**1. Minutes of the Executive Committee Meeting held on 24<sup>th</sup> March, 2018 – Confirmation of.**

The Executive Committee of the Council while confirming the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting held on 24<sup>th</sup> March, 2018 noted the following:-

**Item No. 81. Renewal of permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of 150 MBBS students at Sambharam Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Kolar, Karnataka under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.**

*The Executive Committee noted that in the above said item, inadvertently the decision of application of clause 8(3)(1)(b) has been recorded instead of clause 8(3)(1)(a) as the college is in the phase of IInd renewal. The Committee directed the office to communicate accordingly.*

The Executive Committee further noted that at its meeting held on 24.03.2018, it had decided not to recognize/approve some of the Government medical colleges due to various deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report. However, no mention had been made in the decision with regard to admission of fresh batch of students for the academic year 2018-19. In view of above, the Executive Committee decided to grant permission for admission of fresh batch of students for the academic year 2018-19 of the following medical colleges after obtaining undertaking from the respective State Government authorities/Corporation:-

1. ESIC Medical College, Chennai, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. M G R Medical University Chennai
2. Government Medical College, Nizamabad, Telangana for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats).
3. Dr. S. N. Medical College & Associated Group of Hospital, Jodhpur for the award of MBBS degree granted by Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 250 seats.
4. Jawaharlal Nehru Medical College, Ajmer for the award of MBBS degree granted by Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats.
5. S.V. Medical College, Tirupati for the award of MBBS degree granted by Dr. N.T.R. University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 200 seats.
6. Guntur Medical College, Guntur, A.P. for the award of MBBS degree granted by Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 200 seats.
7. RNT Medical College, Udaipur for the award of MBBS degree granted by Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats.
8. Rangaraya Medical College, Kakinada for the award of MBBS degree granted by Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 200 seats.

The Executive Committee approved the proceedings of Ethics Committee in respect of Dr. Mario Jose Roderiguez. However, in respect of Dr. R. Gopinathan, Dean, Southern Institute of Medical Sciences, Thiruvananthpuram, the Executive Committee observed that the decision of not awarding punishment for this offence as he is already under punishment for a similar offence is not correct. As this is a separate offence, and further, Ethics Committee has noted that in-spite of giving several opportunities, Dean/Principal of Southern Institute of Medical Sciences, Thiruvananthapuram has never turned up. Accordingly, the Executive Committee decided that he be awarded a separate punishment of removal of name from IMR, for a period of 3 years effective from the date of communication of this decision.

2. Dr. Selvaraj, Professor & HOD, Community Medicine, also holds charge of Medical Superintendent which is not permissible. Further, he has administrative experience of only 6 years against requirement of 10 years; hence not eligible for the post.
3. Shortage of Residents is 51.66 % as detailed in the report.
4. Deficiency of 94 Teaching Beds in Tb & Chest, Skin & VD, Orthopaedics and ENT remains as it is as it is not rectified.
5. There is no co-ordination between faculty of Medical College & affiliated hospital which is a District Hospital under control of Director of Health Services.



6. No data of Clinical Material like OPD attendance, Bed Occupancy, Number of Deliveries, Major & Minor Operations, Radiological & Laboratory Investigations on day of assessment are provided.
7. Nursing staff is not under Principal / Medical Superintendent of the Medical College. Number of staff did not turn up for verification.
8. Data of Paramedical and Non-teaching staff are not provided.
9. Deficiency of OPD infrastructure remains as it is as it is not rectified.
10. Audiometry & Speech therapy are not available.
11. Wards: There are no dedicated wards for Orthopaedics, Skin & VD, Tb & Chest and ENT departments. Distance between 2 beds is < 1.5 m. Departmentwise & Unitwise distribution of beds is not available.
12. Casualty: Minor O.T. is not available.
13. Central Clinical laboratory is not available.
14. O.T.: 6 Major O.T.s are available against requirement of 7. Equipment are inadequate.
15. ICUs: ICCU & SICU are not available. PICU has 4 beds against requirement of 5.
16. Radiodiagnosis department: 2 Mobile X-ray machines are available against requirement of 4. 2 Static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 5. 1 USG machine is available against requirement of 3.
17. CSSD is not functional.
18. MRD: It is manual. Staff is inadequate.
19. Central Research Laboratory: Facilities are inadequate.
20. Examination Hall: Capacity is 150 against requirement of 250.
21. Lecture Theaters: 2 Lecture Theaters of capacity 110 each are available against requirement of 4 of capacity 120 each. They are not of Gallery type. Capacity of Hospital Lecture Theater is 85 against requirement of 150. It is also not of Gallery type.
22. Central Library: Available area is 336 sq.m. against requirement of 1,600 sq.m. Students' reading room (Outside) & Staff reading room are not available. Capacity of Students' Reading room (Inside) is 50 against requirement of 100. Available books are 4,305 against requirement of 5,000. Available Journals are 5 against requirement of 60.
23. Central Photography Section: Staff & equipment are not available.
24. Deficiencies of Infrastructure of Students' Hostels & of Residents' Hostel remain as they are.
25. Nurses' Hostel: It is not available.
26. Residential Quarters for Non-teaching staff are not available.
27. Administrative Office of Hospital is not as per norms.
28. Specialists' visits are not organized at RHTC/UHC.
29. Website: Information uploaded is sketchy & incomplete.
30. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt .not to renew the permission for admission of 5<sup>th</sup> batch of 100 MBBS students at Government Medical College, Palakkad, Kerala under Kerala University of Health & Allied Sciences, Thrissur, Kerala u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.

21. **Renewal of permission for MBBS course for 2<sup>nd</sup> batch (100 seats) of Saheed Laxman Nayak Medical College & Hospital, Koraput, Odisha under Berhampur University, Berhampur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.**

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 2<sup>nd</sup> batch (100 seats) of Saheed Laxman Nayak Medical College & Hospital, Koraput, Odisha under Berhampur University, Berhampur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (23.02.2018), previous assessment report (21<sup>st</sup>& 22<sup>nd</sup> September, 2017) along with an undertaking of the Secretary, Health & Family Welfare Department, Government of Odisha dated 12.04.2018 and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch (100 seats) of Saheed Laxman Nayak Medical College & Hospital, Koraput, Odisha under Berhampur University, Berhampur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.

**22. The Universal Health Coverage (Medical & Financial Assistance) Bill, 2017 by Shrimati Supriya Sule.**

Read: the matter with regard to the Universal Health Coverage (Medical & Financial Assistance) Bill, 2017 by Shrimati Supriya Sule.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the matter with regard to consideration of the Universal Health Coverage (Medical & Financial Assistance) Bill, 2017 by Shrimati Supriya Sule was placed before the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 06.02.2018 and the Committee decided to form a Committee to study the Bill and submit its report.

The Executive Committee further observed that the Sub-Committee has submitted its report. The Executive Committee after careful consideration of the report decided to accept the same, the operative part of which reads as under:-

.....“The meeting of the Committee was held on 22<sup>nd</sup> of March, 2018 at 11.30 a.m. in the office of the Council, wherein the proposed private member bill titled “Universal Health Coverage (Medical & Financial Assistance) Bill 2018 was perused.

The clause 10 of the proposed private member bill reads that “**The Central Govt., shall in order to ensure availability of health care services, make provision for permitting final year medical student to intern at the public hospital**”.

The Committee observed that the word “**intern**” is availed in the Graduate Medical Education notified by the Medical Council of India whereunder a student who passes final MBBS examination is required to complete one year rotating internship as an “**intern**” in a recognised medical college which amongst other things in terms of the stipulated posting also includes a “rural health posting for a period of 2 months”.

The said “**rotating internship**” is primarily for the purposes of “**hands on training**” of the MBBS examination passed student **under supervision** for the purposes of consolidation of skills and competencies which upon registration with the concerned State Medical Councils and as a “**registered medical practitioner**” would be availing the same on his own.

The said internship is carried out for a period of one year with a “**provisional registration**” procured by the said MBBS passed learner with the concerned State Medical Council for the purposes of pursuing the same.

Upon satisfactory completion the rotating internship of one year, done with a “**provisional registration**” with the concerned State Medical Council that the concerned learner becomes eligible for the conferment of MBBS degree by the examining university.

As such, it is evident that one year rotating internship is an integral part of learning after passing final MBBS examination and it is only on its satisfactory completion and certification thereto that the learner becomes entitled for the conferment of the MBBS degree by the examining university and thereby is eligible to seek “**permanent registration**” with the concerned State Medical Council.

It is upon registration with the concerned State Medical Council that he/she gains the status of a “**registered medical practitioner**” and thereby is entitled to the privileges conferred on him/her of practising **modern medicine** as a **profession**. He/she turns out to be a “**first contact physician**” as a registered medical practitioner.

In the backdrop of classical sense of meaning and scope of the word “**internship**”, a final MBBS student being availed as an “**intern**” in a public hospital could be only

for the purposes of a posting to be scheduled within the prescribed curriculum, but then same could not be for the purposes of availing services out of him as during his period of learning final MBBS, as he/she is not entitled for “**provisional registration**” with the concerned State Medical Council. “

As has been explicitly brought out in the preceding paragraphs that the entitlement of the “provisional registration” with the concerned State Medical Council accrues only after passing final MBBS examination of the concerned examining university and not before.

**Recommendation**

In view of the aforesaid statutory provisions which is explicitly depicted in the governing Graduate Medical Regulation notified by the Medical Council of India with the prior approval of Govt. of India u/s 33 of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 has a binding effect by virtue of its mandatory nature. As such, the same is not open for any condonation, concession or marginalization of any type in any manner.

In view of the above, the committee is of the considered opinion, that contemplation in clause 10 of the proposed private member bill in the context of present binding regulatory provision is untenable. However, a posting as a part of curriculum design for the final MBBS could be incorporated to mitigate the said requirement, if deemed appropriate”....

**23. Change of name of BLDE University, Vijayapura to BLDE (Deemed to be University) in the Schedule-I of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956.**

Read: the matter with regard to change of name of BLDE University, Vijayapura to BLDE (Deemed to be University) in the Schedule-I of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee perused the letter dated 09.03.2018 received from the Registrar, BLDE (Deemed to be University) informing therein that name of their institution has been changed from ‘BLDE University’ to ‘BLDE (Deemed to be University)’ as per directions of UGC and MHRD, w.e.f. 11/1/2018 and requested to kindly incorporate needed changes in the name of their institution in the Schedule 1 of the IMC Act, 1956 and on the website of MCI.

The Executive Committee observed that the Executive Committee at its meeting held in June 1988 had decided as under:-

*“No inspection is required where there is change of name and change of affiliation of the University or the college whose medical qualifications are already recognized and included in the I schedule to the IMC Act, 1956 unless the Executive Committee decided otherwise”.*

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to accept the request of change of name from ‘BLDE University’ to ‘BLDE (Deemed to be University)’ in Schedule-I of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956..

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (27.03.2018) along with previous assessment report (18<sup>th</sup>& 19<sup>th</sup> September, 2017) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 2<sup>nd</sup> batch (100 seats) of Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri Government Medical College, Mandi, Himachal Pradesh under Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.

**30. Consideration of compliance verification assessment report with regard to continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Chettinad Academy of Research and Education (Deemed University), Chettinad in respect of students being trained at Chettinad Hospital & Research Institute, Kanchipuram.**

Read: the matter with regard to consideration of compliance verification assessment report with regard to continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Chettinad Academy of Research and Education (Deemed University), Chettinad in respect of students being trained at Chettinad Hospital & Research Institute, Kanchipuram.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment (2nd April, 2018) along with photographs/videography, previous reports (31st July 2017 & 1st August, 2017) and noted the following:-

1. Bed Occupancy at 10 a.m. on day of assessment is 26.52 %.
2. Patients & quality of clinical material- The quality of clinical material in some of the departments was not of any significance. Eg.

- (i) In General Medicine, patient named Veeram with indoor OPD Number 091921364 was admitted without any indoor case paper for cataract in medicine ward.
  - (ii) Mr. Raja Pandi IP No. Adm0297730 was admitted with no complaints.
  - (iii) Mr. Loganathan Admn No.0297325 admitted since 27.3.2018 with chest pain but no ECG or other investigation done.
  - (iv) Patient Ms. Asadhamma-091903800 in Ortho ward was shown to be admitted on 12.3.2018 and discharged on 22.3.2018 as per the case sheet . However, the patient is still found to be admitted in the ward.
3. Clinical material- All the figures have been given by the college authorities. However, all are inflated figures since during the time of assessment round, in any OPD not more than 4 to 5 patients were waiting at any time. The bed occupancy was 26.52%. Only 3 patients were present in the OTs while only 2 patients were present in the pre-operative/post operative wards. It is also mentioned that OT lists available in the theatres were inflated. For e.g. In the ENT list showed 19 patients while only 1 was done. Orthopedics showed 11 patients whereas no patient was there in the OT. Gynae list 11 patients while no patient has been done. Surgery list showed 15 patients while only 1 patient has been done.
4. Shortage of Residents is 5.74 % as detailed in the report.
  5. Wards: Pantries are not functional.
  6. Casualty: Minor O.T. is not available.
  7. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided not to recommend continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Chettinad Academy of Research and Education (Deemed University), Chettinad in respect of students being trained at Chettinad Hospital & Research Institute, Kanchipuram and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance after rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16<sup>th</sup> April, 2010 and amended on 18th March, 2016, which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

- (c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2019-20) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the



IMC Act,1956 alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

***The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.***

1. OPD attendance upto 2 p.m. as verified by Assessors from Departmental registers was 560 against requirement of 600. Discrepancy exists in all departments.
2. Bed Occupancy of genuine patients is about 40 % as about 30-40 % of the patients admitted in wards appeared to be non-genuine.
3. Patients:-
  - (a) In ENT, a patient named Suena Ruidas was admitted today for Rt. Acute Otitis Media, but on interrogation she said nothing has happened to her except some vague body ache. Similarly, Rajdhuni Ruidas and Sansli Das were admitted without any ENT complaint.
  - (b) In Surgery Ranjit Badgi was admitted for pseudo aphakia (eye problem), two patients for body pain (bed no. 649 & 659) and one Batuk Chandra Mohite was admitted for cough (647).
  - (c) In female Surgery also three patients (duli suidas, alapi tudu and kakoli suidas) were admitted for knee pain. On bed no. 505 dulari was admitted for skin disease and seven other beds were occupied for ophthalmology cases.
  - (d) 22 patients in female medical wards were admitted between 7 am and 9.30 am with vague complaints.
  - (e) In male medical ward 9 patients were admitted on 1.4.2018 with vague complaints around 11 pm.
  - (f) All the patients in the pediatric ward were from school hostel and between 8-9 years of age. Only 4 patients were having diarrhea and

rest of the patients had vague complaints of bodyache, headache and feverish feeling.

- (g) NICU and PICu are common with capacity of 6 patients but no patients was available on the day of assessment.

2. Deficiency of faculty is 31 % as detailed in the report.
3. Shortage of Residents is 43.75 % as detailed in the report.
4. Bed Occupancy at 10 a.m. on day of assessment was 69.23 %.
5. There were only 10 Major Operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment.
6. Nursing staff: 251 Nursing staff are available against requirement of 372.
7. OPD: Injection room is common for males & females. Dressing room is common for males & females.



8. Audiologist & Speech Therapist are not available.
9. Casualty: Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available. Ventilator is not available.
10. O.T.: Septic O.T. is not available.
11. ICUs: There were only 2 patients in ICCU, MICU, SICU on day of assessment.
12. Radiodiagnosis department: 5 Mobile X-ray machines are available against requirement of 6. 5 Static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 6. 2 USG machines are available against requirement of 3.
13. CT Scan was out of order on day of assessment. Even so, it is single slice against requirement of minimum 16 slice.
14. CSSD: ETO Sterilizer is not available. Receiving & Distribution points are not separate.
15. Wards: Demonstration rooms are smaller than required.
16. MRD: It is partially computerized. ICD X classification of Diseases for indexing is not followed.
17. Examination Halls: Total capacity of 3 Examination Halls available is 270 against total requirement of 2 of 250 each – i.e. Total 500.
18. Lecture Theater: Capacity of Hospital Lecture Theater is 120 against requirement of 200.
19. Central Library: Available area is 508 sq.m. against requirement of 2,400 sq.m. Capacity of Students; Reading room (Inside) is 120 against requirement of 150. Available Journals are 90 against requirement of 100.
20. Central Photography Section is not available.
21. Students' Hostels: Available accommodation is 432 against requirement of 450.
22. Residents' Hostel: Available accommodation is for 78 Residents against requirement of 80.
23. Residential quarters: Non-teaching staff quarters are not available in the campus.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend not to recognize/approve Chhattisgarh Institute of Medical Sciences, Bilaspur for the award of MBBS degree granted by Pandit Deen Dayal Upadhyay Health Sciences & Ayush University, Raipur against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

Further the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Government not to renew the permission for admission of fresh batch against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats at Chhattisgarh Institute of Medical Sciences, Bilaspur for the academic year 2018-2019.

**46. Renewal of permission for MBBS course for 3<sup>rd</sup> batch (100 seats) of Dr. Baba Saheb Ambedkar Medical College, Rohini, New Delhi under Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.**

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 3<sup>rd</sup> batch (100 seats) of Dr. Baba Saheb Ambedkar Medical College, Rohini, New Delhi under Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report(30<sup>th</sup> January, 2018) alongwith previous assessment report(6<sup>th</sup>& 7<sup>th</sup> September, 2017) and noted the following-:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 28.08 % as detailed in the report.
2. CT Scan is not available.
3. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt .not to renew the permission for admission of 3<sup>rd</sup>batch of 100 MBBS students at Dr. Baba Saheb Ambedkar Medical College, Rohini, New Delhi under Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.

**47. Representations received from the students/parents/Associations/MPs regarding requirement of NEET.**

Read: the matter with regard to representations received from the students/parents/ Associations/MPs regarding requirement of NEET.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the representations received from the students/parents/ Associations/MPs regarding requirement of NEET as well as the email letter dated 11<sup>th</sup> April, 2018 received from the Council Advocate wherein he has informed that the writ petition was listed before the Hon'ble High Delhi High Court on 10.4.2018. The Hon'ble Court recorded that MCI is in receipt of several representation and is considering the issue in the Executive Committee meetings, the decision on the issue will thereafter be placed before the Oversight Committee for their approval prior to communicating the same. The Hon'ble Court while recording the aforesaid was pleased to dispose off the present writ petition with a direction to the MCI to consider the same as a representation and to preferable take a decision within 6 weeks.

The Executive Committee of the Council also perused the legal opinion of the Law Officer of the Council and decided to accept the same, the operative part of which reads as under:-

“.....

11. *Therefore, keeping in view the fact that several thousand Indian students have already commenced their pre-medical education, i.e., B.S. course in Philippines or pre-medical/language courses in any other foreign countries and that Eligibility Certificate is required to be granted on the criteria of age and marks in 10+2, the Executive Committee may consider exempting all Indian citizens/Overseas Citizens of India who have taken admission in Philippines/any other foreign country and are currently pursuing BS/pre-medical course/language course in such Foreign Countries on or before 31<sup>st</sup> May 2018 from the requirement of appearing in NEET 2018. Such candidates should furnish their admission record in BS or any other pre-medical course/language course in the Foreign Countries with their application for Eligibility Certificate alongwith details of travel including exit from India and entry back into India as well as entry / exit in that Foreign Country. The same may be accepted only on the basis of certified copies of passport wherein such details are duly recorded. It may be further clarified that, the present is a one-time exemption granted keeping in view the peculiar facts and circumstances that have arisen and all those who leave the Indian Shores for pursuing pre-medical/medical course on or after 31<sup>st</sup> May 2018 shall not be exempted from the requirement of NEET 2018 in terms of the amendment dated 01.03.2018 to the Screening Test Regulations, 2002 and Eligibility Requirement for Taking Admission in an Undergraduate Medical Course in a Foreign Medical Institution Regulation, 2002.”*

***The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.***

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Bhilwara, Rajasthan (Government Medical College, Bhilwara) by Govt. of Rajasthan with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Rajasthan University of Health Science, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (6<sup>th</sup>April, 2018), previous assessment report (9<sup>th</sup>& 10<sup>th</sup> November, 2017), additional information submitted by the Assessors dated 11.04.2018, copy of letter dated 06.04.2018 received from the college authorities alongwith an undertaking of the Principal Secretary, Medical Education, Govt. of Rajasthan dated 12.04.2018 and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of new medical college at Bhilwara, Rajasthan (Government Medical College, Bhilwara) by Govt. of Rajasthan with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Rajasthan University of Health Science, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.

**50. Establishment of New Medical College at Churu, Rajasthan (Government Medical College, Churu) by Govt. of Rajasthan with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Rajasthan University of Health Science, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.**

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (03.04.2018) along with previous assessment report (9<sup>th</sup>& 10<sup>th</sup> November, 2017) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of new medical college at Churu, Rajasthan (Government Medical College, Churu) by Govt. of Rajasthan with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Rajasthan University of Health Science, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.

**51. Renewal of permission for MBBS course for 5<sup>th</sup> batch (100 seats) of RUHS College of Medical Sciences, Jaipur, Rajasthan under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.**

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 5<sup>th</sup> batch (100 seats) of RUHS College of Medical Sciences, Jaipur, Rajasthan under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (16<sup>th</sup> January, 2018) along with previous assessment report (21<sup>st</sup> & 22<sup>nd</sup> Aug., 2017) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 5<sup>th</sup> batch (100 seats) of RUHS College of Medical Sciences, Jaipur, Rajasthan under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-2019.

**52. Consideration of compliance verification assessment report with regard to continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Sher-I-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences, Srinagar (Deemed University) in respect of students being trained at Sher-I-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences, Srinagar.**

Read: the matter with regard to consideration of compliance verification assessment report with regard to continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Sher-I-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences, Srinagar (Deemed University) in respect of students being trained at Sher-I-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences, Srinagar.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (4<sup>th</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup> April, 2018) previous assessment reports (17<sup>th</sup> April, 2017 and 30<sup>th</sup> & 31<sup>st</sup> May, 2014) along with an undertaking of the Director & Ex-Officio Secretary, SKIMS, Srinagar, Kashmir dated 12.04.2018 and decided to recommend that recognition of MBBS degree granted by Sher-I-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences, Srinagar (Deemed University) in respect of students being trained at Sher-I-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences, Srinagar be continued restricting the number of admission to 50 (Fifty) students.

The Executive Committee also decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April, 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

8 (3) ...

- (2) The recognition so granted to an Undergraduate Course for award of degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.
- (3) The procedure for 'Renewal' of recognition shall be same as applicable for the award of recognition.
- (4) Failure to seek timely renewal of recognition as required in sub clause (a) supra shall invariably result in stoppage of admissions to the concerned Undergraduate Course of MBBS at the said institute.

**53. Complaint against Dr. G N Qazi who is an engineer by profession but working illegally as Director General of Hamdard Institute of Medical Sciences & Research and getting permission / approval by giving wrong facts to MCI.**

Read: the matter with regard to complaint against Dr. G N Qazi who is an engineer by profession but working illegally as Director General of Hamdard Institute of Medical Sciences & Research and getting permission / approval by giving wrong facts to MCI.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter at length and also perused the following legal opinion:-

*“It may be noted that the Minimum Qualifications for Teachers in Medical Institution Regulations, 1998 provides for the position of Principal / Dean / Director of Medical Institution who is the Head of the Medical Institution. The Regulations require that the holder of such office should possess recognized post-graduate medical qualification from a recognized institution with a minimum of ten years teaching experience as Professor / Associate Professor in medical college / Institute. It is evident from the reply quoted on pre-page note that the Hamdard Institute has created a position of Director General which is held by a non-Medical Biochemistry / Microbiologist. This is not permissible as per the TEQ Regulations. Accordingly, the matter may be placed before the Executive Committee for appropriate action, including issuance of direction to the Institute for ensuring that the position of medical institution is filled in accordance with MCI TEQ Regulations.”*

After careful consideration of the legal opinion, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to obtain the opinion of Learned Additional Solicitor General of India before taking a final decision.

**54. Recognition/Approval of Hamdard Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, New Delhi for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Jamia Hamdard University, New Delhi u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Hamdard Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, New Delhi for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Jamia Hamdard University, New Delhi u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (3<sup>rd</sup> April, 2018) along with previous assessment report (6<sup>th</sup>& 7<sup>th</sup> December, 2017) and decided to recommend to the Central Government for recognition/approval of Hamdard Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, New Delhi for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Jamia Hamdard University, New Delhi u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16<sup>th</sup> April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

8 (3) ...

(2) The recognition so granted to an Undergraduate Course for award of MBBS degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.

(3) The procedure for 'Renewal' of recognition shall be same as applicable for the award of recognition.

(4) Failure to seek timely renewal of recognition as required in sub-clause (a) supra shall invariably result in stoppage of admissions to the concerned Undergraduate Course of MBBS at the said institute.

**55. Affiliation of the Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College.**

Read: the matter with regard to affiliation of the Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter alongwith the legal opinion of the Law Officer of the Council and noted as under:

1. Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College vide its letter dated 31.08.2015, submitted its scheme for establishment of new medical college (Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College) at Subhartipuram, Kotda Santaur, Prem Nagar, Tehsil Vikas Nagar, Dehradun, Uttarakhand by Dr. Jagat Narain Subharti Charitable Trust, Dehradun, Uttarakhand u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17, alongwith the Consent of Affiliation dated 19.05.2014 issued by the Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Haridwar.
2. The Executive Committee of the Council, in view of the fact that the medical college had failed to meet the qualifying criteria pertaining to land as provided under Regulations and the binding dictum of the Hon'ble Supreme Court in Royal Trust case, it was decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Dehradun, Uttarakhand by Dr. Jagat Narain Subharti Charitable Trust, Dehradun, Uttarakhand to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17. In view of the above decision of the Executive Committee the scheme of the medical college was returned vide letter dated 01.03.2016 and subsequent letter dated 15.05.2016.
3. The Central Government vide its letter dated 08.06.2016 had disapproved the application of the college for the academic year 2016-17. However, subsequently, the Govt. of India on the recommendation / decision of the Hon'ble Supreme Court mandated Oversight Committee vide letter dated 26.09.2016, granted Conditional Letter of Permission to the medical college, subject to the conditions stipulated, therein, for establishment of new medical college at Dehradun, Uttarakhand by Dr. Jagat Narain Subharti Charitable Trust, Dehradun, Uttarakhand with annual intake of 150 admissions from the academic year 2016-17.
4. The Council office had thereafter received a letter dated 29.07.2017 from the Registrar of Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Haridwar, which reads as under:

- ◆ प्राचार्य, श्री देव सुमन सुभारती मेडिकल कालेज, कोटडा सन्तूर, नन्दा की चौकी, देहरादून को उक्त परीक्षा तिथियों से अवगत कराते हुए संस्थान में अध्ययनरत एम0बी0बी0एस0 छात्र-छात्राओं का विश्वविद्यालय में नामांकन एवं परीक्षा फॉर्म भरे जाने हेतु कई बार सूचित करने पर संस्थान द्वारा यह अवगत कराया गया है कि संस्थान हेमवती नन्दन बहुगुणा उत्तराखण्ड चिकित्सा शिक्षा विश्वविद्यालय, देहरादून से सम्बद्धता हेतु केवल अनापत्ति प्रमाण-पत्र लिया था, सम्बद्धता नहीं ली। रास बिहारी बोस सुभारती विश्वविद्यालय की स्थापना के पश्चात हमने सम्बद्धता रास बिहारी बोस सुभारती विश्वविद्यालय से ले ली है तथा उसी के द्वारा परीक्षाएं आयोजित की जा रही है। (संलग्नक-04)

- ◆ संस्थान में सत्र 2016-17 में अध्ययनरत छात्र-छात्राओं के अभिभावक गणों द्वारा पत्र प्रेषित कर उनके बच्चों की परीक्षाएं हेमवती नन्दन बहुगुणा उत्तराखण्ड चिकित्सा शिक्षा विश्वविद्यालय, देहरादून द्वारा निर्धारित समय-सारणी अनुसार तथा विश्वविद्यालय द्वारा ही कराये जाने का अनुरोध किया गया है। (संलग्नक-05)

अतः उक्त के आलोक में महोदया से अनुरोध है कि संस्थान की सत्र-2016-17 की सम्बद्धता एवं उसमें अध्ययनरत छात्र-छात्राओं की प्रथम वर्ष की विश्वविद्यालयी परीक्षाएं किस विश्वविद्यालय द्वारा आयोजित की जानी है के संबंध में मार्गदर्शन/दिशा-निर्देश प्रदान करने का कष्ट करें, ताकि तदानुसार अग्रेत्तर कार्यवाही की जा सके।

5. In relation to the above, the Council office vide letter dated 25.08.2017, informed the Secretary, Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Haridwar, and Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College, Dehradun, that the examination of the students admitted in the academic year 2016-17, shall have to be conducted by the Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Haridwar.

6. In reference to Council's letter dated 25.08.2017, the Council Office has received a letter dated 15.09.2017 from the Principal & Dean, Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College, Dehradun stating therein as under:-

"In reference to your letter no. MCI-34(41)(General)/2017-Med,133984 dated 25.08.2017 sent to the Registrar Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical University, a copy of which is attached with this letter as Annexure no. 1, we most respectfully wish to bring to your kind knowledge that Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College, Dehradun is not affiliated to Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical University. Therefore the HNBUMU has no right/authority to conduct examination of the students of the college admitted in the academic session 2016-17. A copy of the detailed reply sent to the Registrar of H.N.B.U. Medical University is attached herewith as Annexure No. 2.

The establishment of Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University took place on 26<sup>th</sup> December, 2016 vide Gazette Notification of Uttarakhand Government dated 26<sup>th</sup> December, 2016 and the college became part/faculty/constituent college of Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University. A Formal affiliation has been granted by Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University, Dehradun to our College. A copy of the letter of affiliation is attached herewith as Annexure No. 3. Information to this effect was sent to the MCI by us vide Ref. no. SSSMC/2017/01/1002 dated 19<sup>th</sup> January, 2017 a copy of the letter dated 19<sup>th</sup> January, 2017 is attached herewith as Annexure No. 4.

You are requested to kindly make correction in your record and oblige."

7. Thereafter, Council office vide its letter dated 13.12.2017 requested the Dean & Principal, Shridev Suman Subharti Medical college, Dehradun to submit the following documents at the earliest:-

- 1) No Objection Certificate from the Uttarakhand State Govt. regarding the change of affiliation from HNBU Medical University to "Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University
- 2) No Objection Certificate from HNBU Medical University for change of affiliation to "Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University".
- 3) Resolution passed by the Trustees of Dr. Jagatnarayan Subharti Charitable Trust whereby they have approved of such change in affiliation of the University

- 4) No Objection Certificate from the affiliating university where the institution seeks affiliation for change in name of the affiliating university
  - 5) A letter from the UGC confirming the status of the Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University.
8. In response to above, the Council office has received a letter dated 26.12.2017 from the Dean & Principal, Shridev Suman Subharti Medical college, Dehradun, therein, stating, as under:-

*"With reference to your letter no. MCI-34(41)(Gen.)/2017-Med./160687 dated 13.12.2017, regarding the above mentioned subject, which was sent by your kind self by mail on 18-12-2017, we wish to submit the following:*

**1. NOC from Uttarakhand State Government and HNB Medical University for change of Affiliation:**

*The case of Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College is not related to change of affiliation. Please find the details as below:*

- i. *Dr. Jagat Narain Subharti Charitable Trust, Dehradun, had submitted Consent of Affiliation from Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Dehradun to the Central Government along with the application for grant of permission to start the Medical College in the name of Shridev Suman Subharti Medical college. A copy of the "Consent of Affiliation" dated **19th May 2014 is Annexure No. 1**. The certificate mentions that..... "agreed in principle to affiliate the proposed Medical College....."*
- ii. *It may kindly be noted that consent of affiliation means that the University had agreed in principle only to give affiliation subject to the grant of permission by the Government of India. Therefore, it was not an affiliation. There is a laid down procedure for the grant of affiliation by the University. Para 11 of the Procedures of Affiliation states as under:*

***"The Consent of Affiliation will be no guarantee/obligation on the University to issue Provisional/Permanent Affiliation to the Teaching institution/Hospital."***

.....

.....
- vii. *The above facts clearly indicates that neither we applied for affiliation from the Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Dehradun nor we were ever granted affiliation by Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Dehradun. Therefore, the question of taking no objection for change of affiliation from Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Dehradun does not arise.*

**2. Affiliation by Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University, Dehradun:**

- i. *The Government of Uttarakhand passed an Act no. 35 of 2016, which is called as "Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University Act" (RBBSU Act) (promoted by Dr. Jagat Narain Subharti Charitable Trust, which has also*



- established Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College). The State Government also granted the letter to start the University. A copy of the Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University Act is **Annexure No. 3** and the letter of authorization to start the University is **Annexure No. 4**.
- ii. Clause no. 4(j) of the RBBSU Act states, "The trust has given commitment to start post graduate courses in at least five disciplines". It clearly indicates that the trust is supposed to start under graduate courses also in at least five disciplines, because post graduation courses can only be started in an institution when it has got graduate courses. At the time of submitting the proposal to the State Government for the grant of status of University, we had also incorporated MBBS course in the list of proposed courses, which the University shall be running. In view of the above, there is no reason for obtaining any No Objection Certificate from the Uttarakhand State Government for the affiliation with RBBSU.
  - iii. It is to state that after establishment of the University, the proposer Trust has got no direct intervention in the affairs of the College and it is a College itself which submits the request to the University for the grant of affiliation and completes the formalities as per the requirement of the University.
  - iv. It is pertinent to mention that Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College being a constituent College of the University did not require to formally obtain a separate affiliation from the University, however, the Principal, Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College applied for affiliation to Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University. (**Annexure No. 5**).
  - v. The University, after conducting its own inspection and verifying the records, granted formal affiliation to Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College. (**Annexure No. 6**).

### **3. UGC status of Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University**

Name of Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University has been included in the list of Private Universities by University Grants Commission (UGC). The name was uploaded on the website of UGC on 12-12-17. A copy of the screen shot taken from the website of the University Grant Commission is **Annexure No. 7**.

We trust that our explanation given herein above related to your queries, satisfies the MCI. Further, it is requested that in view of the above, necessary changes be made in your record and website regarding the affiliation of Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College to Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University."

The Executive Committee, in view of the above, noted that at the time of submission of scheme by the medical college, the medical college had submitted letter of consent of affiliation from Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University and also that at the time of grant of conditional letter of permission by the Central Govt., vide letter dated 26.09.2016, the medical college had consent of affiliation from Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Haridwar. However, the medical college after the issuance of conditional letter of permission, admitted students, but deliberately did not obtain a valid affiliation from the said university and on the contrary, admitted students and continued to conduct studies of the students for atleast 4 months without any affiliation. Whereafter, the medical college claims to have obtained

affiliation from newly constituted Ras Bihari Bose Subharti University, as being a constituent medical college of the university.

The Executive Committee, further noted that since the medical college, was granted conditional letter of permission by the Central Govt., on the basis of the consent of affiliation issued by Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Haridwar, therefore, the medical college, after obtaining the said permission was bound to apply and duly obtain affiliation from Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Haridwar, itself. Further, the medical college conducted the studies of the students admitted in the academic year 2016-17, without affiliation for 4 months, which is against the Council's Regulations.

In view of the aforesaid, the Executive Committee decided to direct Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College, Dehradun to duly obtain valid affiliation from Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, Haridwar in respect of the students admitted in the medical college and submit the same to the Council. Further, the said students shall have to appear in the University Examinations conducted by Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University.

The Executive Committee also decided to direct that in case the medical college fails to or does not obtain a valid affiliation from Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna Uttarakhand Medical Education University, then the Council shall be left with no other option but to recommend to the Central Govt. to withdraw the conditional letter of permission granted to Shridev Suman Subharti Medical College, Dehradun for establishment of new medical college from academic year 2016-17, with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students.

**56. Consideration of compliance verification assessment of continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Devi Ahilya Vishwa Vidyalaya in respect of students being trained at Index Medical College Hospital & Research Centre, Indore.**

Read: the matter with regard to consideration of compliance verification assessment of continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Devi Ahilya Vishwa Vidyalaya in respect of students being trained at Index Medical College Hospital & Research Centre, Indore.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (5<sup>th</sup> April, 2018) along with previous assessment report (21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> December, 2017) and decided to revoke the decision of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16<sup>th</sup> April, 2010 and amended on 18.3.2016.

The Executive Committee further decided to recommend that recognition of MBBS degree granted by Devi Ahilya Vishwa Vidyalaya in respect of students being trained at Index Medical College Hospital & Research Centre, Indore be continued restricting the number of admission to 150 (One Hundred Fifty) students.

The Executive Committee also decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16<sup>th</sup> April, 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

8 (3) ...

- (2) The recognition so granted to an Undergraduate Course for award of degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.
- (3) The procedure for 'Renewal' of recognition shall be same as applicable for the award of recognition.

- (4) Failure to seek timely renewal of recognition as required in sub clause (a) supra shall invariably result in stoppage of admissions to the concerned Undergraduate Course of MBBS at the said institute.

**57. Regarding consideration of Internship term from April 2017 to Dec. 2017 of Winter 2016 passed out Batch students of Shri Shivaji Education Society's Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Mayani, Tal-Khatav, Dist. Satara.**

Read: the matter with regard to consideration of Internship term from April 2017 to Dec. 2017 of Winter 2016 passed out Batch students of Shri Shivaji Education Society's Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Mayani, Tal-Khatav, Dist. Satara.

The Executive Committee of the Council deliberate the matter pertains to consideration of Internship term from April 2017 to Dec. 2017 of winter 2016 passed out Batch students of Shri Shivaji Education Society's Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Mayani, Tal-Khatav, Dist. Satara.

The Executive Committee perused the following opinion of Law Officer as under:

*"3. Concerning internship Clause 14 (5)(ii) of Graduate Medical Education Regulation, 1997 states as under:*

*(ii) Every candidate will be required after passing the final MBBS examination to undergo compulsory rotational internship to the satisfaction of the college authorities and University concerned for a period of 12 months so as to be eligible for the award of the degree of Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) and full registration.*

*4. The above provision provides that internship has to be to the satisfaction of the colleges authorities and University concerned. Therefore, it is for the MUHS and the College authorities to take a decision regarding the completion of rotatory internship in respect of these 11 students and Council has no objection as to reckoning of period as sought for by the MUHS."*

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to approve the opinion of Law Officer and inform all authorities accordingly.

**58. Establishment of new medical college at Narahlagun, Arunachal Pradesh (Tomo Riba Institute of Health & Medical Sciences, Naharlagun) by Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh with an annual intake of 50 MBBS students under Rajiv Gandhi University, Doimukh, Arunachal Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.**

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Narahlagun, Arunachal Pradesh (Tomo Riba Institute of Health & Medical Sciences, Naharlagun) by Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh with an annual intake of 50 MBBS students under Rajiv Gandhi University, Doimukh, Arunachal Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (3<sup>rd</sup> April, 2018), previous assessment report (16<sup>th</sup> & 17<sup>th</sup> November, 2017) alongwith a letter dated 05.04.2018 received from the college authorities and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 51.78 % as detailed in the report.
2. Paramedical & Non-teaching staff: 91 Paramedical & Non-teaching staff are available against requirement of 91.

3. OPD: Teaching areas are not separated and not furnished.
4. Casualty: Disaster Trolley, Crash Cart are not available.
5. MRD: It is yet to be computerized.
6. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Narahlagun, Arunachal Pradesh (Tomo Riba Institute of Health & Medical Sciences, Naharlagun) by Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh with an annual intake of 50 MBBS students under Rajiv Gandhi University, Doimukh, Arunachal Pradesh to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

**59. Request of Arunachal Pradesh for one time relaxation of the 'teaching experience' stipulated under the Medical Council of India (MCI) Act for appointment to the teaching posts in the college.**

Read: the matter with regard to request of Arunachal Pradesh for one time relaxation of the 'teaching experience' stipulated under the Medical Council of India (MCI) Act for appointment to the teaching posts in the college.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter pertaining to request of Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh to grant one time (a) relaxation of the requirement of One year Senior Residency for appointment to the post of Assistant Professor, and (b) increase the upper age limit from 40 to 50 years for appointment to posts of Senior Residents.

The Executive Committee perused the following opinion of Council Advocate and accepted the same:-

*....."In light of the above, I am of the considered opinion that only those candidates who fulfill the eligibility criteria of minimum academic qualifications and teaching/research experience as per Minimum Qualification for Teachers in Medical Institution Regulations, 1998 are qualified to hold the respective teaching posts in medical colleges in the country and no appointments of teachers/residents in institutions, which are contrary to the Minimum Qualifications for Teachers in Medical Institutions Regulations, 1998 can be approved/recognized by the querist.*

*Further, no regulation or any part of it can be relaxed, as the same are binding and mandatory and have statutory force. Under any circumstance, the said regulations cannot be relaxed and the request made by the Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh cannot be acceded for any reason whatsoever, as the standard of medical education cannot be compromised under any circumstances."*

**60. Establishment of new medical college at Falkawn, Mizoram by Govt. of Mizoram with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Mizoram University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.**

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Falkawn, Mizoram by Govt. of Mizoram with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Mizoram University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (4<sup>th</sup> April, 2018) along with previous assessment report (21<sup>st</sup>& 22<sup>nd</sup> November, 2017) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 38.98 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 51.10 % as detailed in the report.
3. Blood Bank is not available.
4. ICUs: There was NIL patient in ICCU on day of assessment. SICU & PICU are not available.
5. Nursing staff: 173 Nursing staff are available against 175 required.
6. ETO Sterilizer is not available.
7. Central library: Only 3 Journals are available against requirement of 20.
8. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Falkawn, Mizoram by Govt. of Mizoram with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Mizoram University to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

**61. Recognition/Approval of Integral Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Integral University, Lucknow u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956..**

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Integral Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Integral University, Lucknow u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment reports (19<sup>th</sup> March, 2018 and 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> April, 2018), Photographs/Videography alongwith letter/representation dated 09.04.2018 received from the college authorities and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 11.32 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 30.64 % as detailed in the report.
3. OPD attendance data on day of assessment does not match with Central Registry.
4. Bed Occupancy at 10 a.m. on day of assessment was observed to be 56 % as verified by assessors. 8-10 % of the patients were kept without investigation and treatment.
5. Patients -On cross verification bed occupancy was 56% and 8-10% patients were kept without investigation and treatment.
  - (i) Patients name Satish regn.No.201004040494 was admitted in casualty on 04.04.2018. No critical findings in case paper. Patient was comfortable. But still patient was kept in casualty at the time of verification.
  - (ii) Male surgical ward, Vijay Kumar regn. No.201804040491 was admitted with complaints of pain in abdomen on 04.04.2018 but in case paper no investigation and day to day treatment.
  - (iii) In Orthopaedics male wards patients name Nasir, Regn. No.201803150026 was admitted on 15.03.2018 was kept without any diagnosis and further treatment plan.
  - (iv) In male surgical ward, 8 beds ward has no patients.
  - (v) In Surgical female ward, indoor and discharge register was not there.
  - (vi) Patients name Pooja Regn. No.201803310092 was admitted on 03.04.2018, case paper shows no diagnosis, no day to day details.

- (vii) Patients name Meenu Verma 201803270409 admitted in ward on 03.04.2018, there was no history and day to day treatment and diagnosis.
6. On cross verification by assessors it was observed that there were 6 Major & 2 Minor Operations on day of assessment.
  7. Data of Clinical material, Radiological & Laboratory investigations as provided by the Institute are inflated.
  8. Patient named Satish (Regn. No. 201004040494) was admitted in Casualty on 04/04/2018. There were no findings of any critical condition on case paper. Patient was comfortable, but was still kept in Casualty at time of visit.
  9. O.T.: Emergency O.T. & Septic O.T. are not available.
  10. ICUs: Total 5 beds are available in NICU/PICU against requirement of 5 beds each.
  11. Wards: General Surgery wards do not have O<sub>2</sub> pipeline & suction facilities. There are no chairs in O.G. Demonstration room. Capacity of Demonstration rooms is less in several wards.
  12. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend not to recognize/approve Integral Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Integral University, Lucknowu/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

Further the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Government not to renew the permission for admission of fresh batch of 100 MBBS students at Integral Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh for the academic year 2018-2019.

**62. Recognition/Approval of North Delhi Municipal Corporation Medical College, Malka Ganj, New Delhi for the award of MBBS degree (50 seats) granted by Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of North Delhi Municipal Corporation Medical College, Malka Ganj, New Delhi for the award of MBBS degree (50 seats) granted by Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (9<sup>th</sup> April, 2018) along with previous assessment report (8<sup>th</sup> December, 2017 and 28<sup>th</sup>& 29<sup>th</sup> December, 2017)and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 14.28 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 11.28 as detailed in the report.
3. Residents' Hostel: Available accommodation is for 47 Residents against 54 required.
4. ETO Sterilizer is not available.
5. Central Research Laboratory is not available.
6. MRD: It is partially computerized.
7. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend not to recognize/approve North Delhi Municipal Corporation Medical College, Malka Ganj, New Delhi for the award of MBBS degree (50 seats) granted by Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

Further the Committee considering the undertaking of Additional Commissioner (Revenue), North Delhi Municipal Corporation, Civic Centre, New Delhi dated 12.04.2018 decided to recommend to the Central Government to renew the permission for admission of fresh batch of 50 MBBS students at North Delhi Municipal Corporation Medical College, Malka Ganj, New Delhi for the academic year 2018-2019.

**63. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 60 MBBS seats (Show Cause) at St. John Medical College, Bangalore under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore.**

Read: the matter with regard to compliance verification assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 60 MBBS seats (Show Cause) at St. John Medical College, Bangalore under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (09.04.2018) along with previous assessment reports (28.12.2018 and 28<sup>th</sup>& 29<sup>th</sup> August, 2017) and decided to revoke the decision of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16<sup>th</sup> April, 2010.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to process the application for renewal of permission for increase of seats and office is directed to act accordingly.

***The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.***

**64. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats (Show Cause) at Maharashtra Institute of Medical Education & Research, Latur under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik.**

Read: the matter with regard to compliance verification assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats (Show Cause) at Maharashtra Institute of Medical Education & Research, Latur under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (09.04.2018) along with previous assessment reports (16.01.2018 and 28<sup>th</sup>& 29<sup>th</sup> August, 2017) and decided to revoke the decision of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16<sup>th</sup> April, 2010.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to process the application for renewal of permission for increase of seats and office is directed to act accordingly.

***The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.***

**65. Regarding Grant of financial up-gradation under MACP Scheme.**

Read: the matter with regard to regarding grant of financial up-gradation under MACP Scheme.

The Executive Committee of the Council after going through the agenda note observed that the matter has not been routed through the appropriate Committees and therefore decided to refer the matter to Administration & Grievance Committee and Finance Committee.

**66. Extension of Service of Sh. Praveen Rawat.**

Read: the matter with regard to extension of service of Sh. Praveen Rawat.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to extension of services of Sh. Praveen Rawat and decided to extend the period of engagement of Sh. Praveen Rawat for a further period of 6(Six) months on the existing terms and conditions.

***The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.***

**67. Recognition/Approval of Chandulal Chandrakar Memorial Medical College, Durg, Chhattisgarh for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Pt. Deendayal Upadhyay Memorial Health Sciences & Ayush University, Raipur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Chandulal Chandrakar Memorial Medical College, Durg, Chhattisgarh for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Pt. Deendayal Upadhyay Memorial Health Sciences & Ayush University, Raipur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment reports (19.03.2018 and 9<sup>th</sup>&10<sup>th</sup>April, 2018) alongwith Photographs/Videography and noted the following:-

1. Shortage of Residents is 13.75 % as detailed in the report.
2. All the Residents are not staying in the hostel
3. Except in General medicine & O.G. departments, in no other department, Residents knew anything about patients of their specialty suggesting that they are not working regularly & have presented themselves just for assessment.
4. Bed Occupancy of patients on day of assessment at 11:15 a.m. was 49.23 %. If 20 Non-genuine patients are to be excluded, it comes to 44.23 % as detailed in the report.
5. Patients
  - (i) General Medicine- during round of the assessor at 11.15 am on 9.4.18, patients in various wards were as follows 9/30, 14/30, 10/30, 26/30 and 23/30=82/150. On these 11 patients are not be counted as 2 were admitted with headache, 1 with B2 deficiency, 2 hypothyroidism, 1 gastritis, 1 UTI, 11 generalized weakness, 1 enteric fever and 1 colitis. None of the patients case file has clinic investigative evidence of the disease or diagnosis and even the treatment prescribed did not match with the clinical diagnosis. This leaves only 71 patients worth considering.
  - (ii) Paediatrics – during round of the assessor at 12.30 p.m. patients in various wards were as follows – 6/30, 12,30 and 8/30=26/90. On these 26 patients a total of 14 were admitted today i.e. on 9.4.18.
  - (iii) TB & Respiratory Medicine – 19 patients on 20 beds.
  - (iv) Psychiatry – 10 patients on 15 beds.
  - (v) Dermatology – 15 patients on 15 beds, of which 7 patients are not to be considered as follows – Tenia cruris -1, Tenia Corporis-2, Scabies-3 and Urticaria-1. This leaves 8 genuine patients for counting towards bed occupancy.



- (vi) General Surgery – During round of the assessor at 12 noon on 9.4.18, patients in various wards were as follows – 4/30, 8/30, 4/30, 9/30 and 8/30=33/150.
- (vii) Orthopaedics – during round of the assessor at 12.30 p.m., patients in various wards were as follows – 8/30, 9/30, 15/30=32/90. Of these 15 patients in one ward, as many as 12 had either pain in upper limb, or in lower limb or back without supportive investigative evidence or relevant treatment. Thus only 20 genuine patients are to be counted for bed occupancy.
- (viii) Ophthalmology – 10 patients on 15 beds.
- (ix) ENT – 14 patients on 15 beds of which 5 are CSOM.
- (x) OBG – The patients position is as – 30/30, 21/30 and 28/30=79

## 6. Patients

- (a) Except SR in Medicine and Residents and consultants of OBG & Gynae. Department, no other department ward resident knew anything about the admitted patient of their speciality suggesting that they are not working regularly in ward and have presented themselves just for head count/physical verification.
- (b) Medical Superintendent himself admitted that close to 60% of admissions in Medicine wards have diabetes and hypertension. On assessors round of the ward during review of these case files of these patients, facts regarding diagnosis and treatment mentioned in their case files of these patients, facts regarding diagnosis and treatment mentioned in their case files did not emerge meriting hospitalization of majority these cases. Thus the figures of bed occupancy above in the report are a little more liberal. Considering non requirement of hospitalisation of these patients into account, the bed occupancy will further go down.
- (c) In Medicine, patients after getting registered at central registration counter, did not get themselves registered in regular OPD registration register till 1 pm. Details of these patients were taken on rough page. This practice is not in line with standard of care and can be termed fraudulent as there is no plausible explanation for such a practice.
- (d) Except for Ophthalmology and OBG, there was not a single post-operative patient lying in surgical and allied surgical specialties wards who was operated 1-3 days earlier (5<sup>th</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> April 2018), although OT register was full of entries of various operative procedures putting a question mark on the validity of these entries. In tough language, it can be termed as fraudulent.
- (e) There were entries of more than 2 cases of caesarean section in last 24 hours in the OT register. But in the list of clinical material supplied by the institution, only 2 cesarean sections were mentioned. Variation of this data again puts question mark on the validity of these entries.

- 7. There were only 8 Major Operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment as verified by assessors.
- 8. Data of Clinical material, Radiological investigations a provided by Institute are inflated.
- 9. ICUs: Only 4 beds are available in NICU & 2 in PICU against requirement of 5 each. There was only 1 patient in NICU.
- 10. Wards: In Demonstration rooms, there are no chairs; only plastic stools are available.
- 11. Central Library: 84 Journals are available against requirement of 100. Supply of Journals in 2017 is irregular. Many issues of several Journals are missing.

12. Community Medicine department: There is NIL Specimen available in the Museum.
13. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend not to recognize/approve Chandulal Chandrakar Memorial Medical College, Durg, Chhattisgarh for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Pt. Deendayal Upadhyay Memorial Health Sciences & Ayush University, Raipur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

Further the Executive Committee decided to recommend to the Central Government not to renew the permission for admission of fresh batch of 150 MBBS students at Chandulal Chandrakar Memorial Medical College, Durg, Chhattisgarh for the academic year 2018-2019.

**68. Recognition/Approval of ESIC Medical College & Hospital, Joka, West Bengal for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by West Bengal University of Health Sciences u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of ESIC Medical College & Hospital, Joka, West Bengal for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by West Bengal University of Health Sciences u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report(09<sup>th</sup> April, 2018) alongwith previous assessment report(08<sup>th</sup>& 9<sup>th</sup> Feb., 2018)and decided to recommend to the Central Government for recognition/approval of ESIC Medical College & Hospital, Joka, West Bengal for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by West Bengal University of Health Sciencesu/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16<sup>th</sup> April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

8 (3) ...

(2) The recognition so granted to an Undergraduate Course for award of MBBS degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.

(3) The procedure for 'Renewal' of recognition shall be same as applicable for the award of recognition.

(4) Failure to seek timely renewal of recognition as required in sub-clause (a) supra shall invariably result in stoppage of admissions to the concerned Undergraduate Course of MBBS at the said institute.

**69. Establishment of new medical college at Hamirpur, Himachal Pradesh (Dr. Radhakrishnan Government Medical College, Hamirpur, Himachal Pradesh) by Government of Himachal Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under H.P. University, Shimla u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.**

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Hamirpur, Himachal Pradesh (Dr. Radhakrishnan Government Medical College, Hamirpur, Himachal Pradesh) by Government of Himachal Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under H.P. University, Shimla u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that at its meeting held on 14.12.2017, it was decided as under:

“ .....

*In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 pertaining to the person owning and managing a hospital of not less than 300 beds, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Hamirpur, Himachal Pradesh (Dr. Radhakrishnan Government Medical College, Hamirpur, Himachal Pradesh) by Government of Himachal Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under H.P. University, Shimla to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2018-19 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.”*

The Executive Committee further noted that the Council office has received a letter dated 20.01.2018 from the Principal, Dr. Radhakrishnan Government Medical College, Hamirpur, Himachal Pradesh addressed to the Secretary to the Govt. of India, Department of Health, Nirman Bhawan, New Delhi and copy to this Council stating therein as under:-

“ .....

*In this context, it is submitted that the MCI inspection have mentioned in their report 251 teaching beds in the attached hospital against minimum requirement of 300 teaching beds, it is further to inform you that as per MCI norms, in Hilly states, minimum required teaching beds for LOP stage is 250 which are available in the Medical College Hospital as has also been indicated by the MCI inspectors in their report.” .....*

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dated 2.4.2018 received from the Central Govt., Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, New Delhi forwarding therewith the representation/compliance dated 08.04.2018 received from the Principal, Dr. Radhakrishnan Govt. Medical College, Hamirpur (HP).

The Executive Committee noted that the Ministry under its Committee had given personal hearing to the authorized representatives of the medical colleges/applicants on 9.3.2018 and forwarded observations/recommendations of the Committee constituted by the Ministry in the matter, which is as under:-

*“Submission as made by the college at column 4.*

*The college is coming up in a underserved areas. A good number of faculty and Residents have been appointed. The State Government undertakes to rectify the remaining deficiency of the Faculty & Residents and Infrarstructure facilities within one month.*

*The committee recommends that matter may be referred to MCI for review.”*

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to verify the compliance by way of an assessment.

***The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.***

**70. Report of Sub-Committee for the DMMP Milestone payments.**

Read: the matter with regard to report of Sub-Committee for the DMMP Milestone payments.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to the DMMP Milestone payments and decided to accept the report of the Sub-Committee with further direction to the office not to release payments for the 5<sup>th</sup> Milestone as yet till the modules are used and tested by the concerned sections and UAT submitted. Technical Expert be also appointed to rectify any defects that are still persisting.

Further, the Executive Committee decided to nominate Shri A.S. Dagar, Consultant (Admn.) as Nodal Officer who should submit his report to the Sub-Committee within 2 weeks and the Sub-committee to take appropriate decision thereafter.

**71. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats (Show Cause) at Maharashtra Institute of Medical Education & Research, Talegaon, Pune under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik.**

Read: the matter with regard to compliance verification assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats (Show Cause) at Maharashtra Institute of Medical Education & Research, Talegaon, Pune under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (09.04.2018) along with previous assessment reports (09.01.2018 and 28<sup>th</sup>& 29<sup>th</sup> August, 2017) and decided to revoke the decision of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16<sup>th</sup> April, 2010.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to process the application for renewal of permission for increase of seats and office was directed to act accordingly.

***The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.***

**72. Disciplinary case against Sh. Babu Ram Maunwal, Assistant Secretary, MCI – appointment of Inquiry Officer & Presenting Officer.**

Read: the matter with regard to disciplinary case against Sh. Babu Ram Maunwal, Assistant Secretary, MCI – appointment of Inquiry Officer & Presenting Officer.

The Executive Committee of the Council deliberated upon the matter at length and noted that Sh. Babu Ram Maunwal was heard in person by the Executive Committee on 24.03.2018 and also noted that there is no merit in the arguments as well as reply furnished by himvide his representation dated 16.03.2018.

Further, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to appoint Shri Ajit Srivastava, IAS (Retired) as Inquiry Officer and Shri Nirmal Singh, Consultant (Finance) as Presenting Officer. The honorarium to the Inquiry Officer and Presenting Officer shall be paid as per rules.

***The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.***

**73. Recommendations of Medical Council of India in respect of Govt. Medical Colleges for the year 2018-19.**

Read: the matter with regard to recommendations of Medical Council of India in respect of Govt. Medical Colleges for the year 2018-19.

The Executive Committee considered the letter No.U.12012/32/2018-ME-I(3151105), dated 12.04.2018 received from the Under Secretary to the Govt. of India, with regard to recommendations of Medical Council of India in respect of Govt. Medical Colleges for the year 2018-19 and decided to obtain opinion/approval of Oversight Committee and upon receipt of the same, office is directed to process application accordingly.

The Executive Committee further decided that in view of the Time Schedule, the office is also directed to send the communication to the Oversight Committee separately today itself.

***The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.***
