit in the following examinations, if found eligible. The issue of the

charges of the registration fee will also be considered by the Committee, who will take a decision on the same.

Since the matter was pending before this Court, the respondent-Universities will not charge any late fees for the examination forms which have to be filled up by the eligible students due to the pendency of the writ petition.

It will be open to the aggrieved parties to file appropriate applications in the cases, which are being admitted for regular hearing.

It would be open to the Committee also to keep into consideration the fact that the State Government is to receive the amount of bank guarantee from the GFMSR and in any case, if the students have any grouse regarding the amount of registration fee they have deposited with the said college, they have to be suitably reimbursed if the amounts are already deposited. This right would be in continuation of the earlier observations made in CWP-10700-2016 'Komal Poswal and others Vs. Union of India and others' decided on 03.08.2016 and observations made in CWP-12384-2016 'Monika Chhiller and others Vs. State of Haryana and others' decided on 15.09.2016. The State shall also take necessary steps for the encashment of the said bank guarantees in case there are no orders in favour of GFMSR, from the Apex Court.

Admitted.

Photocopy of this order be placed on the file of connected cases."

4. In terms of the above order the Council is required on the application of Pt. BD Sharma University of Health Sciences, Rohtak to approve the migration of those students to the private / deemed universities within a period of 4 weeks from the date of receipt of communication from the Pt. BD Sharma University of Health Sciences, Rohtak. Therefore, keeping in view the fact that the Gold Field Institute of Medical Sciences and Research, Faridabad has been closed and the Executive Committee of the Council has accorded approval to such closure. Subsequently shifting of the students admitted therein has already taken place. Hence, it would be appropriate to accord approval to the proposal received for shifting of students from the Registrar, Pt. BD Sharma University of Health Sciences, Rohtak vide its letter dated 14.10.2016....."

71. Renewal of permission for MBBS course for 5th batch (50 seats) of North Delhi Municipal Corporation Medical College, Delhi under Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, New Delhi u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 5th batch (50 seats) of North Delhi Municipal Corporation Medical College, Delhi under Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, New Delhi u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (24th and 25th October, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 13 % as detailed in the report.

2. Shortage of Residents is 11 % as detailed in the report.
3. Dr. Rani Kumar, Dean is shown as having experience of 45 years as Professor & 25 years as Asso. Prof. which is not feasible. This needs to be clarified.
4. Wards: Distance between 2 beds is < 1.5 m.
5. CT Scan is dual slice against minimum 16 slice.
6. Lecture Theaters: Hospital Lecture Theater is not available. E class facility is not available.
7. Students' Hostels: Accommodation is available for 117 students against requirement of 188.
8. Interns' Hostel: It is not available.
9. Residents' Hostels: Accommodation is available for 35 Residents against requirement of 54.
10. Nurses' Hostels: Accommodation is available for 35 Nurses against requirement of 41.
11. Residential quarters: 16 quarters are available for faculty against requirement of 18. 32 quarters are available for Non-teaching staff against requirement of 36.
12. MRD: It is partially computerized.
13. RHTC: Residential facility is not available.
14. The institute runs D.A. course under Delhi University & also DNB in Anaesthesia which is contrary to PG Medical Education Regulations.
15. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of 50 MBBS students at North Delhi Municipal Corporation Medical College, Delhi under Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, New Delhi u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.
