1. **Minutes of the Executive Committee Meeting held on 30th August, 2017 – Confirmation of.**

The Executive Committee of the Council confirmed the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting held on 30th August, 2017.

:ADDENDUM:

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that in the matter of Rohilkhand Medical College, Bareilly and Ulhas Patil Medical College, Jalgaon, a decision has been taken by circulation for processing the applications for postgraduate courses. The Executive Committee further noted that the application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18th March, 2016 in respect of the said two institutes stands revoked.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

2. **Minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee – Action taken thereon.**

The Executive Committee of the Council noted the action taken on the minutes of the Executive Committee meetings held on 8th August, 2017 & 30th August, 2017 (on the items that were “read and confirmed”). The Executive Committee further noted that rest of the minutes were pending approval of the Oversight Committee.

3. **Pending Items arising out of the decisions taken by the Executive Committee.**

The Executive Committee of the Council noted the pending items arising out of the decisions taken by the Executive Committee.

4. **Minutes of the Academic Committee meeting held on 17th August, 2017.**

Read: the matter with regard to minutes of the Academic Committee meeting held on 17th August, 2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the minutes of the Academic Committee meeting held on 17th August, 2017 and noted & approved the following items as under:-

- Item No.4. Minutes of the meetings of the Reconciliation Board to finalize UG curricula held on 3rd July, 2017.
- Item No.5. Minutes of the meeting of the Standing Group on Advance Course in Medical Education held on 18th July, 2017
- Item No.6. Note from UG Section regarding suggestion for running additional courses in evening shifts
- Item No.8. Letter received from Sh. Arun Singhal regarding a workshop on “Human Values & Health” Organized by MOH&FW.
- Item No.11 E-mail from Dr. Rahul Rao, Dy. M.S, I. G Hospital to President, MCI requesting incorporation of MD in Hospital Management in relevant schedule of MCI.

Item No.17 Letter from Sh.Amit Biswas regarding notification of Undergraduate Competency Based Curricula.

The Executive Committee of the Council further perused the minutes of the Academic Committee and observed the following:-

Item No.7. Note from UG Section regarding internship allowances for the MBBS students are not paid by private medical colleges in Karnataka.

The Executive Committee did not approve the recommendations of the Academic Committee as GME Regulations do not provide for payment of stipend to Interns. As such the issue is beyond the purview of MCI.

Item No.9 Guidelines and MSR for DM in Neuroradiology – Comments of PG Committee and Action Taken.

The Executive Committee decided that the matter be placed before the PG Committee. With regard to the comments of the Expert Group on the issues raised earlier by PG Committee, the observations of Executive Committee are as under:

- (1) No Journal can be prescribed by name. There cannot be more than 2 International & 1 National Journal as requirement.
- (2) Marking at final examination will be as per Regulations in vogue.
- (3) 20 beds are for the department as indoor beds. Beds in ICU, recovery, etc. cannot be considered towards indoor beds.
- (4) Requirement of Senior Resident shall be 1/Unit. Qualification & Experience shall be as per TEQ Regulations.

Item No.10 Guidelines, MSR and TEQ for DM in Organ Transplant Anesthesia & Critical Care.

The Executive Committee decided that the matter be placed before the PG Committee / TEQ Sub-committee.

Item No.12 Draft Guidelines, MSR & TEQ for (a) DM in Aviation Human Engineering (b) DM in Environmental & Space Physiology.

The Executive Committee decided that the matter be placed before the PG Committee.

Item No.13 Report of Expert Group on Forensic Medicine & Toxicology on RTI application dated 29-7-2016 from Dr. Indrajit Khandekar on (a) Forensic Medicine (FMT) teaching to be taken to later part of clinical years, (b) posting in FMT to be a part of Internship Programme, (c) steps to increase PG admission in FMT.

The Executive Committee approved as under:

- (1) Teaching in Forensic Medicine can be a component of overall Integrated Teaching Programme during III M.B;B.S. Phase I & Phase II.
- (2) Electives on Forensic Medicine as recommended in Choice Based Elective System in the undergraduate medical education programme are approved.

Item No.14 Revised Graduate Medical Regulations, 2017 and Competency based UG curricula.

The Executive Committee observed that there is no comparative chart of original Regulation, proposed change & reasons for the change in the proposed draft Regulations. The Executive Committee decided that the draft Regulations be resubmitted with a comparative chart showing original Regulation, proposed change and reasons/justification for the change to be placed before the Executive Committee at its next meeting.

Item No.15 Guidelines, MSR and TEQ for DM in Clinical Immunology & Rheumatology

The Executive Committee decided that the matter be placed before the PG Committee / TEQ Sub-committee.

Item No.18. With the permission of the Chair following items were discussed:

1. **Whether people with non-medical qualification in the subjects where teachers with non-medical qualification up to the prescribed percentage are permitted, would be appointed as Tutors in the said subjects.**

The Executive Committee approved the recommendations of the Academic Committee with the modification that they can be appointed as Tutors subject to overall ceiling for non-medical teachers as prescribed in TEQ Regulations; their qualifications should have been obtained from Faculty of Medicine / Medical College. If the teacher meets eligibility criteria for appointment as Assistant Professor upwards in the terms of qualification, experience, publications, then he can be promoted as permissible.

2. Whether teachers with non-medical qualifications in the subjects where they are permitted up to a permissible extent statutorily provided for would be appointed as Internal Examiners at the University examination.

The Executive Committee approved the recommendations of the Academic Committee with the modification that such a teacher can be appointed as examiner for M.B;B.S. examinations only. They cannot be appointed as examiners for PG examinations.

Office Note: Office is directed to place the items related with PG courses straightaway to PG Committee for its consideration without waiting for approval of Minutes of meeting of Academic Committee by Executive Committee. Further, in case Academic Committee has recommended that an item be placed before a Sub-Committee (E.g. TEQ Sub-committee), the same should be placed before respective Sub-committee without waiting for approval of Minutes of meeting of Academic Committee by Executive Committee and the item should be placed before Executive Committee for its consideration along with the recommendation of the respective Sub-committee.

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The Executive Committee decided to refer back the matter to the Ethics Committee since there is discrepancy in the punishment awarded to Dr. Anant Marathe, Asso. Prof. of Microbiology and Dr. Kanu Verma, Asst. Prof. of Skin & VD and that which has been approved by Executive Committee at its meeting held on 22.03.2016 in similar matters. Further, no punishment has been recommended for the Dean of the Institute.

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The Executive Committee approved the proceedings of the Ethics Committee and directed the office to request Delhi Medical Council to file a complaint before police authorities in this regard.

7. Prathima Institute of Medical Sciences, Karimnagar – Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2018-19.

Read: the matter with regard to Prathima Institute of Medical Sciences, Karimnagar – Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (10/11.08.2017) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 4th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 in respect of Prathima Institute of Medical Sciences, Karimnagar under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

8. Narayana Medical College, Nellore – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2018-19.

Read: the matter with regard to Narayana Medical College, Nellore – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (10/11.08.2017) and noted the following:-

1. In Medicine ward many of the patients appeared quite comfortable and admitted for trivial diseases like anemia, acid peptic disease, hypothyroidism without any complications, Neck pain & myalgia. (Evidence sheet given). None of the patients were receiving IV fluids suggesting unnecessary hospitalization. No separate register for treatment/dose schedule book is maintained by nursing staff. No daily ward census was available.
2. On enquiry with one of the patient named Sandip Kumar admitted under Medicine Unit-V, OP/ID No.20170778055, it was learnt that he was actually admitted on 09/08/2017. However, the case sheet records show the admission date as 4th August, 2017. Similar cases were noted in other wards also where discrepancy between available record & patients own version.
3. In TB & Chest ward all patients were looking healthy & comfortable without any patient receiving oxygen therapy.
4. In Dermatology ward patients were admitted for simple conditions like Eczema, deformities with Leprosy without need for active hospitalization.
5. In Orthopedics ward many patients admitted with minor ailments without any indication for hospitalization.

6. In Pediatrics ward Diet register is not updated after 08.08.2017. Duty staff report register was not also updated.
7. There were only 2 Normal Deliveries & 1 Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
8. OPD: Plaster room & Plaster cutting room are common. In O.G. OPD, separate rooms for Antenatal clinic & Sterility clinic are not available which are required as routine OPD timings are upto 5 p.m. (P. 28)
9. Interns' Hostel: Available accommodation is for 154 against 250 required.
10. Students' Hostels: In Boys' Hostel, Visitors' room, A.C. Study room are not available. In Study room of Girls' Hostel, there is no Study room or computer.
11. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 in respect of Narayana Medical College, Nellore under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

9. Smt. NHL Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad– Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2018-19.

Read: the matter with regard to Smt. NHL Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (10/11.08.2017) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 in respect of Smt. NHL Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad under Gujarat University, Ahmedabad, u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

10. Kamineni Institute of Medical Sciences, Narketpally,–Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2018-19.

Read: the matter with regard to Kamineni Institute of Medical Sciences, Narketpally– Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (10/11.08.2017) alongwith a representation/letter dated Nil received from the Principal of the college and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 4th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 in respect of Kamineni Institute of Medical Sciences, Narketpally under Kaloji Narayana Rao University of Health Sciences, Warangal u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

11. Sree Balaji Medical College and Hospital, Chennai– Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2018-19.

Read: the matter with regard to Sree Balaji Medical College and Hospital, Chennai – Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (10/11.08.2017) and noted the following:-

1. OPD attendance at 2 p.m. on day of assessment was 2,022 against requirement of 3,000.
2. Bed Occupancy at 10 a.m. on day of assessment was 52 %.
3. Exact OPD attendance (New+Old cases) collected personally by inspecting all OPD attendance registers at 2 p.m. is

- (i) General Medicine – 333(165+168)
- (ii) Pediatrics – 223(123+100)
- (iii) Dermatology -195(123+72)
- (iv) Psychiatry-64(29+35)
- (v) Pulmonary Medicine-88(46+42)
- (vi) General Surgery – 302(148+154)
- (vii) Orthopedics – 278(150+128)
- (viii) ENT – 184 (97+87)
- (ix) Eye – 185 (89+96)
- (x) Obst/Gynae-170(83+87)

There were NIL patients in OPD complex at that time with OPD chambers being occupied by hospital staff.

4. Healthy individuals and patients with simple OPD like problems viz.cough,cold, mild anaemia, short duration viral fever (but no documentation), malaise, knee pain (osteo arthritis many cases) back pain, ankle sprain, cervical spondylosis, boils, rhinitis, urticaria, normal pregnant females, gastritis, pain abdomen with no findings, pulmonary cases with no chest findings or x-rays done, urinary tract infections etc. and patients who were fit for discharge but being unnecessarily hospitalized have not been considered. Huge amount of fabrications, manipulations and falsification wrt patients, case files and data was observed.
5. Many case files appeared prepared totally unrelated to patient's complaints. Then with some another handwriting in between the original comments Injections, and/or I/V fluids are written which the patient never gets or/is required. Certain printed investigation reports were attached with case files but name/age/sex were handwritten. Such patients denied having any investigations being done. Patients admitted with fever had no recording of elevated temperature in their TPR charts. In some of the TPR charts verified the pattern was unnatural and overwritten on a normal graph.
6. Many health looking patients especially in Paediatrics and General Medicine wards had prescription of Intravenous Antibiotics/fluids but the I/V cannula was just placed on the dorsum of hand covered with white leucoplast. On getting suspicious, we the assessors opened the plaster and found no piercing of vein. Videography of this exposure in randomly picked up couple of cases (Krishna,8 years old, IP No.0843783 and Vignesh, 13 years old, 0842771) was made and is enclosed for the perusal of Council.
7. In Respiratory medicine ward 46 patients were shown to be suffering from COPD/Bronchial Asthma. However more than 90% of them did not have an X-Ray done or any bronchodilator being prescribed in case records. On Auscultation of the patient's chest by Clinical Assessor, Chest was totally clear with no abnormal finding in those patients.
8. Asymptomatic patients with Allergic Rhinitis were admitted in Respiratory medicine ward.
9. Psychiatry ward had majority of mild depression cases admitted.
10. On verification of Ward Side Lab of Department of General Medicine meant for 120 beds the number of investigations done were 2 on 10th August and 3 on 9th August.

11. In Orthopedics Departments, on verification of patients only 10 to 15% of the admitted patients had Fractures, of which less than 5 patients were fresh cases. On physical verification of Orthopedics IPD Register for month of June and July 2017, peculiar monotonous uniform pattern was observed with respect to daily IPD figure or all days the number of transferred in TRIN and transferred out TROT were exactly same on all the days signifying manipulation of data.
12. Obstetric workload is less for training of 250 students.
13. OPD: Immunization workload is very low. It reflects poorer Paediatric OPD attendance.
14. Students' Hostels: In H Block, no student is staying. Some construction labourers are staying. Corridors and Stairs are full of garbage and filthy.
15. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 4th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 in respect of Sree Balaji Medical College and Hospital, Chennai, under Bharath University, Chennai, u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18th March, 2016, which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2018-19) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

12. Mahatma Gandhi Medical College & Research Institute, Pondicherry– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2018-19.

Read: the matter with regard to Mahatma Gandhi Medical College & Research Institute, Pondicherry– Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (10/11.08.2017) and noted the following:-

1. In respect of Dr. Prasanna Venkatesh, Senior Resident in Ophthalmology, his D.F. is modified with a white marker & his Designation/Experience in the inside page is shown as Junior Resident only.
2. OPD: In General Surgery OPD, there is no signage board of Major Specialty or Super Specialty.
3. In General Surgery & Orthopaedics OPD, number of patients registered at 12 noon on day of assessment does not tally with number of patients seen in individual consultation chambers.
4. Wards: Female General Surgery ward does not have Demonstration room. Female Orthopaedics & ENT patients are admitted in a single ward with only one Nursing station.
5. MRD: It is partially computerized. Records are not kept properly. 50 % of the records are dumped.
6. Blood Bank: Stocks are not maintaining refreshments to be served to Blood Donors.
7. Lecture Theaters: Capacity of Hospital Lecture theater is 200 against requirement of 300.
8. Interns' Hostel: There is no separate hostel for Interns. It is combined with PG Hostel; however total accommodation available in PG Hostel is 239 against requirement of 378 (i.e. 250 Interns + 128 Residents).
9. RHTC: Infrastructural facilities are inadequate as detailed in the report.
10. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 in respect of Mahatma Gandhi Medical College & Research Institute, Pondicherry, under Sri Balaji Vidyappeth (Deemed University), Puducherry, u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

13. Rural Medical College, Loni– Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 125-200 for the academic session 2018-19.

Read: the matter with regard to Rural Medical College, Loni– Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 125-200 for the academic session 2018-19.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 60-150 in respect of St. John Medical College, Bangalore, under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18th March, 2016, which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

- (c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized

u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2018-19) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956 alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

3. Audiometry & Speech Therapy are not found in OPD area.
4. Labour Room: Septic Labour room & Eclampsia room are not available.
5. Radiodiagnosis department: 2 Static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 5. 2 USG are available against requirement of 3.
6. CT Scan is under PPP mode. Details of MOU for PPP mode are not provided.
7. MRD: It is manual.
8. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at Shimoga Institute of Medical Sciences, Shimoga under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

66. Hassan Institute of Medical Sciences, Hassan – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2018-19.

Read: the matter with regard to Hassan Institute of Medical Sciences, Hassan – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (28/29.08.2017) and noted the following:-

1. Dr. K. Shankar, Medical Superintendent has only 8 years administrative experience against requirement of 10 years; hence not qualified to hold the post.
2. Students' Hostels: There is deficiency of 95 rooms.

3. The institution has total 750 bed capacity against the requirements of 720 beds. However, there is deficiency in the number of beds specialitywise as under:

4. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2nd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 in respect of Hassan Institute of Medical Sciences, Hassan, under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

Read: the matter with regard to compliance verification assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at MNR Medical College & Hospital, Sangareddy under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (28.08.2017) along with previous assessment reports (07.02.2017, 20.04.2016 and 16th & 17th February, 2016) and decided to revoke the decision of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.3.2016.

71. Amendment proposal dated 28.04.2017 to the GMER and PGMER for incorporating the provision of NEET regulations.

Read: the matter with regard to amendment proposal dated 28.04.2017 to the GMER and PGMER for incorporating the provision of NEET regulations.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter pertains to grant of Eligibility Certificate to students of National Institute of Open Schooling. In this regard the opinion of Ld. Addl. Solicitor General is as under:

“

Thus, I am of the considered opinion that candidates for obtaining Eligibility Certificates would mandatorily need to fulfil all the requirements as prescribed by the Eligibility Requirement for Taking Admission in an Undergraduate Medical Course in a Foreign Medical Institution Regulations, 2002 including the requirement of Classroom training the subjects of Physics, Chemistry, Biology and English, simultaneous and co-terminus including taking practical examination in class 11th and 12th as prescribed under the Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997. Any candidate who has not undergone Classroom training the subjects of Physics, Chemistry, Biology and English simultaneous and co-terminus including taking practical examination in class 11th and 12th, will not be eligible for grant of Eligibility Certificate for the purpose of seeking admission in primary medicine course in a foreign medical institute and therefore also ineligible to appear in the Screening Test for obtaining registration to practice medicine in the country”.....

The Executive Committee further noted the opinion of the the Chairman, Academic Committee stating that “it is loud and clear on the said issue for the reasons cited there at, the learners from NIOS would not be on par with those from the regular mode. Resultantly they would be ineligible for NEET on equitable bases, Notification dated 09.08.2017 be maintained.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to approve the opinion of Ld. Addl. Solicitor General and the opinion of the Chairman, Academic Committee and directed the office to act accordingly. The Committee further decided that NIOS be also informed accordingly.

5. Lecture Theaters: Hospital lecture Theater is not of Gallery type. Deficiency remains as it is.
6. Interns' Hostel: It is not yet functional. Deficiency remains as it is.
7. Residents' Hostel: It is not yet functional. Deficiency remains as it is.
8. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided not to recommend continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore in respect of students being trained at Belagavi Institute of Medical Sciences, Belagavi and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance after rectification of the above deficiencies within one month.

73. - (d) If the petitioner-institution remains compliant, the consequences shall follow.”

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to direct the institute not to admit the students for the academic session 2018-19 and further decided to recommend to the Central Govt. for withdrawal of recognition of the MBBS degree granted by Jawahar Medical Foundation's Annasaheb Chudaman Patil Memorial Medical College, Dhule u/s 19 of the IMC Act, 1956 in view of the persisting deficiencies.

J. Govt. Medical College, Pune and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month.

98. Dayanand Medical College & Hospital, Ludhiana – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 70-100 for the academic session 2018-19 – regarding.

Read : the matter with regard to Dayanand Medical College & Hospital, Ludhiana – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 70-100 for the academic session 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (7th and 8th September, 2017) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 70-100 in respect of Dayanand Medical College & Hospital, Ludhiana under Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2018-19.

99. Creation of minimum number of Hindi Posts for the compliance/implementation of the Official Languages Policy of the Central Government and compliance of Official Language Act.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the draft RR are not vetted by A & G Sub-committee. It is also not clear with regard to the post of Hindi Officer whether it is equivalent to the post of Asst. Director (OL) or not or whether these posts have different hierarchy structure. Further parity with existing posts in Council may also have to be examined.

In view of above, the Executive Committee directed the office to place the matter before the Administration and Grievance Sub-Committee alongwith the opinion of Consultant (Admn) and resubmit the matter thereafter.

100. Approval of the minutes of the Finance Committee meeting held on 07thSept., 2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the minutes of the Finance Committee meeting held on 07thSept., 2017.

101. To relocate the students of Fathima Institute of Medical Sciences, Kadapa, Andhra Pradesh (2015-2016 batch) in the Govt. /Private Medical Colleges in the State of Andhra Pradesh.

Read: the matter with regard to relocate the students of Fathima Institute of Medical Sciences, Kadapa, Andhra Pradesh (2015-2016 batch) in the Govt. /Private Medical Colleges in the State of Andhra Pradesh.

The Executive Committee noted that the Government of Andhra Pradesh has filed an application before the Hon'ble Supreme Court for seeking permission/directions of the Hon'ble Apex Court to relocate the first year medical students of 2015-16 batch of Fathima Institute of Medical Sciences in other Medical Colleges in the State of Andhra Pradesh.

The prayer made by the Government of Andhra Pradesh before the Hon'ble Supreme Court reads as under:

- (a) *Grant permission to the applicant State of Andhra Pradesh to relocate the students admitted for the academic year 2015-16 in 'Fathima Institute of Medical Sciences', Ramarajupally, Kadapa District, and approved by Dr. NTR University for Health Sciences, in the other colleges in the State of Andhra Pradesh for the academic year 2017-2018.*
- (b) *Pass such other order or orders as his Hon'ble Court may deem just and proper in the circumstances of the case.*

The application filed by the State Government was listed before the Hon'ble Supreme Court on 30.08.2017 wherein the Hon'ble Supreme Court was pleased to pass the following order:

"Issue notice to the Medical Council of India (MCI) and the Union of India, returnable on 21st September, 2017.

Dasti, in addition, is permitted.

Within a period of two weeks from today, the applicant- State of Andhra Pradesh shall file a detailed affidavit/report indicating the colleges in which the State proposes to relocate the students of the Fathima Institute of Medical Sciences, Ramarajupally, Kadapa District (2015-2016 batch) and the intake capacity of each of such colleges and extent of which such intake capacity would be reduced by the proposed

relocation. The relocation mentioned above, naturally, is in respect of the first year of the MBBS course.

The stand of the MCI and the Union of India be laid before the Court within a period of two weeks from the date of receipt of the report/affidavit of the State.

List the applicants on 21st September, 2017.”

The matter was taken up by the Hon'ble Supreme Court on 22.09.2017 and it is now listed for 11.10.2017.

The Executive Committee noted that for the academic year 2015-16, the Central Government had not granted renewal of the permission to Fathima Institute of Medical Sciences. The Management of the College had filed W.P No. 9215 of 2015 on 22.09.2015 before the Hon'ble High Court of Delhi wherein the college had challenged the vires of Regulation 8(3) (1) C of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999. The College had also sought for quashing of orders/reports of MCI as also directions for granting provisional permission to conduct course for the academic year 2015-16. On 23.09.2015, the management of the college had filed W.P No. 31371 of 2015 before the Hon'ble High Court of Hyderabad. Both the writ petitions were filed seeking the same relief. On 28.09.2015 in the W.P filed before the Hon'ble High Court of Delhi, the petitioner submitted that it did not wish to press the prayer challenging the vires of Regulation and that it may be listed as per roster before the Single Judge. The case was listed before the Ld. Single Judge of the Hon'ble High Delhi Court on 29.09.15. The College made the request to withdraw its Petition. Accordingly, the Hon'ble High Court dismissed the Petition as withdrawn.

Meanwhile, on 29.09.2015 in the W.P No. listed before the Hon'ble High Court of Andhra Pradesh an interim order was passed by the Hon'ble High Court allowing provisional admission in the Fathima Institute of Medical Sciences. Accordingly, the students of 2015-16 batch were admitted pursuant to the interim order dated 29.09.17 of the Hon'ble High Court of Andhra Pradesh in WP No. 31371/2015. It was made clear by the Hon'ble High Court that the students allotted and admissions made pursuant to the interim order were provisional and subject to further orders of the Court and no equities could be claimed by any students.

The Executive Committee noted that the Council had filed Writ Appeal No. 1101/2015 before the Hon'ble High Court of Andhra Pradesh against the interim order. The Writ Petition filed by the College and Writ Appeal of the Council were heard together and were finally decided by the Hon'ble High Court on 20.04.16. The Hon'ble High Court of Andhra Pradesh had held that the management of the college of suppressing the filing of Writ petitions seeking identical relief from the two High Courts and making a false and misleading statement in the body of W.P that they have not filed any other petition for the relief sought in the instant petition. The Hon'ble High Court on 20.04.2016 dismissed the W.P No. 31371 of 2015 filed by the Management of the College and allowed the Writ Appeal of the Council. The Hon'ble High Court further directed the College to refund the entire amount collected from the students toward fees and other expenses.

The management of the College and the students aggrieved by the aforesaid order of the Hon'ble High Court by way of SLP (C) Nos. 14355 of 2016 and 15166 of 2016 challenged the order passed by the Hon'ble High Court in W.P No. 31371 of 2015. The Hon'ble Supreme Court was pleased to dismiss on 23.05.2016 the SLP filed by the college while the SLP filed by the student was permitted to be dismissed as withdrawn.

Thereafter, the college authority had moved a review petition being Review W.P.M.P No. 36969 of 2016 in W.P No. 31371 of 2015 and Review W.P.M.P. No. 1965 of 2016 in W.A. No. 1101 of 2015 before the Hon'ble High Court of Andhra Pradesh. This review petition came to be dismissed by the Hon'ble High Court on 01.09.2016.

The Executive Committee further noted that the students had filed SLP (C) No. 20106 of 2016 – Shervani Zakira Jhanam & Ors. Vs. Union of India & Ors. (Arising out of impugned final judgment and order dated 01.09.2016 in W.P No. 31371 of 2015 20.04.2016 in W.P No. 31371 of 2015 01.09.2016 in W.P.M.P No. 36969 of 2016 passed by the High Court of Judicature at Hyderabad for the State of Telangana and the State of Andhra Pradesh). This SLP was dismissed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court on 18.11.16.

The Executive Committee also noted that SLP (C) No. 30590-30591 of 2016 – Syed Shah Naimath & Ors. vs. Union of India & Ors . (Arising out of impugned final judgments and order dated 20/04/2016 in WP N. 31371/2015 and 01/09/2016 in RWPMP No. 36969/2016 passed by the High Court of Judicature At Hyderabad for the State of Telangana and the State of Andhra Pradesh) came to be disposed of with the following order on 14.12.16 by the Apex Court:

“Heard the learned counsels for the parties and perused the relevant material. Permission to file additional documents is granted. We do not find any legal and valid ground for interference. The Special Leave Petitions are dismissed.”

The Executive Committee also noted that vide order dated 08.09.17 in WP No. 24655 of 2017 the Hon'ble High Court of Andhra Pradesh had dismissed the Writ Petition of the students of 2015-16 batch seeking a direction to be accommodated in some other College for the academic year 2017-18.

The above referred judicial orders loudly and clearly bring out that the admission of students for the academic year 2015-16 in MBBS Fathima Institute was without the authority of law and the Hon'ble High Courts and the Hon'ble Supreme Court had decided not to grant any relief to the management of the College and the students of 2015-16 batch of MBBS.

In view of the above the proposal of the State Government to adjust/relocate these students in Government Medical Colleges of Andhra Pradesh on sympathetic grounds cannot be considered by this Council as the Council cannot relax the requirements of Regulations. Furthermore, acceptance of such proposal amounts to reducing the number of seats in Government Medical Colleges in the next academic year which compromises the interest of students who are admitted on merit in Government Medical Colleges and makes way for students admitted illegally in private Medical Colleges to gain entry into a Government Medical College. The decision may be conveyed to Standing Counsel for placing before the Hon'ble Supreme Court.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

102. Renewal of permission for MBBS course for 4th batch (150 seats) of RKDF Medical College Hospital & Research Center, Jatkhedi, Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh under Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan University, Bhopal u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 4th batch (150 seats) of RKDF Medical College Hospital & Research Center, Jatkhedi, Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh under Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan University, Bhopal u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

The Executive Committee noted that vide order dated 14/08/2017 the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India in the matter of Medical Council of India V/S RKDF Medical College Hospital and Research Centre & Anr - SLP (Civil) No 20400 of 2017 had decided as under:-

“Having heard learned Senior Counsel appearing for the parties and upon perusal of the record, we are of the view that re-inspection of the respondent-college as ordered by the High Court vide the impugned order, may be carried out by the Medical Council of India by following a due procedure on a permissible day.

We order accordingly.

In the meantime, we also direct that any admission that may be given by the respondent-college to any student shall be completely provisional in nature, being dependent on the result of the inspection. In other words, if the respondent-college fails in the inspection, the students' admission will be liable to be cancelled forthwith, and they will not be entitled to claim any equity in that regard before any court of law.

At the time of admission, the Counseling Committee shall inform the students of the above condition.

The imposition of the above condition would have been avoided if the High Court had not permitted the admission before the result of the inspection.

With the aforesaid directions, the special leave petition stands disposed of.

As a sequel to the above, pending interlocutory application, if any, stand disposed of".

Thus, the Council in pursuance of the Order dated 21.07.2017 passed by the Hon'ble High Court of M.P. at Jabalpur in W.P. No. 08160/ 2017 and Order dated 14.08.2017 passed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court in SLP (C) No. 20400/2017 filed by the MCI Vs. R.K.D.F. Medical College Hospital & Research Centre & Anr., appointed the assessors to carry out the assessment of the physical and other teaching facilities available for renewal of permission for MBBS course for 4th batch (150 seats) of RKDF Medical College Hospital & Research Center, Jatkhedhi, Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh under Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan University, Bhopal u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018 on 14th & 15th Sept., 2017. The Executive Committee further noted that the Council has received a letter dated 14.09.2017 from the team of appointed Assessors with regard to the conduct of the medical college as well as the premature termination of the assessment process by the college authorities and the assessment report part-II. The Executive Committee also considered the representation dated 14.09.2017 from the Dean, RKDF Medical College Hospital & Research Centre, Bhopal, M.P. received through an email dated 15.09.2017. The Executive Committee considered the assessment report dated 14.09.2017 and noted the following deficiencies:-

1. *Assessment was terminated prematurely at 11:40 a.m. by the Institute.*
2. *Deficiency of faculty as evidenced by attendance sheet was 35.04 % as detailed in the report. Physical verification could not be done as the assessment was terminated prematurely at 11:40 a.m. by the Institute.*
3. *Shortage of Residents as evidenced by attendance sheet was 57.57 % as detailed in the report. Physical verification could not be done as the assessment was terminated prematurely at 11:40 a.m. by the Institute.*
4. *Bed Occupancy at 10 a.m. on day of assessment was 18.29 % (i.e. 75 out of 410) at 10 a.m. on day of assessment.*
5. *Wards of General Medicine, Obstetrics were locked at time of visit.*
6. *Facilities were non-functional in wards of Paediatrics, Tb & Chest, Psychiatry, Skin & VD, Ophthalmology.*
7. *In General Surgery wards, all the patients were sitting/lying on the beds had no inpatient case sheet, OPD paper indicating that they were not genuine patients. Several beds in the wards did not have mattress & bed sheets. Patient details were not entered in ward registers. There was no post-operative patient in any Surgical ward.*
8. *In Orthopaedics wards, only 2 out of 18 IPD patients had inpatient case sheets. Patient details were not entered in ward registers. There was no post-operative patient.*
9. *ENT: None of IPD patients had inpatient case sheet. Patient details were not entered in ward registers. There was no post-operative patient.*
10. *In Gynaec ward, only 2 out of 20 IPD patients had inpatient case sheets which were incomplete. Patient details were not entered in ward registers. There was no post-operative patient. No patient has IV line, IV stand, treatment chart.*

11. *In OPD, no patient was seen in OPDs of Paediatrics, General Surgery, Psychiatry, Skin & VD OPDs at 10:45 a.m. during the visit. Only 4 patients were seen in General Medicine OPD at time of visit. Other OPDs could not be assessed as the assessment was terminated by the college.*
12. *There were no Dressing Material, Dressing Instruments are not available.*
13. *Casualty: Out of 7 patients, 2 did not have case papers. 1 patient was operated under Local Anaesthesia on the previous day. 1 female patient was admitted before a week. 1 patient of debridement was admitted on 08/09/2017. 1 patient of knee joint pain was admitted on 12/09/2017 & another of Viral fever was admitted on 12/09/2017. Patients admitted in Casualty did not merit admission in Casualty. Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available.*
14. *ICUs: Total 3 patients were admitted in combined ICCU, MICU, SICU. There was NIL patient in PICU/NICU. Resuscitation equipment are inadequate.*
15. *Labour Room: There was no patient in Labour room at time of visit.*

The Executive Committee also considered that the Assessors who had conducted assessment on 14.09.17 had in their letter addressed to the Secretary, MCI stated as under:-

“As per the MCI order vide reference cited above for assessment, which we received at 9.23 am and 9.32 a.m. IST on 14/9/2017, we the undersigned Dr. Vimala Thomas, Dr. Dipesh Duttaroy and Dr. Ashok Anand reached RKDF Medical College Hospital and Research Centre, Jatkhedhi, Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh for the assessment to be carried out for 2 days. When our team (3 assessors and one videographer, Mr. Prem Shankar Tiwari) reached RKF Medical College and went to the Dean’s office to inform him and take his permission for the assessment, he was not available. We waited for him in his chambers; however, we informed the office staff who in turn contacted him and other officials of the college. We took permission from the office staff Ms. Rimjhim to take a print out of our MCI office order from their computer. She permitted us. The Dean finally arrived at 10.20 am and we introduced ourselves and informed him that we have been directed by the MCI, Delhi to conduct the assessment of RKDF Medical College Hospital and Research Centre on 14th and 15th September 2017 and handed him our MCI order copy as well as our letter indicating our requirements regarding the conduct of assessment. He took the same and after reading it, signed on it indicating on it the time and date and permitted us to carry out the assessment. Documentary evidence of the same signed paper is attached. Videographic evidence of this is also furnished. Since the initial process involved taking the attendance of the faculty and residents, we informed the Dean, Dr. Kushwah that the working of the hospital should not be effected during this process and that the attendance of faculty and residents in the operation theatres would be taken by one of the assessors going to Operation theatre. We requested the Dean to submit the attendance registers of all the departments and faculty and resident doctors list. We also requested him to provide us two videographers to record the proceedings. He was also requested to keep ready and submit the declaration forms, night duty roster of the residents and the standard assessment forms. Regarding the attendance registers at that time on his desk he had only the registers of Pharmacology and Microbiology which he gave us. Documentary evidence of the same is submitted in photographic form.

With the permission of the Dean, Dr. Dipesh Duttaroy and Dr. Ashok Anand, went to the hospital along with 2 faculty members assigned by the Dean, Dr. Saxena, Professor and HOD, Surgery and Dr. Santosh Raikur, Professor of Radiology. Then, Dr. Vimala Thomas along with the Dean went for faculty and Residents attendance in the 2nd floor of the college building where the faculty and residents had assembled in one of the lecture halls. The attendance of the faculty and residents had assembled in one of the lecture halls. The attendance of the faculty and residence was continued till 11.10 am (a total of 64 faculty and 29 residents). Then Dr. Vimala Thomas along with the Dean went down to his chambers. The Dean was again requested to submit the attendance registers, but he failed to do the same. A few doctors who came late, their attendance was then taken in the Dean’s chambers. During this process, the Dean was telling the doctors and residents who had come late to go out since he wanted to discuss something with Dr. Vimala Thomas, but Dr. Vimala Thomas insisted that since the faculty and residents had come to first allow them all to sign in the late attendance (a total of 7

Faculty and 2 JRs). Copies of all the attendance sheets (before 11.10 am and late attendance) are attached. Then suddenly the Dean told Dr. Vimala Thomas that they want to call off the assessment, stating that since we had come at 10 am, they did not want to continue with the inspection. She then told him, that he had allowed the team to start the process of assessment and sent his faculty to help us in the process, and since then, we had already taken the attendance of the faculty and residents and most probably the assessors in the hospital would have finished the bed occupancy and seen the clinical material in the wards and OPDs, we should be allowed to continue with the work assigned to us. He insisted that he wanted to call it off. He then sent some of the college personnel to the other assessors who were assessing the clinical material and infrastructure in the hospital to ask them to come immediately to the Dean's chambers.

From the time Dr. Duttaroy and Dr. Ashok Anand had visited the hospital, they had assessed the bed occupancy (a total of 75 patients in the teaching beds, 3 in the ICU wards and 7 in the casualty), all the wards, the OPDs, the casualty, ICUs and Labour room. Details are mentioned in the SAF II form.

Officials from the medical college who were sent by the Dean then went to Dr. Ashok Anand and Dr. Dipesh Duttaroy and informed them to stop assessment and come to the Dean chambers. Following which both came to the Dean's chambers.

The Dean then again told Dr. Ashok Anand and Dr. Dipesh Duttaroy that he did not want us to continue with the assessment. The videographer who was with us, recorded this in the meantime around 25 people from the management side entered the Dean's chamber, and started abusing the videographer Mr. Prem Shankar Tiwari, tole him to stop the videography and manually and forcibly pushed him out the Dean's chamber and then started shouting at us. They said that they did not want us to continue with our assessment since we came at 10 am and as per the Supreme Court order, we should have come with the Police officials. We did inform them, that we had not received any such instructions from MCI and we were willing to continue our assessment for the 2 days. They were verbally abusive and wanted us to leave and one of the management person snatched the evidence sheets (of bed occupancy of the Medical wards) from Dr. Ashok Anand, and in spite of our request, they refused to hand it over to us and in fact they told us "what paper", and it is their property now since it had signatures of their officials on it. They also tried to approach Dr. Vimala Thomas and snatch her papers, but they were not successful. One of them who said he was Pediatrician was very vociferous, threatening us and intimidating us. He threatened the team telling that you will have to come often to Supreme Court. We were at that point of time really scared since we had around 25 people surrounding us, shouting at us for coming at 10am and threatening our physical safety. All this has been captured in the cameras present in the Dean's chamber but which we do not have since our videographer was sent out forcibly. We then informed the officials of the Medical Council of India of the happenings at the college regarding the refusal of the college authorities to continue with the assessment and there aggressive behavior towards us. They also threatened to physically assault us if we did not leave their premises. The group who were in the Dean's chambers also tried to physically manhandle both the male Assessors. Management people were coercing us to sign on a paper that stated that we had reached their College at 11.00 AM only. On this protext, they wanted to call off the assessment. We refused to sign on any such paper as we had reached the College at 10.00AM. Moreover, they insisted that they had videographic evidence of us entering the Medical College at 11.00 AM. The college management continued this tirade of shouting and threatening us, following which we were forced to leave the institution.

For the assessment we had travelled from Delhi to Bhopal by flight in the morning and we had booked a one way cab from the airport to reach the medical college. The cab left after dropping us at the medical college campus. Since this assessment was prematurely called off by the Dean and college authorities, and we were literally sent out of the college, we who had come with suitcases had to walk for more than half a kilometre, before we could book an OLA cab (receipt attached) and leave the neighbourhood of the college. We then booked our hotel in Bhopal and prepared our report to submit to the MCI, Delhi the next day. This report is based on the information we had collected for the time we were present in the Medical College till the assessment was prematurely called off by the Dean.

Please find attached our report along with the documentary, videographic and photographic evidence.

We wish to state that we are three senior Professors from Government Medical Colleges of 3 different state namely Telangana, Gujarat and Maharashtra. We have been entrusted with the responsibility of conducting assessments on behalf of Medical Council of India on a purely honorary basis for the betterment of Medical Education in India. The behaviour meted out to us by this college is uncivilized and highly deplorable. We request you to take strict action against such colleges so as to ensure the integrity and surprise element of assessment process is ensured. It must be also ensured that the dignity of the medical teacher is not compromised."

In view of the aforesaid facts, the Executive Committee decides that the conduct of the authorities of the Medical College in threatening, intimidating and coercing the Assessors, leads to the disruption of the Statutory functioning of the MCI and that the same cannot be ignored or taken lightly. In this regard, the medical college is called upon to submit an explanation within two weeks.

It was noted that since in pursuance of Order dated 21.07.2017 passed by the Hon'ble High Court of M.P. at Jabalpur in W.P. No. 08160/ 2017, students had been admitted in MBBS course for academic year 2017-18, therefore in the interest of the students another assessment of the College was conducted on 25-26 September 2017. The Executive Committee Members were apprised by the Secretary during the meeting that the Council has received the assessment report dated 25-26 September 2017 via email from the assessment team, whereafter in view of the urgency in the matter, the same was taken up for consideration.

The Executive Committee after considering the assessment report dated 25-26 September 2017 and after due deliberation noted that the following deficiencies:-

1. Bed Occupancy at 10 a.m. on day of assessment was 01.07 % (i.e. 7 out of 410).
2. There were no Major Surgical operation on day of assessment.
3. There was NIL Normal Delivery or LSCS on day of assessment.
4. Data of Clinical material like Casualty attendance, Discharges, Major & Minor Operations, Radiological Investigations as provided by the Institute are inflated.
5. ICUs: There was NIL patient in NICU/PICU & only 1 patient each in ICCU, MICU, SICU on day of assessment.
6. Blood Bank: NIL Unit was dispensed on day of assessment.
7. Deficiency of faculty is 15.65 % as detailed in the report.
8. Shortage of residents is 40 % as detailed in the report.
9. Diet order was not recorded in the register on day of assessment.
10. MRD is partly manual.
11. Facilities in Central research Laboratory are not adequate. There are NIL ongoing or completed research projects.
12. RHTC: Cold Chain equipment are not available. Survey / MCH / Immunization / Family Welfare registers are not available. No activities under National Health programmes are carried out.
13. UHCC: Cold Chain equipment are not available. Survey / MCH / Immunization / Family Welfare registers are not available.
14. Dean has disagreed with many deficiencies of Faculty & Residents, Bed Occupancy, clinical material etc.

The above noted deficiencies in the assessments conducted on 14th September 2017 and 25th-26th September 2017 clearly bring out that the College has completely failed to comply with the requirement of MCI Regulations regarding teaching faculty, clinical material, infrastructure and other physical infrastructure.

Therefore, in terms of the order dated 14.08.2017 as passed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court in the matter of Medical Council of India V/S RKDF Medical

College Hospital and Research Centre & Anr - SLP (Civil) No 20400 of 2017, and also in view of the deficiencies as found in the Medical College during the inspections conducted on 14th September 2017 and 25th-26th September 2017, the admission of 4th batch of 150 MBBS students admitted for the academic year 2017-18 stands cancelled forthwith.

Furthermore, the Executive Committee noted that in view of the deficiencies as found in the Medical College during the inspections conducted on 14th September 2017 and 25th-26th September, Regulation 8(3)(1)(b) of the Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 is also applicable in the case of the medical college. Regulation 8(3)(1)(b) of the Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 provides as under:-

"If it is observed during any inspection of the Institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or residents is more than 20% and/or bed occupancy is < than 65%, compliance of rectification of deficiencies from such an Institute will not be considered for renewal of permission in that academic year."

The Executive Committee further noted that since the medical college had failed to fulfill the conditions as provided in the Letter of Permission dated 28.09.2016 as issued by the Central Govt. as per the directives of the Oversight Committee for the academic year 2016-17, the medical college is debarred from making admissions in MBBS course for the academic years 2017-18 & 2018-19 and the Bank Guarantee as submitted by the medical college be invoked.

Accordingly, in view of deficiencies of teaching faculty, residents, clinical material, infrastructure, other physical infrastructure and bed-occupancy as found in the Medical College during the aforesaid inspections, the RKDF Medical College Hospital & Research Center, Jatkhedi, Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh under Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan University, Bhopal is not entitled for renewal of permission for the admission of 4th batch of 150 MBBS students for the academic year 2017-18.

103. Pre-PG Assessment – Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and other teaching facilities available for starting of PG course at Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopal under Barkatullah University.

Read: the matter with regard to Pre-PG Assessment – Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and other teaching facilities available for starting of PG course at Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopal under Barkatullah University.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that a Pre-PG Assessment of the physical and other teaching facilities available for starting of PG course at Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopal under Barkatullah University was carried out by the Council's Assessors on 3rd & 4th May, 2017. The said assessment report alongwith a letter dated 04.05.2017 of the Dean, Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopal and a complaint/letter dated 03.05.2017 of Sh. Arvind Yadav was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 23.05.2017 and it was decided as under:-

"The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (3rd and 4th May, 2017) alongwith a letter dated 04.05.2017 and 10.05.2017 of the Dean, Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopal and a complaint/letter 03.05.2017 of Sh. Arvind Yadav, and noted the following:-

1. Data of OPD attendance given by the Institute seems to be highly inflated.
2. After taking detailed round of wards & enquiry with respective treating doctors & paramedical staff, it was found that significant number of indoor patients in Medicine had minor ailments like URTI, Headache, Shoulder pain, weakness who did not require admission.
3. In Medicine wards, many patients were having malignancies of various types who were admitted just for bed occupancy. Similarly in Surgical wards, many patients were admitted for long without active management.

4. Most of the patients admitted in O.G., Surgery, Tb & Chest and Skin & VD wards were admitted for > 1 week without basic investigation and appropriate treatment as per their diagnosis.
5. On physical verification of Drugs dispensed register, only 231 patients were dispensed drugs on a day previous to day of assessment.
6. In view of above, Bed Occupancy is 64.37 % as verified by assessors.
7. Data of laboratory investigations provided by the Institute are grossly inflated and do not match with IPD & OPD figures.
8. Central Library: Students' Reading room (Outside) is not air-conditioned.
9. Anatomy department: Cold Storage cabinet is for 4 bodies only against 8 bodies required.
10. The following residents found not to be staying in rooms allotted to them:-

11. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016, which reads as under:-
8(3)(1).....

- (c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses."

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2018-19) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action."

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities vide this office letter dated 26.05.2017 with the request to submit the compliance after rectification of the deficiencies.

In response to above, the Dean, Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopalvide its letter dated 22.06.2017 had submitted the compliance which was verified by the Council's Assessors on 20th July, 2017.

It is further stated that the Council had received the letters/representations dated 20/07/2017 & 25/07/2017 from the Dean, Chirayu Medical College and Hospital, Bhopal against the Pre-PG compliance verification assessment conducted at Chirayu Medical College and Hospital, Bhopal on 20/07/2017.

The Pre-Pg compliance verification assessment report (20th July, 2017) alongwith previous report (3rd& 4th May, 2017) of the physical and other teaching facilities available for starting of PG course at Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopal under Barkatullah University and letters/representations dated 20/07/2017 & 25/07/2017 of the Dean, Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 08.08.2017 and it was decided as under:-

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (20th July, 2017) alongwith previous report (3rd& 4th May, 2017) of the physical and other teaching facilities available for starting of PG course at Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopal under Barkatullah University and letters/representations dated 20/07/2017 & 25/07/2017 of the Dean of the institute and noted the following:-

1. OPD attendance on day of assessment is 1,043 against requirement of 1,200.
2. Bed Occupancy on day of assessment is 66.60 % as verified by the assessors.
3. Deficiency of admitting patients with trivial complaints still remains .E.g., in General Medicine wards, out of 138 patients, only 100 can be considered as having been admitted properly .
4. Data of Minor Operations submitted by Institute seem to be inflated .
5. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to grant 01(One) month time to the institute to submit the compliance on rectification of deficiencies to the Council.

The Committee further decided to continue the application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016."

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities vide this office letter dated 16.08.2017 with the request to submit the compliance after rectification of the deficiencies.

In response to above, the Dean, Chirayu Medical College & Hospital, Bhopal vide its letter dated 14.09.2017 had submitted the compliance which was verified by the Council's Assessors on 23rd September, 2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (23rd September, 2017) alongwith previous report (20th July, 2017 and 3rd& 4th May, 2017) alongwith a letter/representation dated 24.09.2017 received from the Dean of the institute and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 7.41 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 15 % as detailed in the report.
3. Some of the patients were admitted for trivial complaints (E.g. Migraine, Fever, Bronchitis, Low Backache, Anxiety in General Medicine; Sebaceous Cyst, Ganglion, UTI, Muscular Pain, Small Renal Nonobstructive Calculi in General Surgery) for prolonged duration with no active case management in the wards which do not merit admission.
4. Data of OPD attendance given by the Institute appears to be inflated.
5. Total number of Minor Operations was only 14 on day of assessment.
6. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon'ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-

“(A) Initial assesment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent for affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage.

(B) Inspection should then be conducted by the Inspectors of the MCI. By very nature such inspection must have an element of surprise. Therefore, sufficient time of about three to four months ought to be given to the MCI to cause inspection at any time and such inspection should normally be undertaken latest by January. Surprise inspection would ensure that the required facilities and infrastructure are always in place and not borrowed or put in temporarily.

(C) Intimation of the result or outcome of the inspection would then be communicated. If the infrastructure and facilities are in order, the concerned MedicalCollege should be given requisite permission/renewal. However if there are any deficiencies or shortcomings, the MCI must, after pointing out the deficiencies, grant to the college concerned sufficient time to report compliance.

(D) If compliance is reported and the applicant states that the deficiencies stand removed, the MCI must cause compliance verification. It is possible that such compliance could be accepted even without actual physical verification but that assessment be left entirely to the discretion of the MCI and the Central Government. In cases where actual physical verification is required, the MCI and the Central Government must cause such verification before the deadline.

(E) The result of such verification if positive in favour of the MedicalCollege concerned, the applicant ought to be given requisite permission/renewal. But if the deficiencies still persist or had not been removed, the applicant will stand disentitled so fare as that academic year is concerned.”

It is apparent from the aforesaid decision and the regulations that the application at the first instance is required to be complete and incomplete applications are liable to be rejected. Thereafter, there has to be an inspection and other stages of decision-making process.”

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the applications in respect of the above-said institute for various postgraduate courses to the Central Government, Ministry of Health & F.W., and further grant 01(One) month time to the institute to submit the compliance on rectification of deficiencies to the Council.

The Committee further decided to continue the application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

104. Pre-PG – Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and other teaching facilities available for starting of PG course at Tagore Medical College & Hospital, Chennai under the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai.

Read: the matter with regard to Pre-PG – Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and other teaching facilities available for starting of PG course at Tagore Medical College & Hospital, Chennai under the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that a Pre-PG Assessment of the physical and other teaching facilities available for starting of PG course at Tagore Medical College & Hospital, Chennai under the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai was carried out by the Council's Assessors on 2nd & 3rd June 2016. The said assessment report was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 15.06.2016 and it was decided as under:-

"The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Assessment report (2nd and 3rd June, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. *Deficiency of faculty is 29.45 % as detailed in the report.*
2. *Shortage of residents is 40.47 % at time of visit.*
3. *Bed occupancy was only 08.15 % on day of assessment.*
4. *Girls' common room does not have attached toilets.*
5. *Wards: Most of the wards of General Medicine & allied specialties and General Surgery & allied specialties were not functional on day of assessment. Pantry, Store room, Treatment room, Doctors' duty room were not functional and were found locked at time of assessment. In a few wards, Pillows were kept stacked in Pantry. All Nursing stations were not functional. Nursing staff was inadequate.*
6. *Data of clinical material, OPD attendance, Casualty attendance, Number of admissions and discharge, Radiological & Laboratory investigations as provided by institute are highly inflated. There were very few patients at 09:30 a.m. in OPD.*
7. *There were only 04 Major & 1 Minor operation on day of assessment.*
8. *There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment. Last Normal Delivery as verified from Birth register was on 30/05/2016 & Last LSCS was on 28/05/2016.*
9. *In Histopathology register, entry of specimens of 18 patients were received on 01/06/2016 – i.e. a day prior to day of assessment. On verification, not a single specimen could be located.*
10. *Casualty: No CMO was present at time of visit. Sterilized tray of instruments was dated 24/03/2016 – i.e. > 2 months.*
11. *O.T.: Out of 2 Post-operative rooms, 1 was locked at time of visit. In the 2nd room, there were only 2 patients who were operated on previous day.*
12. *ICUs: PICU was locked at time of visit. There was NIL patient in ICCU. There were only 2 patients in SICU.*
13. *CSSD: No record available for 02/06/2016 – i.e. day of assessment.*
14. *Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.*

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016, which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

- (c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses*

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses."

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted

postgraduate courses and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month.....”

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities vide this office letter dated 26.09.2016 followed by subsequent reminders dated 27.10.2016 & 22.11.2016 with the request to submit the compliance after rectification of the deficiencies.

In response to above, the Principal, Tagore Medical College, Chennai vide his letter dated 23.11.2016 had submitted the compliance which was verified by the Council's Assessors on 21st February, 2017.

The compliance verification assessment report (21st February, 2017) along with previous report (2nd & 3rd June 2016) for starting of PG course at Tagore Medical College & Hospital, Chennai under the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 16.03.2017 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (20th February, 2017) along with previous reports (15th November, 2016 and 2nd & 3rd June, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Shortage of Residents is 11.9 % as detailed in the report.
2. OPD attendance was 1,195 at 2 p.m. on day of assessment against requirement of 1,200.
3. ICUs: There were only 2 patients each in ICCU & MICU.
4. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to grant 01(One) month time to the institute to submit the compliance on rectification of deficiencies to the Council and reiterates its earlier decision regarding apply of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016 which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

- (c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.”

The above decision of the Executive committee was communicated to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities vide this office letter dated 21.04.2017 with the request to submit the compliance after rectification of the deficiencies.

In response to above the Dean, Tagore Medical College and Hospital, Chennai vide his letter dated 09.05.2017 had submitted the compliance which was verified by the Council assessors on 14.06.2017.

The compliance verification assessment report (14.06.2017) along with previous reports (21st February, 2017 and 2nd& 3rd June 2016) for starting of PG course at Tagore Medical College & Hospital, Chennai under the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 11.07.2017 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report)14.06.2017 (along with previous reports)21st February, 2017 and 2nd& 3rd June 2016 (and noted the following:-

1. Shortage of Residents is 10.12 % as detailed in the report .
2. Bed Occupancy at 10 a.m .on day of assessment was 70 % as verified by assessors .In most of the wards, > 60 % of the cases were not genuine & were admitted with minor ailments and most were admitted on day of assessment .
3. There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment . There was NIL delivery in past 2 days .
4. There were only 04 Major Operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment . At 1:30 p.m .during the visit to Post-operative room, there was not a single patient .
5. There were only 09 Minor Operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment .
6. Number of operations)both Major & Minor (in the last few days were 1-2/day as verified by assessors .
7. Histopathology & Cytopathology workload is NIL on day of assessment .
8. Data of OPD attendance appear to be inflated .
9. There were only 2 patients each in SICU, PICU, NICU on day of assessment .
10. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to grant 01)One (month time to the institute to submit the compliance on rectification of deficiencies to the Council.

The Committee further decided to continue the application of clause 8)3)(1)(c (of Establishment of Medical College Regulation)Amendment(, 2010)Part II (dated 16th April, 2010.”

The above decision of the Executive committee was communicated to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities vide this office letter dated 16.08.2017 with the request to submit the compliance after rectification of the deficiencies.

In response to above the Dean, Tagore Medical College and Hospital, Chennai vide his letter dated 14.09.2017 had submitted the compliance which was verified by the Council assessors on 22.09.2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (22.09.2017) along with previous reports (14th June, 2017, 21st February, 2017 and 2nd& 3rd June 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 19.7 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of residents is 33.75 % as detailed in the report.
3. OPD attendance upto 2 p.m. on day of assessment was 973 against requirement of 1,200.
4. Bed Occupancy at 10 a.m. on day of assessment is 41.69 %.
5. There was NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
6. Histopathology workload is only 04 & Cytopathology workload only 09 on day of assessment.
7. ICUs: There was NIL patient in SICU & only 2 patients each in PICU/NICU on day of assessment.
8. Data of Laboratory investigations as provided by Institute are inflated.
9. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon'ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

106. Representation of Dr. Davinder Kumar, Joint Secretary (U/S).

Read: the matter with regard to Representation of Dr. Davinder Kumar, Joint Secretary (U/S).

The Executive Committee of the Council deliberated upon the matter at length and noted that there is no force in the contentions raised by Dr. Davinder Kumar, Joint Secretary (U/S) in his representation dated 16.08.2017 and the same is rejected. The Committee further noted that Dr. Davinder Kumar has wrongly submitted that Dr. Reena Nayyar, Secretary I/c. incorrectly informed vide her letter dated 10.03.2016 that Shri S.K. Mahajan has been appointed by the Executive Committee as Inquiry Officer. It has been verified that the appointment of Inquiry Officer approved by the Executive Committee in its meeting held on 28.12.2015.

The Executive Committee further directed that Dr. Davinder Kumar, Joint Secretary (U/S) may be informed accordingly.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

Dr. Reena Nayyar rejoined the meeting

107. Extension of services of Sh. A.S. Dagar as Consultant (Admn.)

Read: the matter with regard to extension of services of Sh. A.S. Dagar as Consultant (Admn.).

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to extension of services of Sh. A. S. Dagar, Consultant (Admn.) and decided to extend the period of engagement of Sh. A. S. Dagar for a further period of 6(Six) months w.e.f. 10.10.2017 on the existing terms and conditions.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

108. Logo of Council in Bilingual form.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to change of logo of the Council in to bilingual form and decided to approve the Logo in bilingual form as per design enclosed with the agenda.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.
